BAY OF FUNDY WAS KNOWN FOR CENTURIES BY SAILORS

One of the oldest known bodies of water in North America is the Bay of Fundy. DeMonts and Champlain in 1604 first gave it authentic recognition but it was visited by French, Basque and Portuguese fishermen and traders in the sixteenth century and is marked on maps of that period, states the Tourist Bureau of the Canadian National Railways. It is shown on Cabot's map of 1544 and the name, it is believed, is derived from the French word "Fendu", meaning "split", applied on old maps to the cape now called Cape Split at the entrance to Minas Basin, at the head of the Bay of Fundy.

1933 Motor Vehicle Licenses Are Good Until March 31st

Extension of Time Announced by the Minister of Public Works.

All motor vehicle licenses, chauffeurs' licenses, and operators' licenses, issued by the Department of Public Works in New Brunswick have been extended to March 31, 1934.

Announcement of the extension of all motor vehicle licenses was made by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works. This custom has been followed in New Brunswick for several years past and the action is based on Section 98 of the Motor Vehicle Act.

The Cost Of Living Was Unchanged During September

Oshawa Shown With Cheapest Rents in Dominion.

The national average for cost of living in Canada showed practically no change during September and at October 1 the cost of food for the average working man with a family of five remained at the September 1 figure of \$7.24 per week. Fuel increased from \$2.83 to \$2.84 while rents declined from \$5.67 to \$5.66.

The figures, issued by Dominion Bureau of Statistics, show that on a basis of prices prevailing on October 1 the cost of food for the standard family was lowest in St. John's, Que., where it amounted to \$6.06 per week and highest in Victoria, B.C., where it was \$8.40. A comparison of fuel costs in nine principal centres of Canada showed costs in Moncton, N.B., at \$2.04 as the low point while Winnipeg, where costs were \$3.05, represented the other extreme. Rents remained practically unchanged but rents in Halifax are highest at \$7.25 per week and Oshawa, Ont., has the cheapest rent of \$4 per week.

Complete comparable statistics are available for only nine cities of the Dominion. Comparison of the figures for these cities with the average figure for the Dominion, which is weighted by the large proportion of smaller municipalities, shows that while fuel costs in the larger centres are generally under the average cost for the Dominion, the cost of food and rent is higher than the Dominion average. Comparison of the figures for nine of the principal cities in Canada is as follows:
