A QUESTION OF TAXES

An equitable taxation system for the City of Saint John is one of the chief requirements, if this city is to really progress. Under present conditions the uncertainty from year to year in regard to just what amount of taxes a business will be called upon to pay has led to the removal of certain firms from this community. One of the big handicaps was the tax on stocks in trade. This has been considered a detriment to business generally for no merchant could afford to carry a heavy stock and pay taxes on it.

Another galling part of the Saint John taxation system is the tax on machinery, which is used to give employment to citizens and build up manufacturing for the city.

No one questions the fact that those who have money must pay the taxes, but under the system in vogue here, many businesses are handicapped by taxation, where if all businesses and individuals were paying their fair share of the taxes no one would be hard pressed.

Citizens are looking to City Hall for leadership in matters of reform and while the Mayor and Commissioners may be justified in believing the people are satisfied because they are making no organized demands for tax reform, still there is a certain amount of dissatisfaction, which is growing. Eventually this may take a definite form, which will not be ignored. In the matter of taxation there are few people who are being overtaxed but there are a great number who are not paying as much as they should. So an equitable system of taxation is needed before Saint John can hope to become a really great city.
