OLYMPIC PRICE SHIELD

Berlin. — The Reich commissioner for price regulation is taking measures designed to prevent profiteering at the expense of vis-

itors to the Olympic games in Germany next year. He has given special powers of price regulation to the Bavarian Government as responsible for Munich and for Garmisch-Partenkirchen, where the four Olympic winter games will begin in February, to the state commissioner for Berlin where the field games take place in August, and to the district governor of Schleswig Holstein, within whose jurisdiction the Olympic sailing matches will be contested at Kiel, also in August.

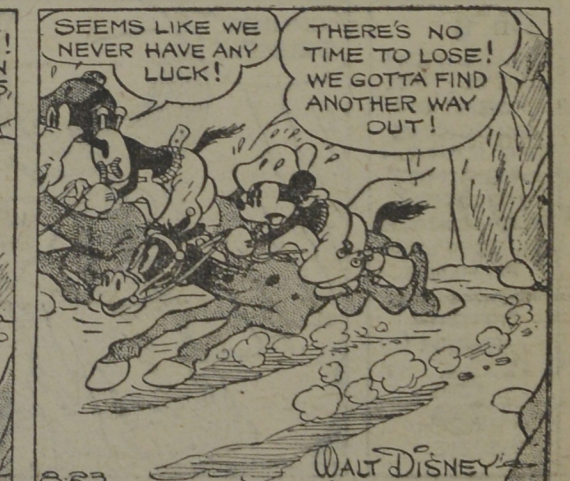
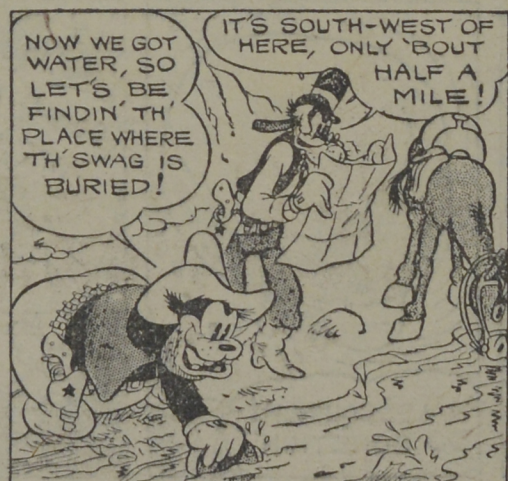
