

Seven New Bridges Under Contract In New Brunswick

Work on These Projects To Be Commenced at Once.

Fredericton, N.B. — Contracts for the construction of seven new highway bridges on the Provincial highway system have been approved by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works for New Brunswick. These undertakings are calculated to improve the alignments and grades of the structures which they are to replace.

Without exception the contracts were let to New Brunswick firms and work is to commence on all seven projects in the near future. While the new bridges will give material improvement to the provincial highways, the work represented by their construction will prove a considerable benefit to many of the working population in the various sections adjacent to the scenes of building.

The contracts as let with approximate prices, are as follows:

Linden Bridge, Kings County, to Stephen Bros., of Saint John. Approximate price, \$11,000.

Cairns Brook Bridge, Saint John County, to George Christie, Fredericton, \$2,000.

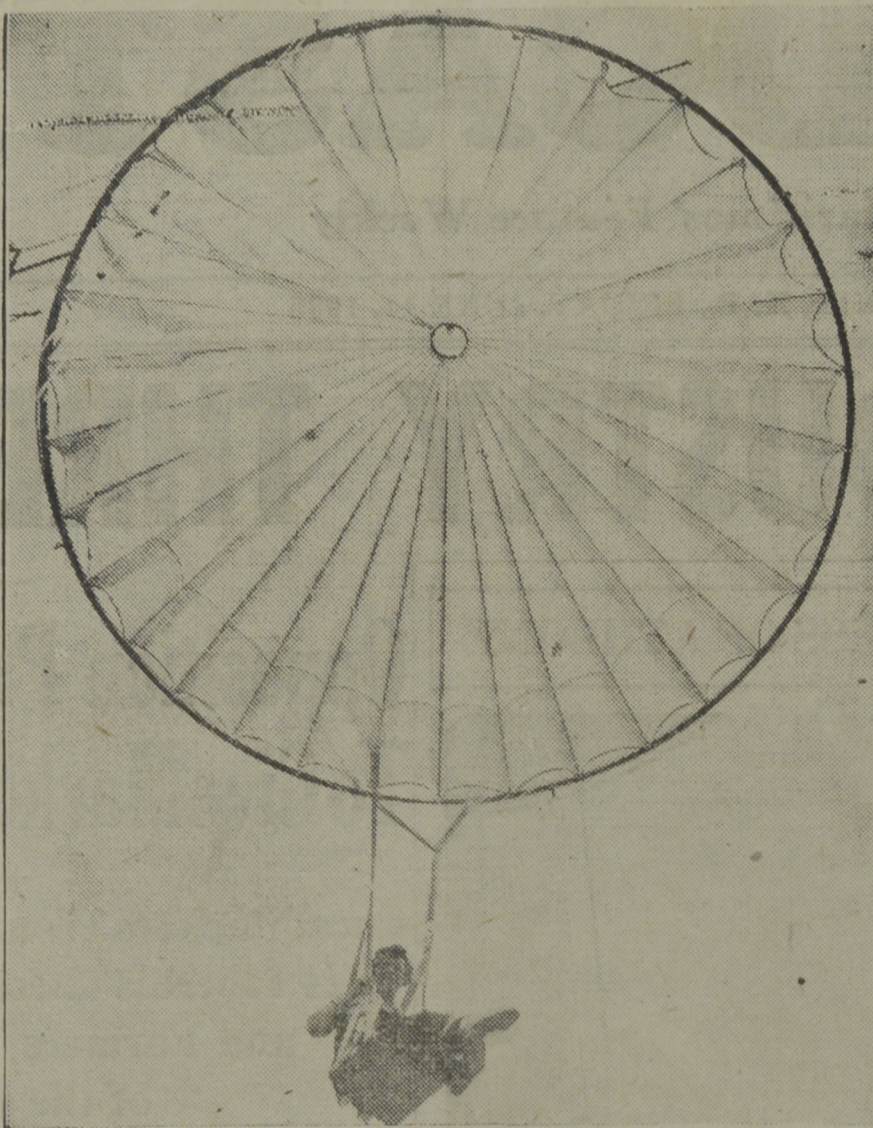
Ullock Bridge, Northumberland County, to Canada Construction Company, Fredericton, \$9,000.

Christopher Brook Bridge, Restigouche County, to Olts and McNabb, Fredericton, \$13,000.

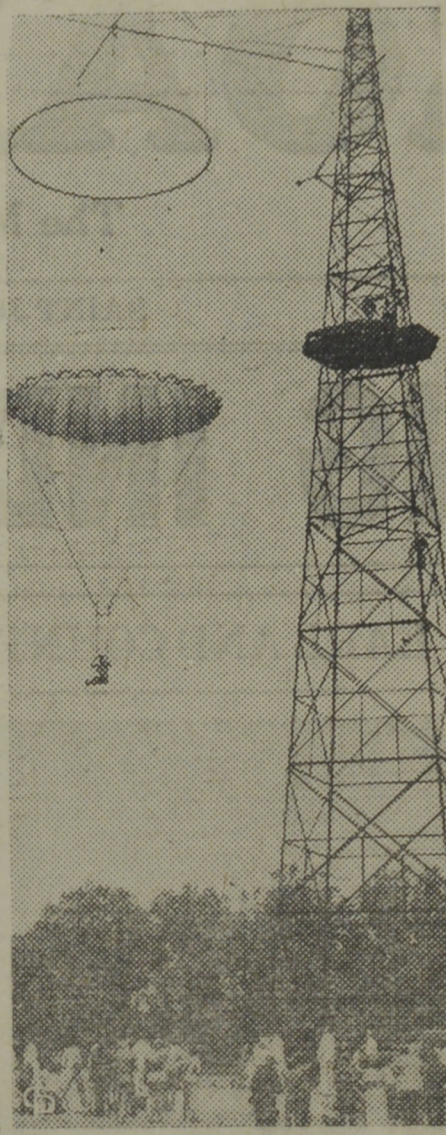
Taymouth Bridge, York County, to L. B. Smith, West Saint John, \$16,000.

World Congress In London Is One Big Event Of The Year

The Scientific Management of Business and Industries Will Be Discussed.

One of the events of Jubilee year is the Sixth International Congress for Scientific Management in London to be opened by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales at the Central Hall, Westminster, on July 15. This congress is supported by some hundreds of industrial, agricultural and women's organizations, and more than one thousand people from all parts of the world have already signified that they will be present.

The members are now receiving the two hundred papers issued in six volumes on the manufacturing, agricultural, distribution, educational, development and domestic sections. These volumes will form a most valuable addition to any library.

The receptions by the Government and the Lord Mayor and City of London will be at Lancaster House and the Guildhall respectively. The banquet will be at Grosvenor House. Members of the Domestic Section and wives of members will receive an invitation to a reception by Mrs. Baldwin at 11 Downing Street.

Any person interested in management will be cordially welcomed at the Congress, the fee being two guineas, which entitles the member to all the volumes of papers and to receive invitations to the splendid functions arranged.

The Congress affords a magnificent opportunity for business men and others not only to discuss subjects of considerable importance, but to meet some two thousand others having similar interests, and to see a large number of well organized British factories.

Tours have been arranged to factories covering many industries in all parts of England. At each factory a specially prepared explanation will be given of some plan of management.

For those whose interests are more concerned with agriculture or the home an equally attractive program has been prepared.

GOVERNMENT PARTY STANDARD BEARERS IN KINGS COUNTY

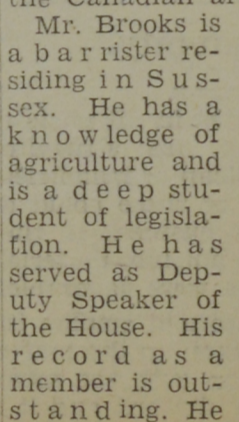
Experienced Men Are Needed in the Legislature in These Times.

J. H. A. L. Fairweather

Mr. Fairweather has been in the House since the elections of 1930 and is considered one of the keenest members. His close scrutiny of legislation and his interest in the progress of the Province has marked him as a legislator of the right sort. He served overseas during the Great War with the Canadian artillery.



A. J. Brooks

Mr. Brooks is a barrister residing in Sussex. He has a knowledge of agriculture and is a deep student of legislation. He has served as Deputy Speaker of the House. His record as a member is outstanding. He also served in France during the Great War with the 26th Battalion.



Hanford Drummond

Mr. Drummond is an outstanding farmer in the County of Kings. He also has been engaged in lumbering. He has had much experience as a member of the Kings County council and this experience will be valuable to him when he sits as a member of the next Legislature at Fredericton.

FRIEND OF HEIRESS FINED FOR IMPORTING GIFT DRESS

Folkestone, England. — Dresses which were a gift from Princess Alexis Mdivani, formerly Miss Barbara Hutton, the Woolworth heiress, were the subject of a customs prosecution at Folkestone recently.

Mrs. Evelyn Violet Jean Kennerley of Royal Avenue, Chelsea, S.W., was fined \$1,058 for attempting to evade duties on 14 dresses, seven hats, two pairs of shoes and two handbags. The fine represented the single value and duty on the articles.

Mrs. Kennerley was taken to the chief preventive officer, to whom she said: "Princess Alexis Mdivani, who gave them to me, is very wealthy, and when I buy one frock she buys 30 or 40. She would wear them once or twice, and then give them to me. We are great friends," said the accused.

Sir S. Worthington Evans, for Mrs. Kennerley, said she went to Paris on November 13 as a guest at a birthday party which the princess was giving.

The princess had verified the story of these gifts.
