

## Canada Makes A Trade Agreement With The French

France To Take Wheat For Wine and Perfumes.

It is eminently fitting that the year of the Jacques Cartier celebrations in the Province of Quebec should provide also a new trade agreement with France. The new arrangement, signed at the week-end, represents the happy rounding out of negotiations instituted by Mr. Cahan and embodied in the 1933 agreement and now carried further by the Prime Minister negotiating in person. While at Geneva recently, Mr. Bennett headed a body which pronounced upon the importance of freer world trade.

The text of the new treaty has not yet been made public, nor are the full details known. They will, of course, be presented to Parliament at the earliest opportunity. But enough is already known to justify the statement that both sides have obtained important concessions. It looks as if Canada, again, had struck a thoroughly satisfactory bargain.

From the Canadian point of view, of course, great interest attaches to the position of our wheat in the French market. France, of late, has herself become a great producer of wheat. She still needs high quality wheat, however, for mixing purposes, and it is here that the Canadian has an opportunity. France, in recent years, has filled her wheat import requirements principally through quotas. The new arrangement provides that if, for any reason, France should hereafter feel constrained to curtail importation of Canadian wheat, she will automatically face the loss of the very substantial concessions now offered to her by Canada upon French wines and liqueurs, spirits and alcoholic perfumes. This reverses the previous position, in which France was able to and did withdraw concessions to our wheat when Canadian concessions on wines were not immediately forthcoming.—Montreal Star.

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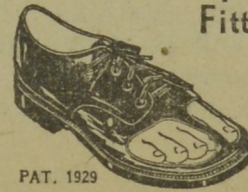
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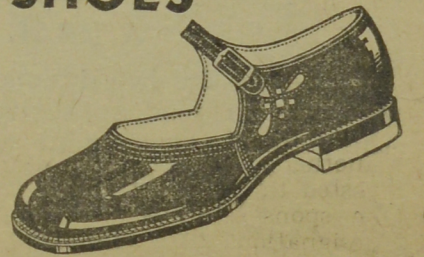
