

It's a Cruel World For Miss Keul

Refused Admission To Canada

Actress Goes Back To Shanghai on Freighter From Vancouver, B. C.

Vancouver.—After being the "guest" of Canadian immigration authorities in Vancouver for more than a month, Gertrud Keul will sail on a freighter for Shanghai. An actress who has made appearances in many European cities under the name of Mary Kid, she was refused admission to Canada, although authorities offered to grant her permission to cross the Dominion en route to Europe.

Miss Keul's troubles really started at Honolulu when the Empress of Asia docked on her way from the Orient. She had boarded the liner at Shanghai, expecting to be able to proceed through Vancouver to Hollywood, where she planned to visit Marlene Dietrich, the well-known German star, and Michel Curtes, a director for whom she played in Germany.

The United States immigration department didn't favor her jaunt to the movie centre, however, and turned thumbs down on her application.

Miss Keul left Paris in October and travelled via the Suez to the Orient, where she visited friends in Shanghai. Then she came on to Canada. Now she will return via the Suez to her homeland, her dreams of Hollywood — and a chance at the American films shattered.

and eastern capital has been interested in the project.

The \$2,500,000 refinery will be constructed over a period of three years, International, an all-Canadian-British concern having an advantage by holding the separation process patent over its Denver, Colo. rival, which is proceeding with preliminary work on the river.

The plant will operate nine months of the year and the distributing point for its product will be Edmonton.

Show Rich Deposits

One of the principal results of the extraction of a number of by-products will be the possibility of lower prices for kerosene, gasoline, various lubricating oils and greases, points and varnishes. A medicinal product of great value to the treatment of skin diseases, called ichthulene, which sells for \$2 per pound, will be one of the main sources of production to the company. The first unit going up this year will allow for production of 162,000 pounds of ichthulene.

Samples of the bitumen brought from McMurray sand banks so far have been taken from the deposits at "Bitumount" and are of very high grade, according to Prof. K. A. Clarke of the University of Alberta research council.

"The deposits," he said, "are of the richest I have ever examined. They are readily adapted for easy and inexpensive separation and are close to the surface, right on the river banks."

Col. J. K. "Peace River Jim" Cornwall, authorities at the University of Alberta, Dominion Government experts and the Alberta Trade Commission office are enthusiastic over the commercial development this year of the McMurray tar sand fields which have lain unexploited ever since the Northern Alberta Railways put the steel north to Waterways, the hopping off point on the Athabasca River of Mackenzie River basin water transportation.

thought of leadership, which is probably the greatest question of the present campaign.

The people of New Brunswick favor bold and effective government measures, but they themselves shall be the free and dominant judges of these measures.

What is really wanted in this province is that party men shall play the part of statesmanlike leaders, standing true to their principles and being ready in the presence of an emergency to cooperate for the common good. They should not show a shallow readiness to "say anything" to win a few votes. They should always keep in mind their very great responsibility as chosen leaders of the people, a busy and sometimes an easily misled people. There are things they should

not say, even if it might be popular. There should be cheap and easy criticisms which they should scorn to make use of. A public man should be as responsible as the best of clergymen. They must be aware of the responsibilities of power and influence.

No one in this country of British traditions wishes to do away with the party system of government, but the members of the parties should have a full realization of their responsibilities and be influenced by them.

The voters of New Brunswick must measure the leaders. They must measure the candidates generally and then cast their votes in accord with their decision as to which leader they believe the better qualified to carry on the public business. They must choose between Tilley and Dysart.

"It must be remembered that the Soviet Union is encircled by capitalism," says Pravda. "Spies, terrorists and deceivers, sent by the secret service of certain countries, try to use their poisoned weapons. There are still hidden counter-revolutionary Trotskyists, White Guards and Zinovieffists. It must be remembered that they attempt to enter the party ranks to strike at the proletarian cause. The party must be put in order."

Dissolution of the Society of Old Bolsheviks in Soviet Russia serves to emphasize the radical changes that have occurred in recent years in the composition of the Communist dictatorship and the relegation to political impotence of Lenin's "old Bolshevik guard."

With Leon Trotsky in exile abroad and most of his active supporters either removed from office, in jail or in exile in remote parts of Russia, and men like Leo Kameneff and Gregory Zinovieff imprisoned for their alleged responsibility in the assassination of Sergei Kiroff, member of the Political Bureau; with others, like Alexei Rykoff and Mikhail Tomsky, stripped of their former political power, not many of the men who played leading roles in the Bolshevik revolution of November, 1917, now occupy places of prominence in the dictatorship in Soviet Russia.

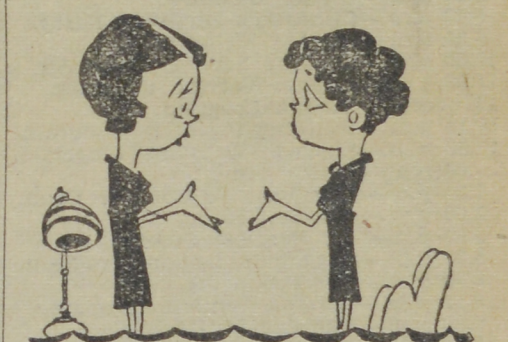

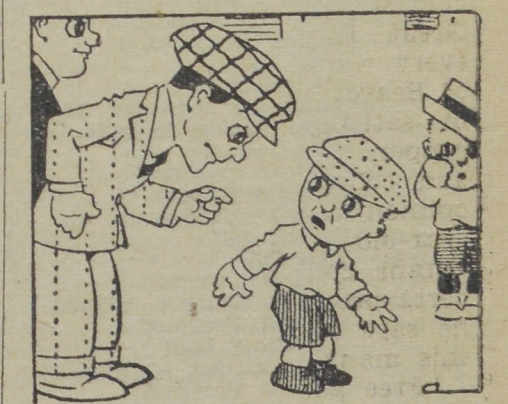
other types of food, and air conditioning can no more cater to the unusual and eccentric than other living requirements.

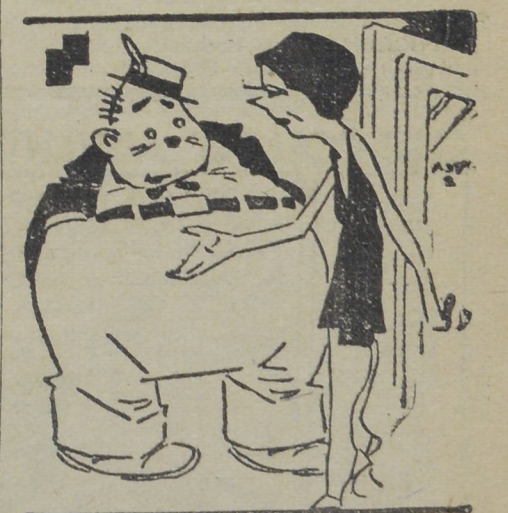
