Talk heard in the street would indicate that there are many views in regard to the City taking over the Power Company. There are many arguments both for and against the proposition. But there are a great many who say that if the price is right it would be well to purchase. But what is the right price? And who is to decide? If the City Commissioners, with what information they have available, are unable to decide what to ask the voters, certainly the citizens are in no position to answer the question. Maybe some citizen has the key to this problem.

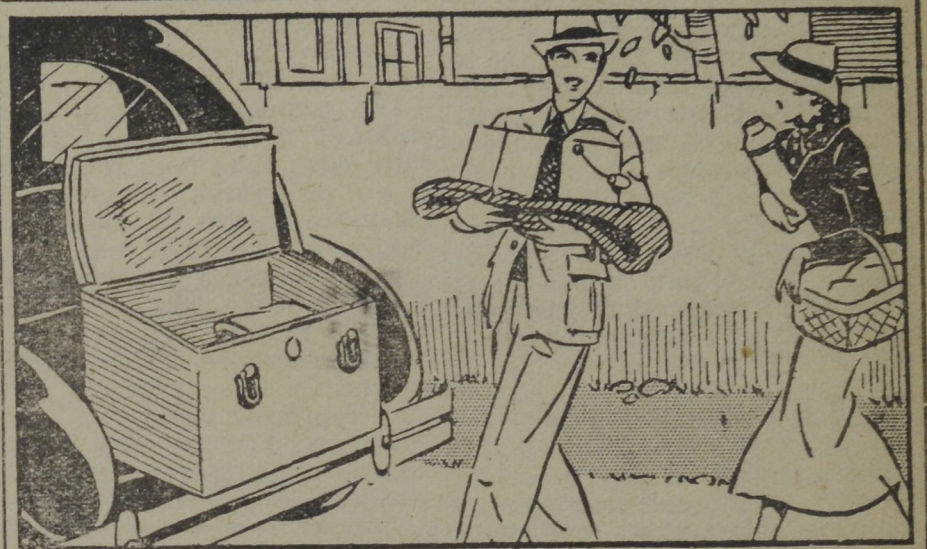

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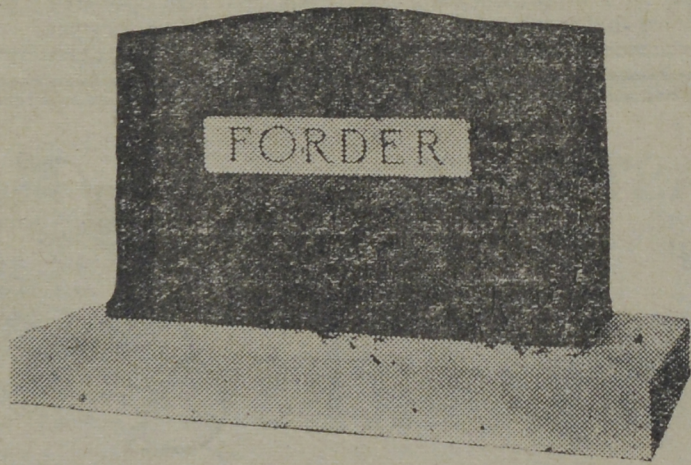
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
