

Around the Maritimes

The annual convention of the Maritime Professional Photographers will be held in Sackville on July 1, it has been announced. A fine program has been planned for the occasion.

A new schedule of long distance rates has been put into effect by the New Brunswick Telephone Co., following a meeting of the New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities.

Notice of the following incorporation was contained in a recent issue of Canada Gazette: Morlais Corporation, Ltd., \$10,000, with headquarters at Charlottetown.

Certain changes in the curriculum are announced by Mount Allison University for the coming year. The changes are designed to bring the curriculum more definitely in line with modern theories of education, it was stated.

Nicholas Markadonis, of Glace Bay, charged with the murder of his brother's wife, Mrs. Cleo Markadonis, and who was granted a new trial by the Supreme Court, will appear at Sydney at the opening of the Supreme Court session on June 25.

A \$20,000 issue of Truro bonds, yielding 3½ per cent., brought a bid of 100.27 from the Acadia Trust Company, the town council has announced. Eastern Securities, with a bid of 99.60, and Royal Securities 99.26 were next in line. Acadia Securities were awarded the issue.

The season for lobster fishing in the Yarmouth district ended last Monday, and shipments to the New England markets may be made up till Friday. This is in accordance with the announcements of the ten-day extension made by Ottawa at the end of May.

The Fredericton branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association has been busy, of late weeks, stocking waters in the central part of the province with trout fry. Up to the end of May some 320,000 fry have been distributed and more are being placed.

Charlottetown city police were on guard last week at the railway wharf after hoodlums opened a potato bombardment on members of the crew of the French cruiser Ville d'Ys, in port on an official visit. Lieutenant-Governor DeBlois was officially visiting the cruiser at the time. Police state there was no provocation for the attack.

The Devon Town Council, at a special meeting last Thursday, awarded a contract for laying three miles of asphaltic concrete surface pavement in the town to the Fredericton construction firm of Currier and Seymour, Ltd., which submitted unit prices, acceptable to the council. Total cost of the project to the rate-payers of Devon will be in the vicinity of \$25,000.

The Tariff Board of Canada will sit at Halifax Thursday and Friday, June 20 and 21 and Saturday, June 22, if necessary, to enquire into the price of gasoline and automobiles in this section, it was announced by Hon. A. S. MacMillan, Minister of Highways for Nova Scotia after he had been in receipt of a telegram from George H. Sedgewick, chairman of the Board. The sittings will be held in the Province House.

E. J. White, Bathurst, was re-elected president of the Maritime Branch of the Canadian Postmasters Association in a meeting at Amherst last week, while J. H. T. Nicholson, Sydney Mines, was re-elected vice-president and C. R. Dooe, Dorchester, secretary-treasurer. Executive: A. R. Read, Rockingham Station; Alick Taylor, Saint John; W. J. Gaynor, Chatham; J. G. McInnis, Borden, P.E.I., and J. W. Merkle, Digby.

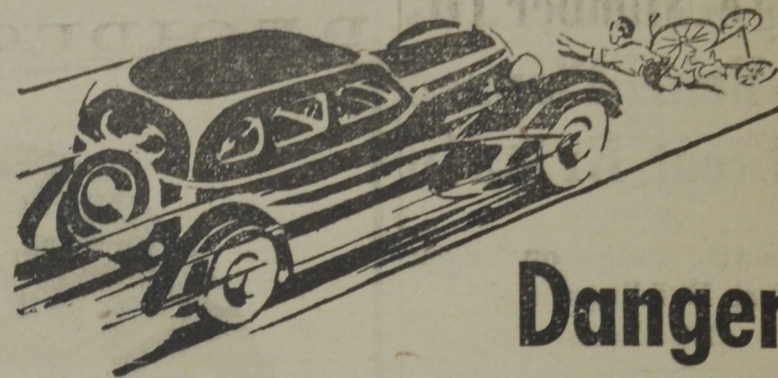
Sam B. Chute, Berwick, largest single producer of apples in Canada, generally known as Nova Scotia's apple king, is absolutely opposed to the Nova Scotia marketing scheme. Definite declara-

tion to this effect was made by Mr. Chute, when he was informed that June 10 is the dead line set by the Dominion Marketing Board for reception of objections, suggestions or protests on the marketing scheme submitted by representatives of Nova Scotia to the Governor-in-Council for the Dominion of Canada.

Fishermen of Digby Neck and Long and Briar Islands are circulating a petition to be presented to both Federal and Provincial Governments. The fishermen are asking a bonus of 20 cents per cwt. on hake and pollock, 10 cents to be paid by each government. The petition states that for the last five years fishermen have not been able to earn enough to purchase necessary gear, or keep their boats in condition. It argues that they should receive 50 cents per hundredweight to meet expenses, and that the market price is much below this figure.

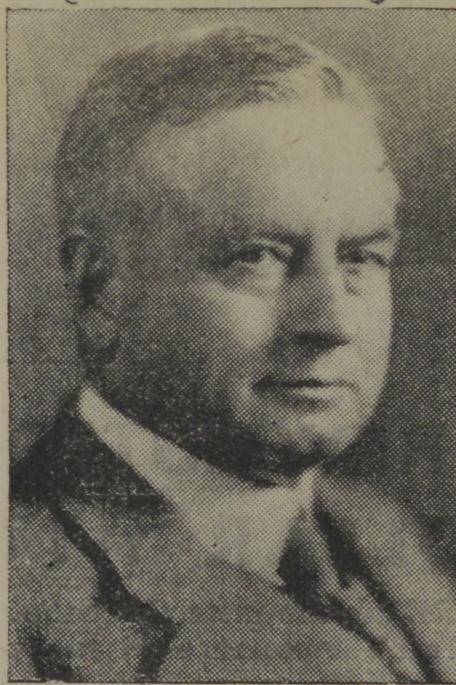
