

Old Favorites Of Stage And Book Coming To Capitol

Dumas' and Dickens' Stories Retold on the Screen.

Never in its history has Capitol Theatre been able to boast a finer line-up of high-class pictorial attractions than that current this week and continuing throughout next week for Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week Dumas' immortal story of book and stage, "The Count of Monte Cristo" will hold the screen. It has been one of the season's sensations throughout the centres of the world.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday another choice bit of world literature will come to the Capitol in Charles Dickens' "Great Expectations," wierdly fantastic and intensely human tale of London at a period when Queen Victoria was a little girl. This should be a great treat to Dickens lovers and a most commendable contribution to the screen form of entertainment.

The third picture in the present line-up is "Trans-Atlantic Merry-go-Round," simply a descriptive title for a melange of music, dancing, merry patter, rapid-fire jocularly and all that kind of fun identified with Jack Benny, the radio and stage favorite, Nancy Carroll, Gene Raymond, that precocious Mitzi Green, the Boswell Sisters and a whole slew of other stars.

STREAM-LINE TRAINS ARE PLANNED FOR GT. BRITAIN

Stream-lined trains, thundering along the track at 120 miles an hour, may necessitate a considerable revision of the British railway time-table during the next year or two.

The new era of stream-lining, with the use of the Diesel engine, has already been hinted at, with experimental running of rail-motor trains, particularly from Birmingham to Cardiff.

Experience gained from these trains is to be applied to an immediate development of the services, with faster trains and greater accommodation—such as already exist in Germany and the U.S.A.

Technical reports on the working of these trains abroad have been received by British railway companies.

Interest has been quickened by the success of the U. S. Diesel-engined aluminum stream-lined train, which attained a speed of 120 miles an hour last week.

The policy of the companies, for the time being, is likely to be the use of a few such trains as supplementary to their regular services.

NEW PERIL IN IRELAND

Dublin. (CPC).—Irish farmers have often chased and been chased across bogs, but never before have they been chased by a bog. Now a bog in Killanena, mountainous district in East Claire, is pouring down a mountain-side in a huge stream of black mud, earth and stones. Families have fled from their homes. Crops have been destroyed. If rains continue, the whole bog will slide down the mountain and fill the valley, the farmers fear.

Two Radio Experts Enter Business In City of Saint John

Frank D. Thorne and D. A. Massie Stationed at 47 King Street.

One of the new businesses in Saint John which is rapidly assuming an important place is the Royal Radio and Electrics, 47 King Street, where radio equipment, electrical goods and a special line of Christmas toys are on display.

The proprietor of this new concern is Frank D. Thorne, former station director and chief engineer of radio broadcasting station CFBO. He was also the designer and builder of VE9BJ, the only experimental broadcast short wave station in New Brunswick. All the amplifying equipment of CFBO was designed by Mr. Thorne. Associated with Mr. Thorne is Donald A. Massie, son of Commissioner Massie. Mr. Massie designed and built the first commercial broadcast station in Eastern Canada, its call letters being CJCI. He also built the police short wave transmitter for the city of Saint John.

The Royal Radio and Electrics will have on display at the Radio Show, which is being held in Saint John on December 6, 7 and 8, all models of the Spartan Radio. There also will be in connection with their exhibit, the Electric Eye or Photo Cell, which Saint John people will see for the first time. Besides these there will be shown modern short wave equipment and novelties.

The public is invited to inspect the Christmas stock in the store at 47 King Street. While the Radio Show is in progress Mr. Thorne and Mr. Massie will be present at their booth and will be glad to demonstrate or talk to any of the public regarding receivers and radio problems.

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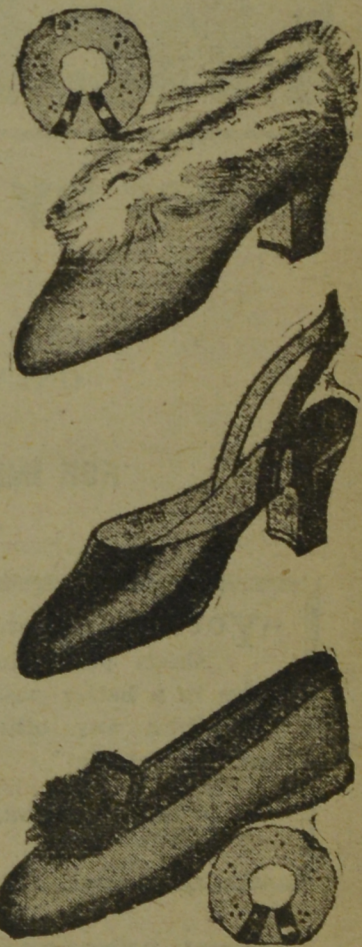
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
