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Traffic Regulations

DEGULATIONS to govern traffic have been drawn up for I Saint John, but many of them do not gain much attention from drivers of vehicles. As a matter of fact, generally speaking, the traffic control is designed to make the streets and highways safe. Naturally these regulations centre around vehicles, but it must be remembered that the roads were made for people to use. Certain automobile drivers seems to think that the people on the highways are mere pedestrians and not to be classed with the people in motor vehicles. As a result of this attitude the people who must walk are subjected to inconveniences that the laws never intended.

In Saint John there are certain stop streets where vehicles must come to a dead stop. These stops should be made back of the foot-path section so that persons will not be delayed or endangered. At the intersection of Union and Mill streets, cars coming down Union will stop right across the pathway and pedestrians are compelled to wait, although vehicular traffic continues along Dock and Mill.

What is wanted is for the vehicles to stop on the streets back of the stop signs so that pedestrians may have a chance to get along. If the drivers of motor vehicles would observe the regulations it would be much easier to get the pedestrians to conform.


