

Around the Maritimes

Fourteen students of Prince of Wales College at Charlottetown, received fourth-year certificates in graduating exercises at the college last week. Among those who graduated with honor diplomas is Richard Brittain, Montreal.

The Investment Dealers' Association of Canada will hold its annual meeting this year at St. Andrews, N.B., from June 22 to June 25, it has been announced. Special trains will carry the delegates to the town.

The S.S. Glendene docked at the mill pier at Dalhousie and is loading a cargo of 1,500 tons of newsprint for Alabama, after which she will sail for Cornerbrook, Newfoundland, where she will load the balance of 4,500 tons for the same destination.

Eighty-six per cent. of the offerings of P.E.I. silver fox pelts have been sold on the London market during two days of last week and losses incurred in the March declines have been recovered, according to word received at Charlottetown.

Preliminary arrangements have been made at Fredericton for a survey of the economics of potato production in the principal producing areas in New Brunswick. It is possible also that the proposed survey may include a market investigation in regard to both marketing costs and outlets.

A plebiscite was held at Shediac last week regarding the adoption of Daylight Saving Time. The vote was in favor of Daylight Saving by a small majority and it is probable that the Town Council will declare the date of its adoption to coincide with the date of adoption of Daylight Saving time in Moncton.

Delegates representing 13 societies and organizations in the town met in the Canadian Legion rooms at Springhill last week to discuss plans for a decoration day at the local cemetery. W. S. McInnis, president of the Canadian Legion, presided. The second Sunday in August has been selected as the most suitable date for decoration day, and another meeting will be held on June 19.

The two rolling mills of the Canadian Car and Foundry Company at Amherst opened on June 4, and the wheel foundry in the same plant got underway at the same time. Sufficient work from Montreal has been guaranteed the rolling mills for at least a month, while operations at the wheel foundry will probably last two months. Approximately 180 men will receive employment.

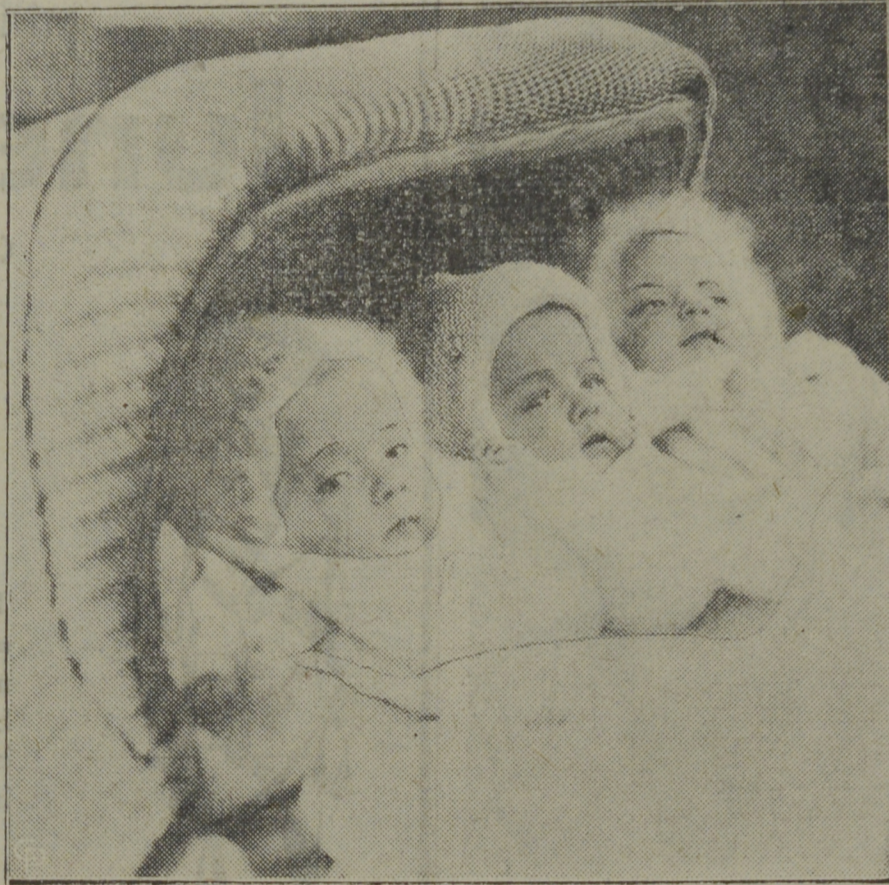
Definitely establishing 35 and 50 cent taxi fares in Saint John city proper, and providing penalties for those who do not adhere to the set charges, a new by-law drawn up by the city solicitor and covering the operation of taxis was presented to the Common Council. Minor amendments will be made in it before it receives final approval. The by-law defines the points between which

rate per passenger is to be 35 cents and between which the rate is to be 50 cents. It provides for an extra charge of 50 cents per trunk.

No developments were reported last Friday in the R.C.M.P. investigation into the shooting of Patrick Dempsey, 23, Becketville, found dead near Jacquet River, Sunday, with bullet wounds in his back and head. Police stated that several people were being questioned and that the area adjacent to where the body was found was being given a minute search, for possible clues, but nothing definite had so far resulted.

The Acton Shoe Company of Acton Vale, Que., and the A. E. Wry-Standard Company, Limited, Amherst, N.S., have been awarded tenders for 5,000 pairs of ankle boots at \$3,074 per pair for distribution to men in relief camps operated by the Department of National Defence. The two companies will divide the order equally. Theirs were the lowest of eight tenders and 14 companies asked to quote did not make any bids.

Cheese And Butter Board Holds Meeting At Sussex, N. B.

Higher Price Than Last Year Obtained For Cheese.

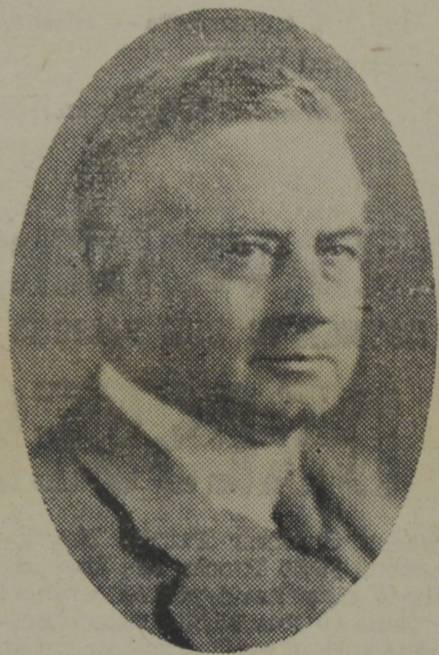
Sussex.—The season's meeting of the New Brunswick Cheese and Butter Board was held in the Agricultural Building here last Thursday with F. H. Lewis, president of the board as auctioneer. A total of 81 boxes of triplets were boarded, all of which sold for 11½ cents per pound, or one-quarter of a cent higher than prevailed at the first meeting last year.

The factories boarding cheese were Cornhill, 31 boxes; Head of Millstream, 10 boxes, and Knightville, 40 boxes. Subsequent meetings will be held in the Board of Trade rooms, Saint John, commencing June 12 and fortnightly thereafter, at 2.15 p.m.

The buyers represented were G. E. Barbour Co., Ltd., Swift Canadian Co., Ltd., and the Eastern Hay and Feed Co., Ltd.
