

Violations Of The Sunday Closing Law Are Discussed

Amherst Council Criticizes Government For Slowness in Prosecuting.

Slowness of the Attorney-General's Department in permitting prosecution of Amherst stores that were evading the Sunday closing law, was openly criticized by Councillors E. T. Hunter and James Hogan at Amherst last week at the regular meeting of the town council after recorder A. G. MacKenzie had explained that it was necessary to secure permission from the department before prosecutions could be started.

Councillor MacDonald took some exception to the attitude of the council in enforcing this law as he felt that there was no more harm in selling bread, milk and groceries than in selling five gallons of gasoline on Sunday.

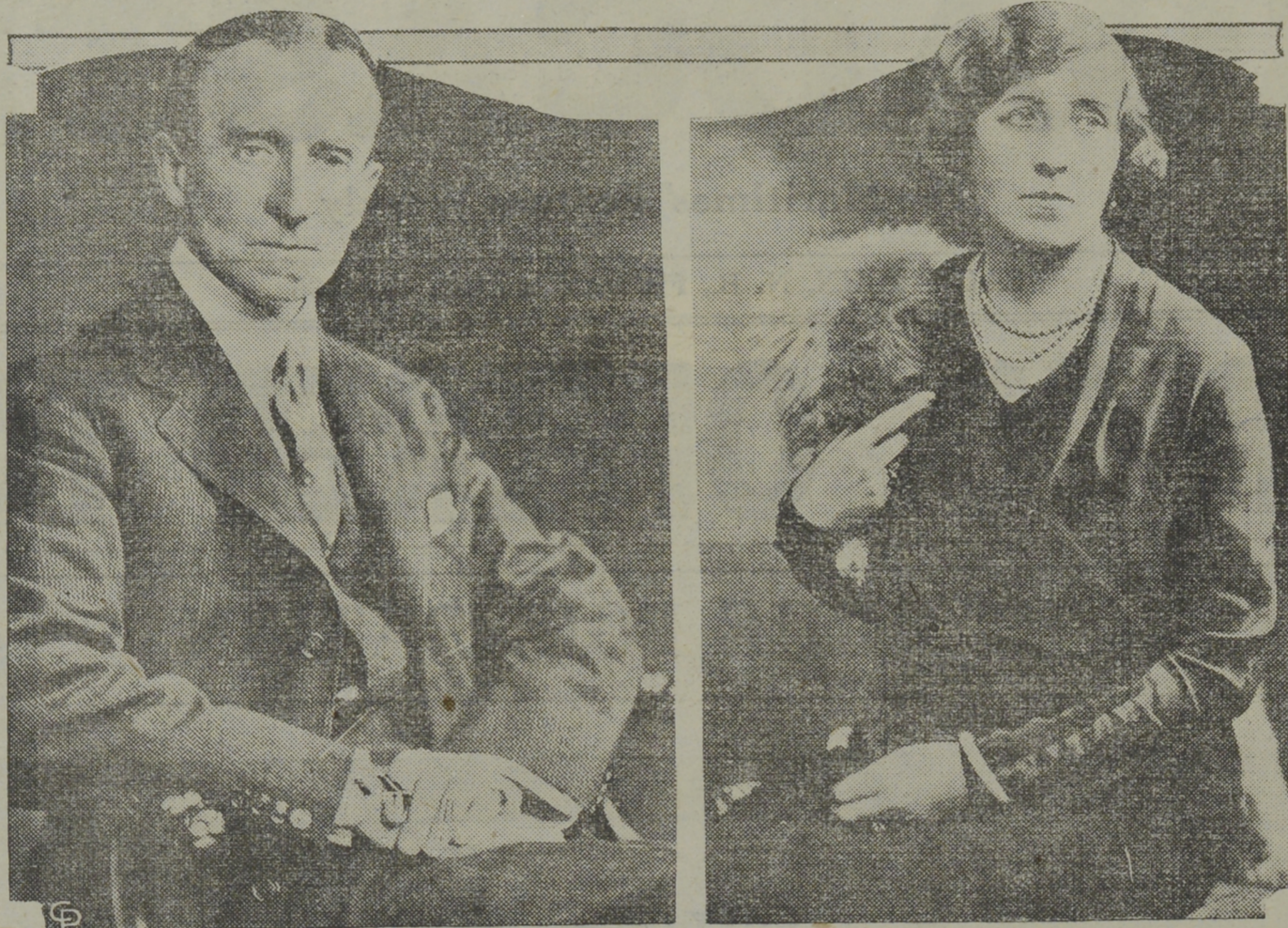
