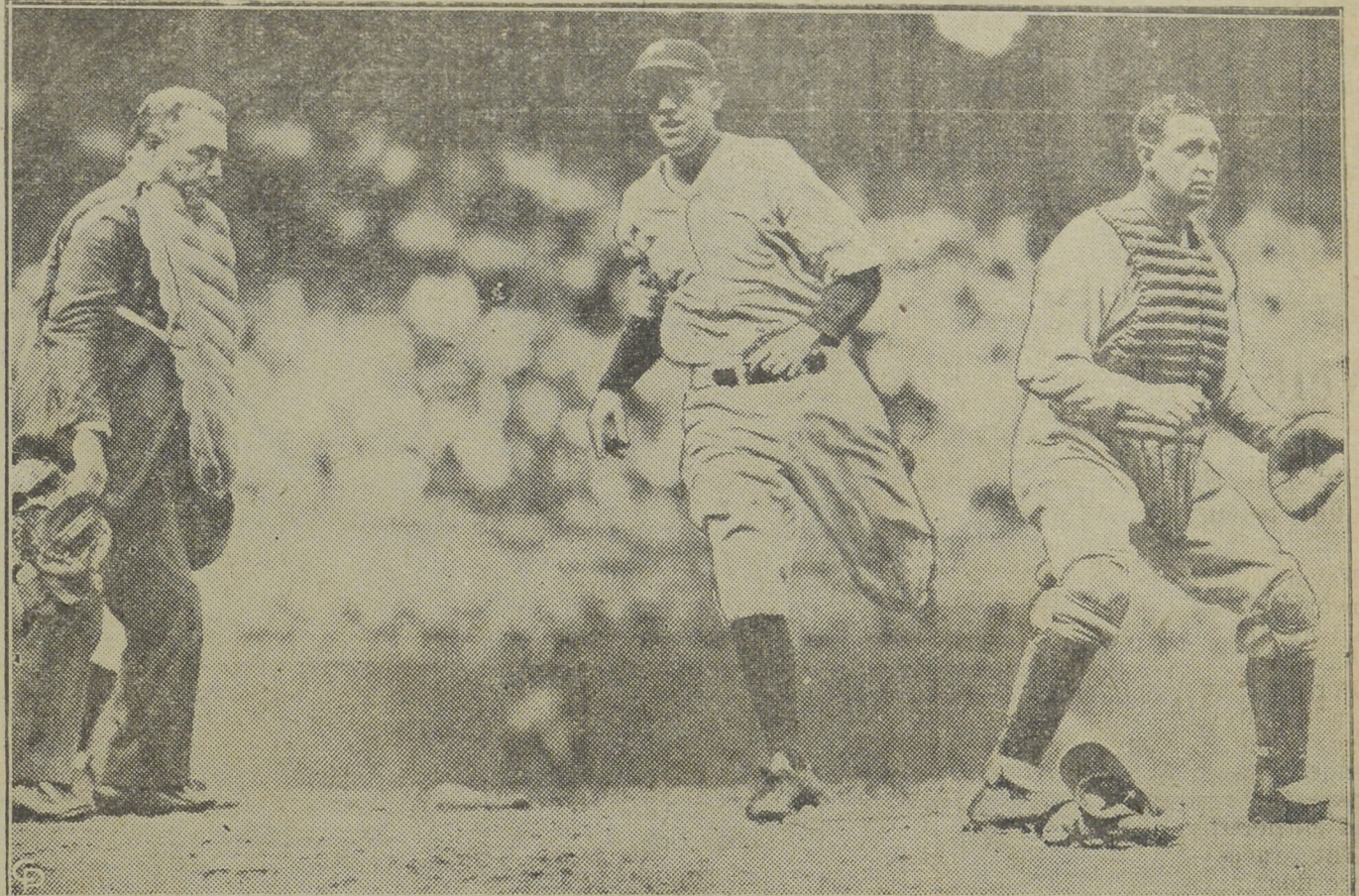

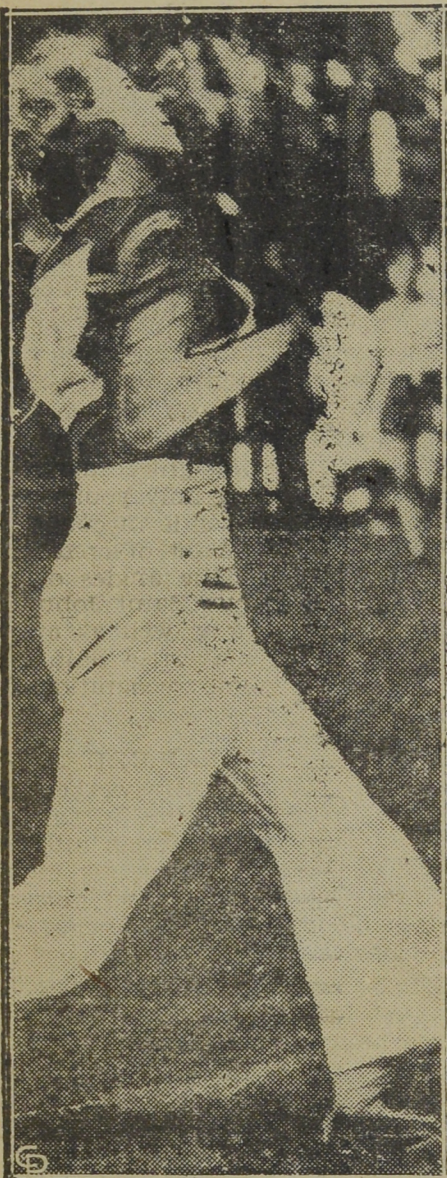
BLONDY RYAN, AS YANKEE, UP TO HIS OLD TRICKS

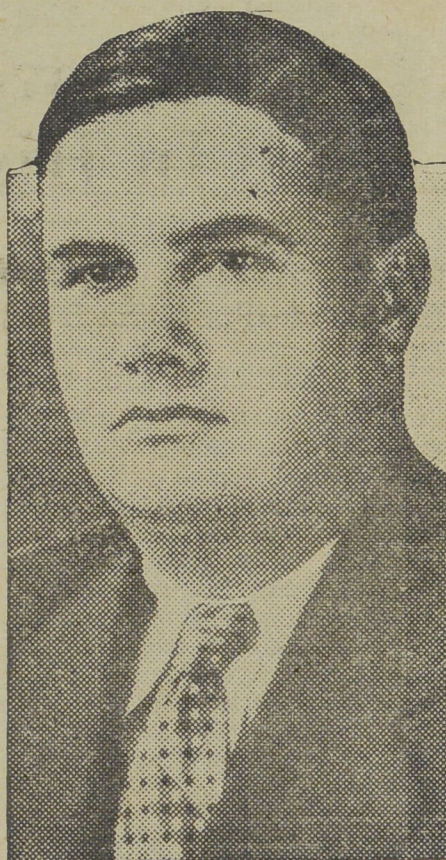
New Discus Record

The oldest racing plant in use in America is the famous course in Lexington, Ky. It was established in 1826.

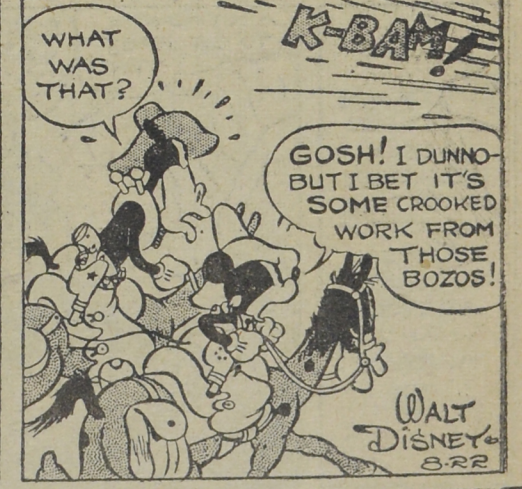
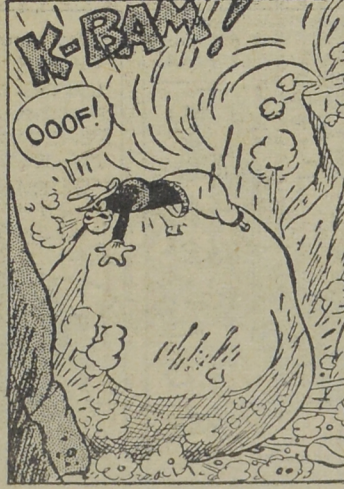
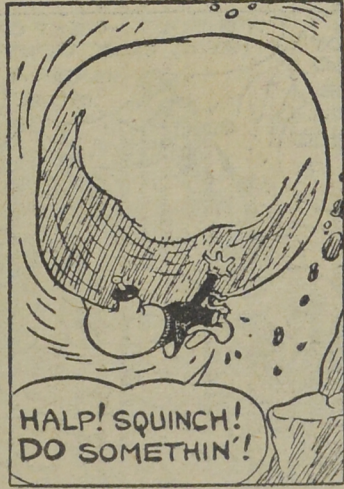
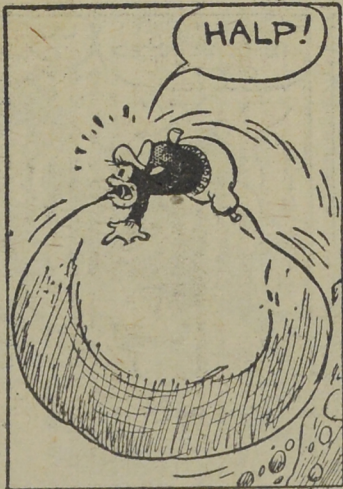
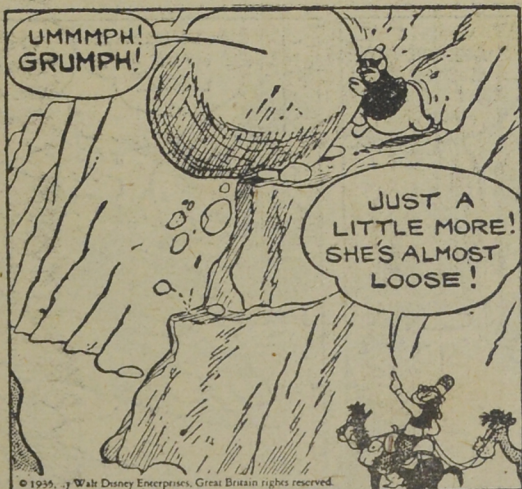
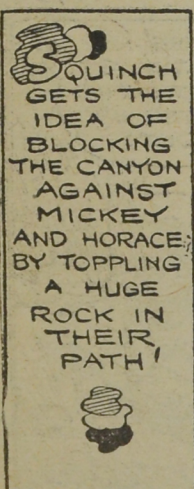
