

Hunting Season In The Maritimes Showing Promise

Big Game Seems To Attract Attention Among Visitors.

Saturday, September 15, was the red letter day for big game hunters and wild fowl sportsmen insofar as New Brunswick is concerned. The season for deer opened on that date with exceptions in the case of Grand Manan, Deer Island and Campobello, Charlotte County, and continues until November 30. The moose season does not open until October 20 and closes November 20. The season for bear opened September 15, and closes November 30.

The season for ducks, geese, brant, coots, gallinules and rails opened on the same date and continues up to and including December 31 except on the islands of the Grand Manan group where the season does not open until October 15 and closes January 31. Woodcock, Wilson's or jack snipe are allowed to be taken from October 1 to November 30. Daily bag limit 15 ducks, 150 for the season; geese, 15; brant, 15; rails, 25; Wilson's snipe, 25; woodcock, 8 per day, 125 for the season. There will be another open season for partridge this year, October 15 to 31, with a bag limit of six per day, not exceeding a total of 20.

A new departure in New Brunswick's game laws this season is that sportsmen will be able to fish as well as hunt, salmon fishing being permitted on the Saint John and Kennebecasis Rivers up to September 30, on the Nashwaak, Cains, St. Croix, Magaguadavic and Didgequash Rivers to October 15 and on the Tabusintac River to October 31. Trout fishing closes September 30.

In Nova Scotia the deer and moose season opens and closes simultaneously, October 10 to October 31. Moose are not allowed to be hunted on Cape Breton Island. Bear can be taken at any time. The season for ducks and rails opened December 31 and in the other counties opens October 1 and closes January 15. Daily limit 15 ducks, 25 rails. The season for brant and geese opens October 1 and closes January 15 except in Shelburne, Queens and Halifax counties where it opens November 1 and closes January 31. Daily limit 5 brant and geese. Woodcock and snipe are allowed to be taken October 1 to November 30 with a daily bag limit of 25 for snipe and 8 woodcock, not more than 125 per season. Grouse and birch partridge may be killed October 15 to October 31. Salmon fishing is still permitted in Cape Breton where the season does not close until October 15, also on rivers of the mainland flowing into the Strait of Canso and Chedabucto Bay. Trout may be caught in Pictou and Antigonish counties until September 30. Elsewhere the season has closed.

There is no big game hunting on Prince Edward Island but plenty of bird shooting including ducks, geese, brant, rails and coots, woodcock and snipe. The season for ducks and geese opened on September 1 and continues until December 14 and for other birds opened September 15 and closes November 30. Daily bag limit not more than 15 ducks, geese or brant and not more than 25 in the aggregate of rails and coots and not more than 25 snipe. Eight woodcock a day are permitted and not more than 125 in the season.

TIME TO REFORM

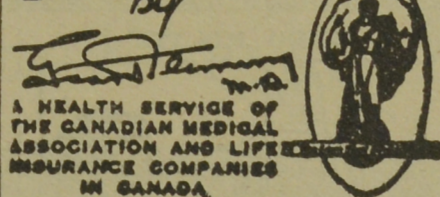
"Mummy," said the daughter of the house, "how long is it to my birthday?"

PAINLESS

The severity of a pain is to many people a fair measure of the severity of the disease or abnormal condition responsible for the pain. Pain is one of nature's danger signals. Nevertheless, it is most unfortunate that the public are apt to believe that if pain means danger, then the absence of pain assures safety. That this is not true is evident when we come to consider how many of the major tragedies of illness which undermines health and endangers life, occur without caus-

ing a twinge of pain until it is too late to do much about it.

Ask the woman who comes to her doctor for the first time with a cancer of the breast why she did not come sooner, and almost inevitably the answer given is to the effect that she did not think the lump in her breast could be anything serious because there was no pain. It should be cried from the housetops that, in its early stages, cancer of the breast is painless; indeed it does not cause even tenderness. There are exceptional cases, but no women has any justification for thinking that she can neglect the lump in her breast just because it does not give rise to pain or tenderness.

There is another popular misconception concerning cancers of the breast, namely that such cancers rarely occur in women under forty. It is quite true that the majority are found after that age, but it is equally true that a large number occur between the

ages of thirty and forty, and that quite a number develop in women in their early twenties, occasionally even earlier.

This simply means that a woman cannot say to herself: "I cannot have cancer of the breast because the breast is not painful and I am under forty." Cancer of the breast occurs at all ages, and at all ages it is usually painless in its early stages.

There is only one safe and sure way for a woman to approach this subject. She knows the appearance and the feel of her own breasts. If, at any time, she observes or feels a change in her breasts, then she should consult her doctor without any delay. By "change," we mean any discharge from the nipple, or alteration in the appearance of the nipple, or a feeling of thickening, or a lump in the breast.

The reason why we insist upon the importance of the early recognition of cancer of the breast is simply that when the symptoms

are recognized early and properly treated, the results are good. Early treatment is the only effective remedy, and early treatment can be given only if there is an early diagnosis, and early diagnosis depends upon the patient's going to her physician with the earliest signs.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

A system of unemployment insurance does not seem too attractive for the worker. Whatever plan of insurance is examined, it always comes back to the same result, however well it may be dissimulated: the artisan who stays at work must pay a living allowance to the other who does not work. Since that is bound always to be the case, it may well be maintained that a fairer division of work amongst artisans by a more rational regulation of working hours, would be more equitable and give a better solution of the problem than any of the insurance systems.
