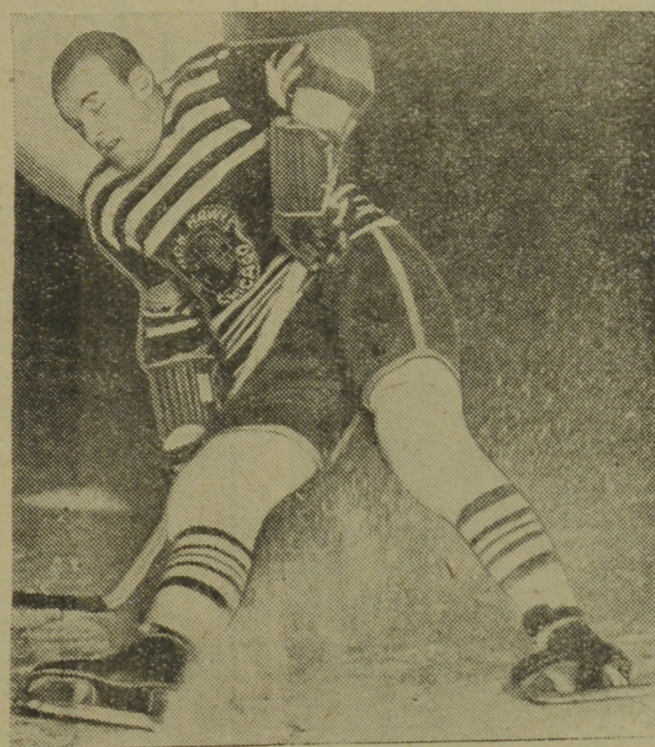


SPREADING THEIR WINGS FOR THE BLACK HAWKS

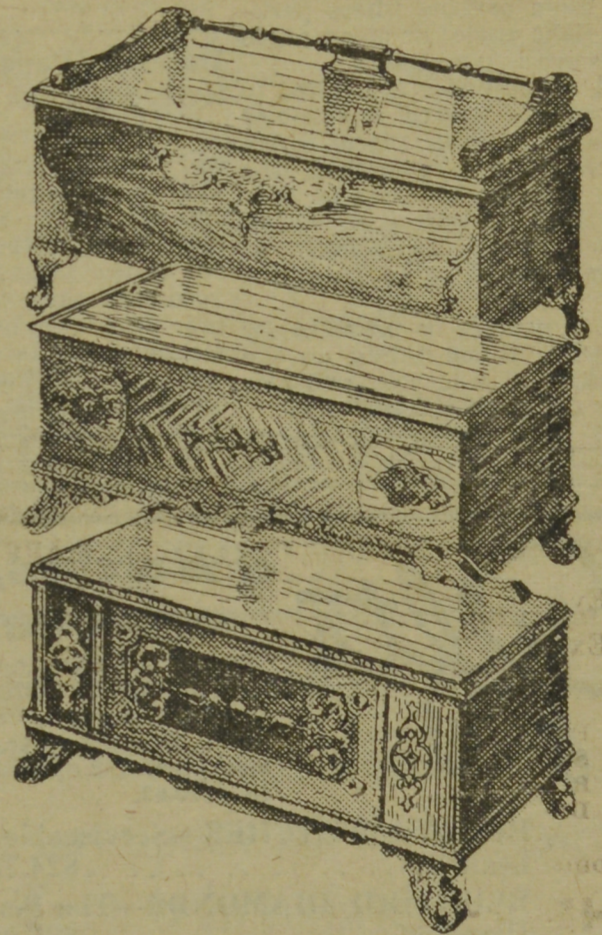
