Britain is rushing more ships to the Mediterranean.

Hitler has announced that the Jews will no longer be considered German citizens.

Potato shortage in Ontario has driven the price from 65 cents to \$1.35 per bag.

The Ethiopian crisis has caused the British elections to be put off until spring.

Canada's export business in August of this year was almost \$15,000,000 more than in August of last year.

If the Italians wish to succeed in Ethiopia, they must be in Addis Ababa before April, says a newspaper correspondent.

The United States has extended reciprocal tariff concessions to Canada until January 1. These were due to expire October 1.

A strike of 500,000 soft coal workers in 30 of the United States is expected, following failure of negotiations over wage contracts.

Australia has boosted up her budget for defence by about \$6,000,000. The budget was brought down last Monday.

Seven hundred and eleven candidates have been nominated for the coming federal election. This total is the largest in Canadian political history.

Italy will raise about \$1,200,000,000 for war purposes by means of a five per cent. national bond issue, it is reported from Rome.

Plans are under way for aiding Canadian dairymen by facilitating shipments of butter to the United Kingdom, where it appears a favorable market exists.

An international treaty to regulate North Atlantic trawlers has been recommended by the North American Council of Fishery Investigation.

Plans are being made for the inauguration of a transatlantic air-mail service. The service would link Canada and Great Britain.

Hon. Newton W. Rowell, vice-president of the League of Nations Society in Canada, sees no possibility of Canada being asked to prepare for war.

Annexation by Montreal of all municipalities on Montreal Is-

land, with a view to better civic government, has been suggested by a meeting of property owners.

The Nova Scotia schooner *Bluenose* was forced to turn back after leaving England for Canada last week, because of severe storms.

Before the League of Nations recently, Canada pressed for more vigorous efforts at the suppression of the traffic in narcotic drugs.

At least 11 deaths resulted from the worst September storm in three-quarters of a century, which pounded the British Isles and Northwest Europe last week.

War talk and fears of crop failure in the Argentine have caused a flurry in wheat prices at Winnipeg, sending the prices higher than any time since early spring.

The wedding of the Duke of Gloucester, third son of the King, to Lady Alice Montagu-Douglas-Scott, will take place in Westminster Abbey November 6, it has been officially announced.

The federal Department of Agriculture has announced a renewal of its lamb feeding project, whereby western lambs are brought east for feeding and fattening during the winter.

The Canadian Fisheries Association will ask the Government for a grant of \$100,000 to conduct an advertising campaign designed to increase the domestic consumption of fish.

Self-government has been offered the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon off the coast of Newfoundland. For almost three centuries these islands have been ruled by a governor sent out from France.

Drought, grasshopper damage and reduced acreage have practically eliminated the Argentine from the wheat export picture, reports state. The Argentine has been Canada's chief competitor in Europe.

Felix Waitkus, Wisconsin airman, made a forced landing in Ireland after a flight from New York. His objective was Kaunas, Lithuania. The plane was considerably damaged, but the flier was unhurt, in the landing.
