

Some people claim that all things go in pairs, others that they go in three. This is particularly true in golf.

I often suggest an open stance to players, that is to place the feet so that the right foot is advanced. Many will try this stance but few will use it properly.

It is not enough to stand with the right foot advanced. You must also have your toes in a line that would point at least 15 degrees to the left of your objective. Only by this aiming toward the left can you get the full benefit from this placement of the feet.

This alignment should be followed with all shots.
