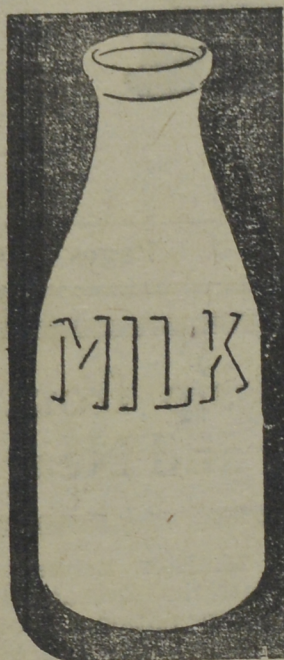


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Lauds Relief Work

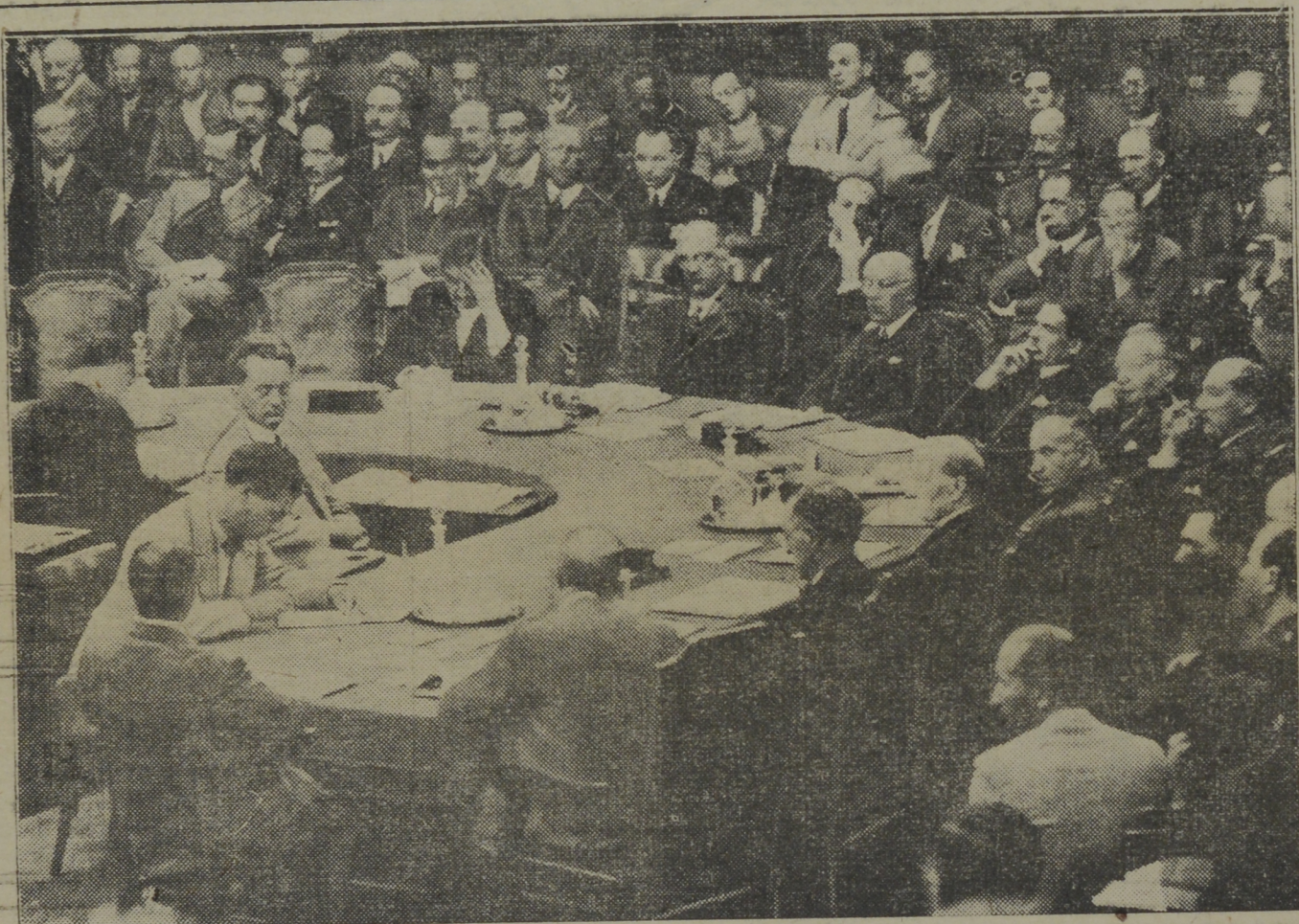

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ITALY'S VACANT SEATS AT GENEVA COUNCIL



When Bedjurond Teclé Hawariate, Ethiopian delegate to the League of Nations council, started speaking at Geneva, Switzerland, on September 6, the two Italian delegates to the council, including Baron Pompeo Aloisi, promptly left the council table and the building. Their empty seats are pictured at the left, background. From left to right, next to the empty seats, are: Premier Pierre Laval of France, Mr. Guinazu of Argen-

tina, president of the council Mr. Avenol; Capt. Anthony Eden of England; Foreign Minister Litvinoff of Soviet Russia, and Joseph Beck of Poland. The council was attempting a peaceful solution of the threatened Italo-Ethiopian war, and had just heard a denunciation by Ethiopian spokesmen of Italy's activities and left the room.

Production of Oil in New Brunswick Now Increases

The Refining Plant at Weldon, N. B., Handles Local Products—For Year 1933, 307,839 Gallons of Oil Were Produced.

How many people in New Brunswick know that an oil-refining plant is in operation in this province? During 1933 the New Brunswick Gas and Oilfields, Ltd., produced 307,839 gallons of oil, besides supplying natural gas to Moncton and surrounding districts.

The annual report of W. E. McMullin, Provincial Inspector of Mines, contains some information on the oil and gas industry. A few quotations from this report are here reproduced:

“For a number of years the New Brunswick Gas and Oilfields, Ltd., have under authority of a lease from the Crown produced natural gas for distribution in the city of Moncton and along the Petitcodiac, below the city. Since some of the wells are oil producing this oil is refined in the company's plant at Weldon on the Salisbury-Albert branch of the Canadian National Railway. During the past year 307,839 gallons of oil were produced. In the preceding year there were 194,715 gallons. The total value, however, of both gas and oil on which the Crown receives a royalty of five per cent., was this year \$133,455.72 as against \$140,529.47 in the preceding year. This is probably a reflection of business conditions through those periods, since the gas is used to a considerable extent for industrial purposes.

“Over a period of nearly 20 years the company has supplied demands put upon it for gas but in order to do so it is necessary, with the exception of the winter season, to continually open up new wells, and of these some produce gas or oil while some do not.

“The following is the company's report on a geo-magnetic survey which has been carried on for the purpose of planning in an intelligent and scientific manner future drilling operations:

“Since 1919, this company has investigated the various modern methods of geophysical surveying as applied to oil-field development, and, following experimental work carried out in 1930, by our Dr. J. A. L. Henderson, south of Moncton, the geo-magnetic method was considered by him the only one applicable with any reasonable hope of useful results, for the complex conditions existing in New Brunswick. In order to test the suitability of this method the company enlisted the interest and assistance of the Director of the Geological Survey, at Ottawa, and also the co-operation of the Minister of Mines and of the Provincial Geologist, with the result that a series of preliminary geo-magnetic traverses were carried out in September, 1932. The results were encouraging enough to warrant this company in continuing the work itself during 1933. Special instruments of the latest type were made in England, and a staff was selected and trained for the work with the assistance of Dr. W. J. Wright.”

This shows that progress is being made in the development of the gas and oil fields of New Brunswick and eventually this province may become one of the leading oil areas.
