The superiority of a good pro over a good amateur is supposed to come through the pro's willingness to gamble on shots—his readiness to take a chance where the amateur would be conservative.

I doubt this very much, for there's a big difference between gambling on a shot and playing boldly. An example of taking a chance is shooting for a narrow patch of fairway or green. Any player may get a favorable result once or twice, but it isn't in the cards to get consistently good results under such conditions. Even if the pressure of having to shoot straight doesn't affect your swing, chances are the ball will not land just right and consequently roll into trouble.

It's always best to place yourself in the position of an aeroplane pilot looking for a safe landing. Safe landings require plenty of space in which to stop the ball.


