

Dairying Is To Be Helped In P. E. I. By New Program

Newly Organized Cow-Testing Plan To Cover the Whole Island.

Charlottetown, P. E. I. — Prince Edward Island, already a tuberculosis-free area for cattle, will be made a richer dairying country by organization of a cow-testing program embracing the whole province, the Department of Agriculture has announced.

"During the last week, department officials have been arranging for organization of a number of cow-testing associations in the province," the statement reads. "Present plans provide for the effective linking up of this work in creamery or cheese factory districts, with existing factory organizations.

"The milk samples will be tested at the factory centres, and every effort will be made to give encouragement to the dairy industry. Full particulars will be tabulated for each individual farm where testing services are being conducted, regarding the type and quality of the herd, the breeding practices followed, the kind and quality of crops grown, the rations being fed, and other details in connection with dairy and livestock development.

"With accurate information compiled in this way, individual cases will receive special consideration, and every improvement.

"The establishment of the test should be instrumental in weeding out unprofitable animals and in the application of more effective methods of improvement and lowered costs of production.

"The organization of junior clubs, and the connecting up of the juniors' efforts with the older farmers activities and the creamery organizations into a complete working unit, which includes the cow-testing association, is expected to provide a community enterprise of tremendous influence and importance.

"Definite plans have been constructed by the department in this respect and the deputy minister, W. R. Shaw, and the dairy superintendent, W. L. Brenton, are now in the field, establishing the necessary organizations for more effective development along dairy and livestock lines."

Dairy Commission Holds Meeting At Fredericton, N. B.

Applications Concerning The Products Act Are Dealt With.

Fredericton—The New Brunswick Dairy Products Commission concluded its two-day meeting here last Thursday after receiving a petition from milk dealers and producers in the Fredericton area to have the Dairy Products' Act become effective in this area.

In addition, a delegation of the producers from this area met with the Commission, suggesting that representative dealers and producers from here be permitted to appear together before the Commission to express their views. This was arranged for, and the Commission was scheduled to meet in Fredericton again for this purpose on June 5 at 2.00 p.m., it was stated by the chairman, Dr. L. A. Donovan, of Saint John.

A check is being made to ascertain if the necessary two-thirds of the dealers, producers and factory owners in the Fredericton area have petitioned to have the Act become operative here. Dr Donovan pointed out that after a petition has been received and approved by the Commission, notice to this effect must appear in two weekly issues of the Royal Gazette before the Act becomes effective in that specified area. The Commission has approved a petition from the Saint John area.

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Council Of Digby To Negotiate With Gov't. Re Paving

Desire To Have Permanent Surface on Town's Main Street.

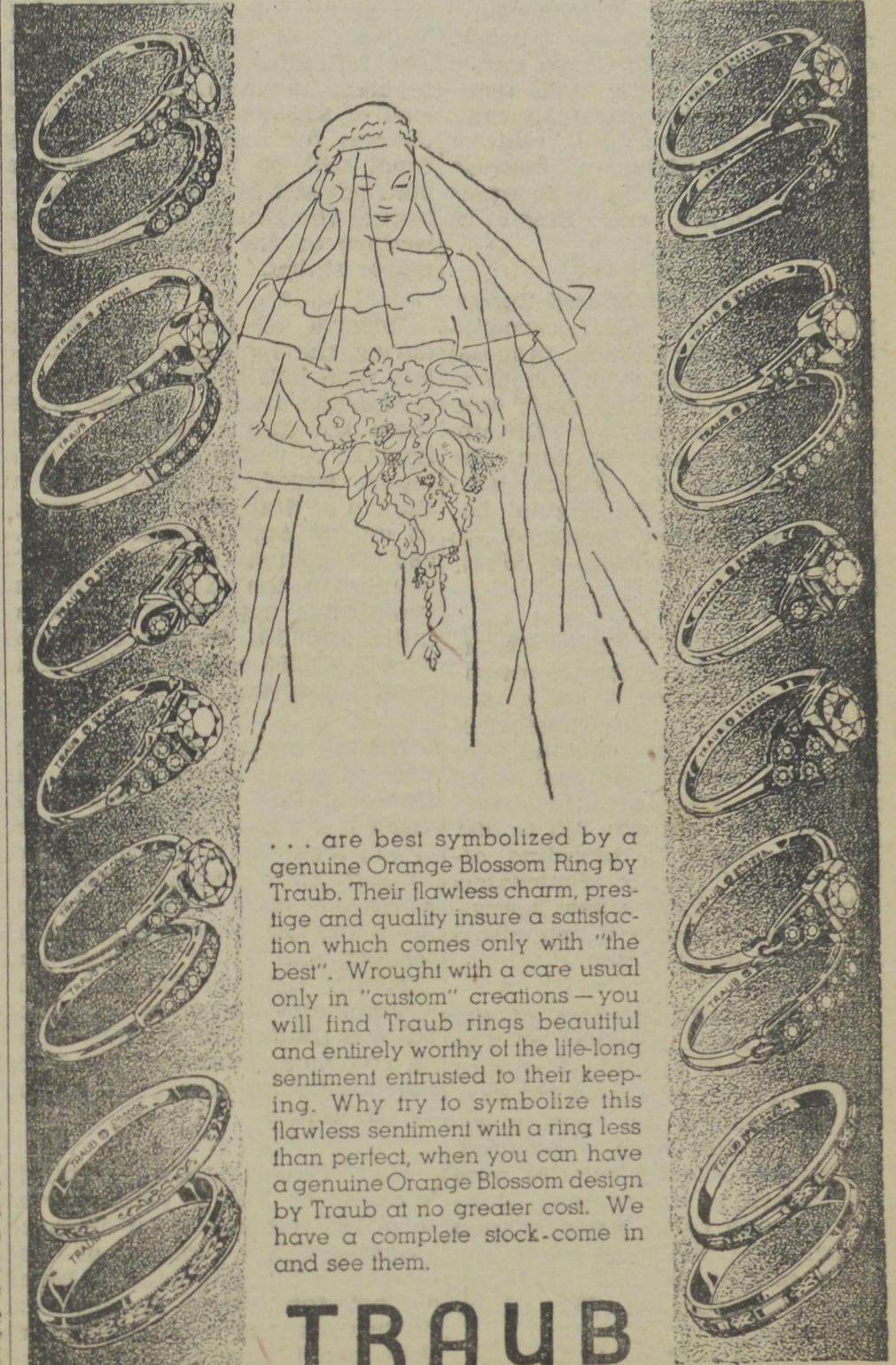
Digby.—A resolution has been passed by Town Council authorizing the streets committee to negotiate with the Highway's Department for the paving of the main street, and if possible, have work start immediately. This work is to be done on a 50-50 basis. A motion was also passed that the committee investigate further hard surfacing with the type of road used in the town of Kentville for another two and one-half miles of the town streets, this work to be paid for by the town.

Rev. T. W. Hodgson, president; J. M. Wallis, secretary, and Austin L. Robbins, agent of the Digby Children's Aid Society, spoke. Rene Richard addressed the council in connection with the condition of the sewers in a section of Maiden Lane, this matter with the matter of another sewer at the Racquette will be referred to the medical health officer. Permission was granted for construction of three buildings within the town limits.

Superintendent of streets and water reported laying of twenty-four-inch pipe for the purpose of carrying off surface water; the planting of thirty maple trees, filling in the hollow between Roop's dry goods store and Baxter's barber shop and cleaning the north end dump. He also reported cleaning approximately 12,000 feet of the main water line. A resolution from the municipality of Lunenburg re the collection of hospital accounts was deferred. A motion that the town council take action for license against transient meat peddlars was passed.

Town solicitor E. L. Theriault reported the settlement of the matter of the jail bill over which the town and municipality have been at loggerheads for some time. The bill was settled on a

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fifty-fifty basis, each party to pay its own costs. He also reported the bidding in of the estate of the late Walter Wright, which was sold at auction a short time ago. At the request of Chief of Police Thibeault a motion was passed authorizing signs to be placed at the entrances of the town to give warning of a twenty-mile speed limit in town. Another motion was passed that a stop sign be erected at the Church Street and First Avenue corner.

COLORED HIGHWAYS

Colored road surfaces may help to prevent motoring accidents in this country in future.

Experiments have shown that marigold-colored surfaces not only eliminate sun glare but give good visibility by day and night. Stretches of marigold road have

already been laid in various districts in England, and the Ministry of Transport has approved experiments made with them.

Brown and green road surfaces are also being tried. The difficulty of providing colored cement with lasting properties of a kind suitable for road surfacing has been overcome by experts.

Colored roads, it has been found, make it possible for white lines and pedestrian crossing places to be easily distinguished.
