SATURDAY HIGHLIGHTS

United States Secretary of State, Cordell Hull, is to be heard in his first public address since his return from South America when he will address the National Press Club in Washington on Saturday at 2.30 p.m.

The first international broadcast from the famous Opera Comique in Paris will be heard over WABC on Saturday at 4.15 p.m. The program will be short-waved from France and rebroadcast. Massenet's tragic opera "Manon" will be picked up direct from the stage of the famous opera house.

The Boy Scouts of America are to have a big day on Saturday. After parades and other features the boys in different centres will gather round the radio to hear an address by President Roosevelt, at 1.00 p.m., over a WABC-Columbia chain. The Scout pledge of allegiance will be read over the entire network and will be repeated by the assembled gatherings.

"Merry Mount," Howard Hanson's opera in English is to have its world premiere at the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, on Saturday afternoon. The opera will be broadcast over the NBC-WJEF-WJZ network and will be picked up by the Canadian Radio Commission. CFBO will carry the program beginning at 2.55 p.m. The composer of the opera is Richard Stokes and it concerns the Puritans of New England.
