AUSTRALIA CLINCHED A victory over France in the European zone Davis Cup Eliminations when Jack Crawford, the No. 1 Australian player, defeated Christian Boususs of France, 2-6, 6-4, 3-6, 9-7.

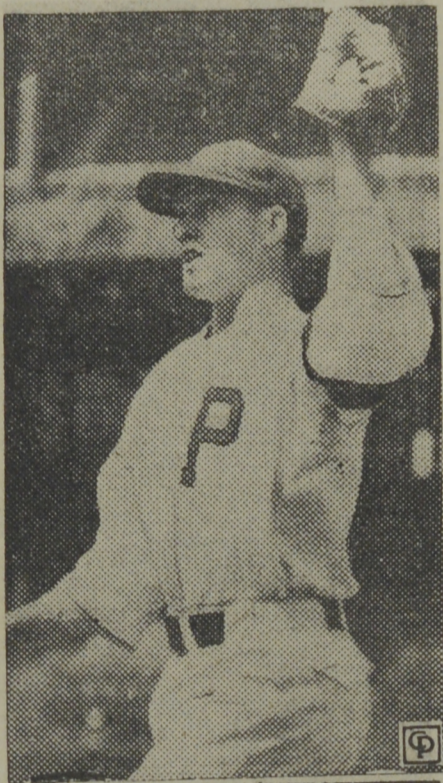
Europe next winter with the Olympic team.

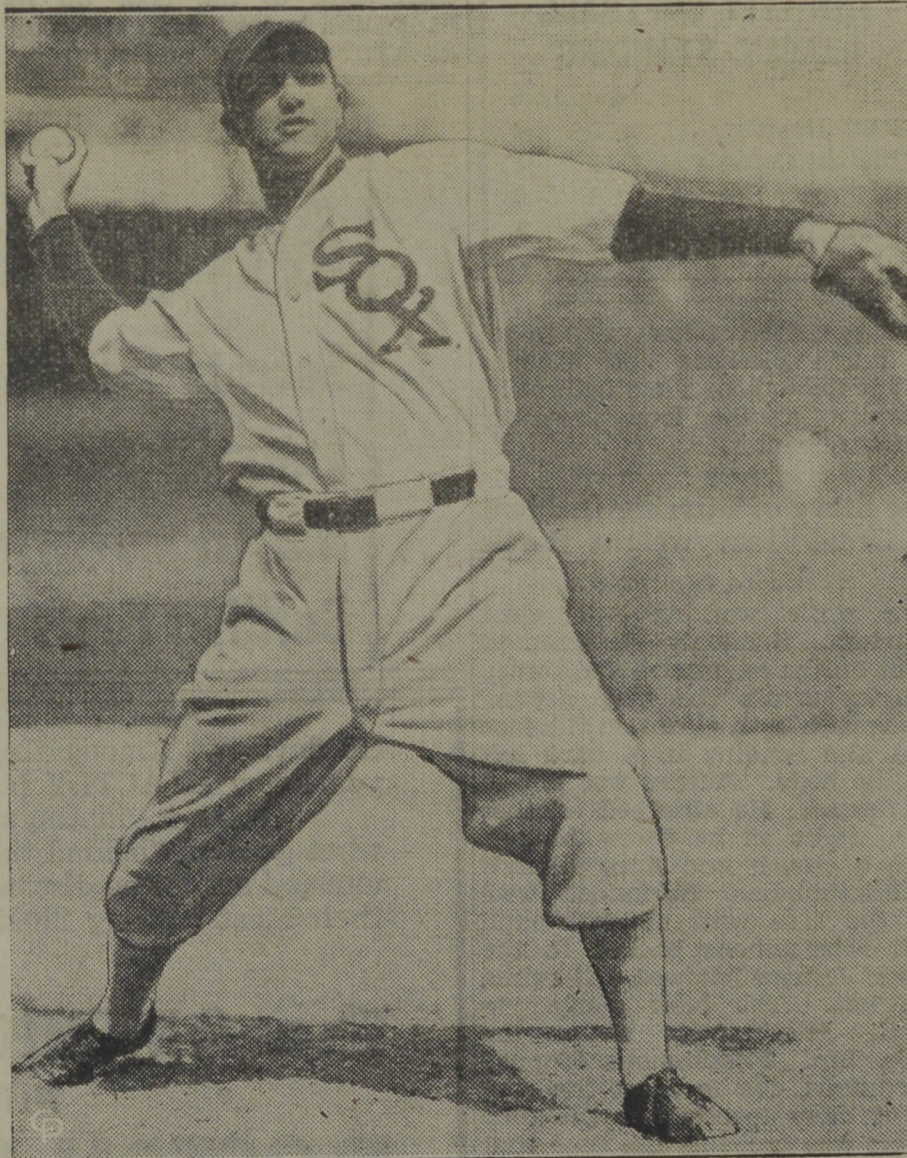

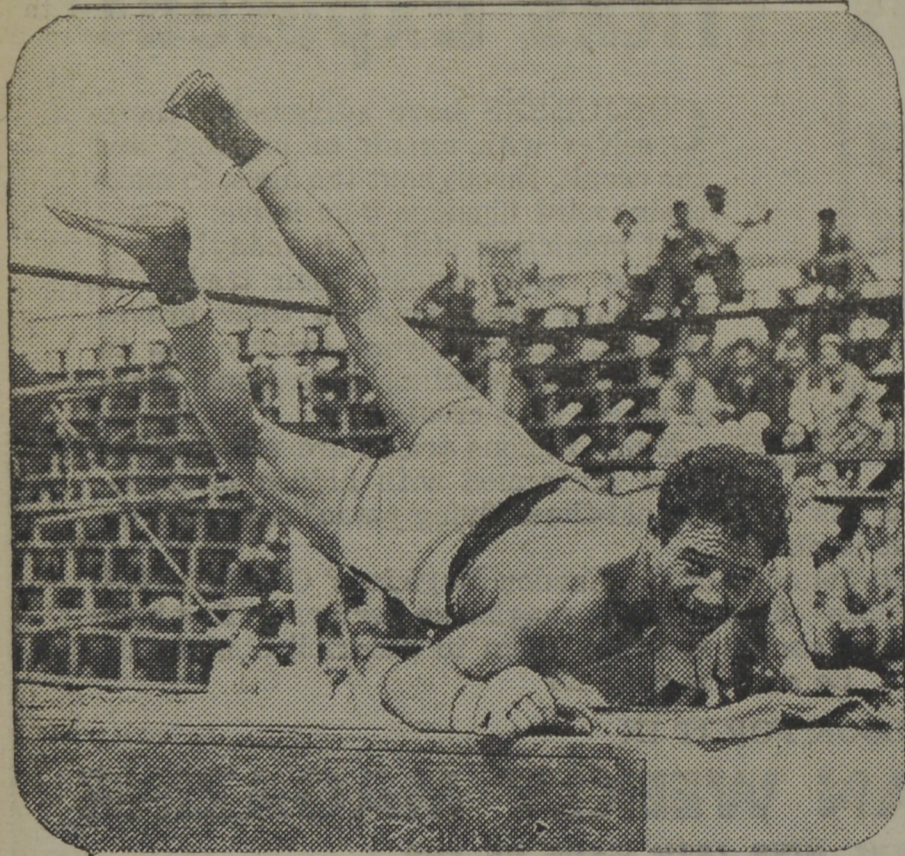

WHITE SOX HEAVING WELL

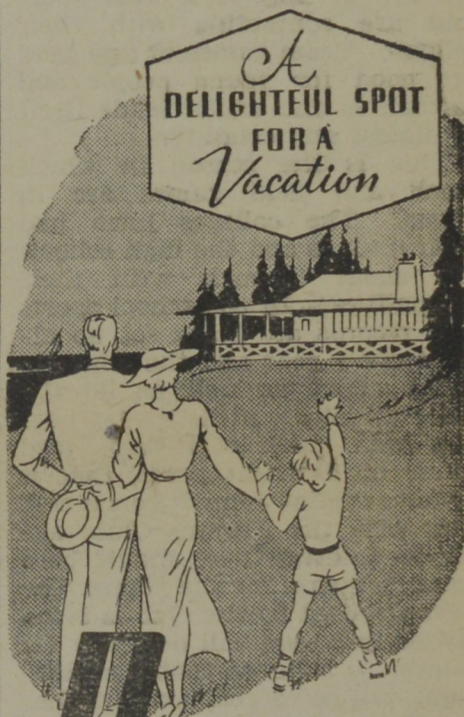

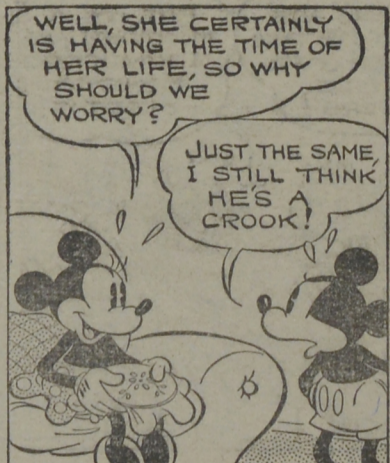
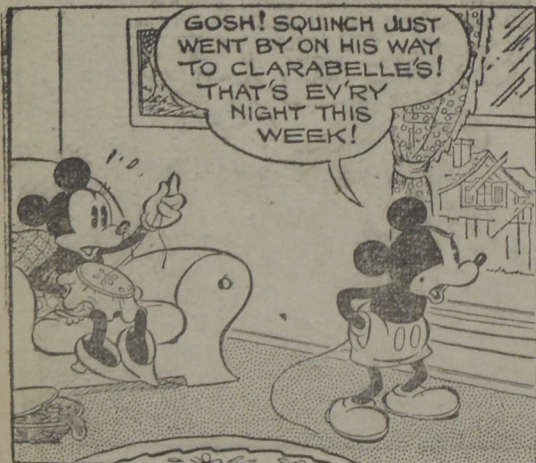
