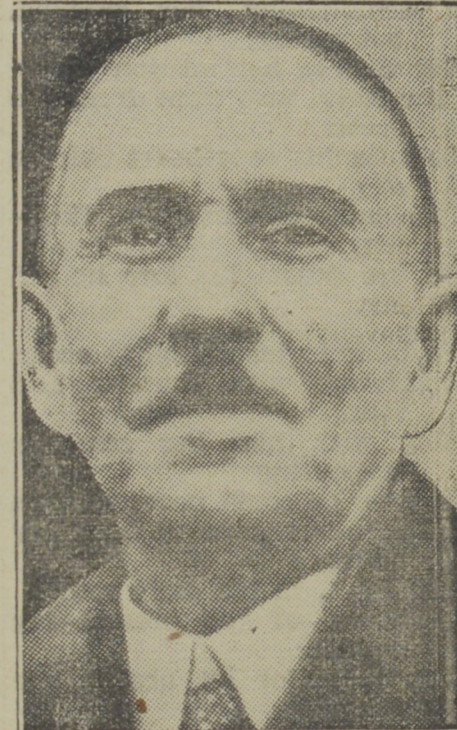
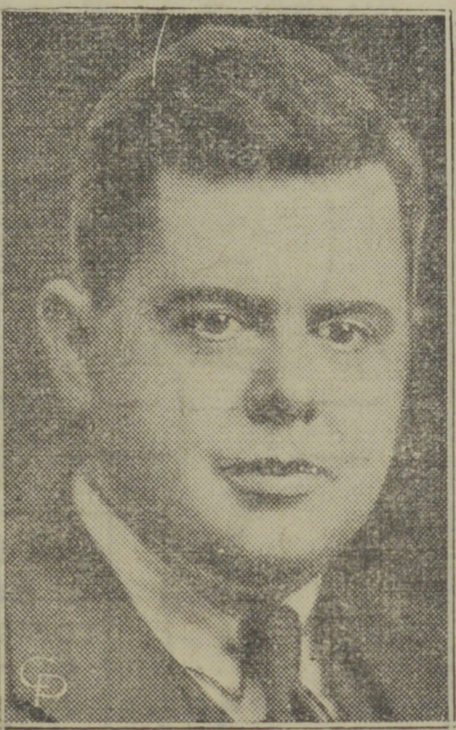
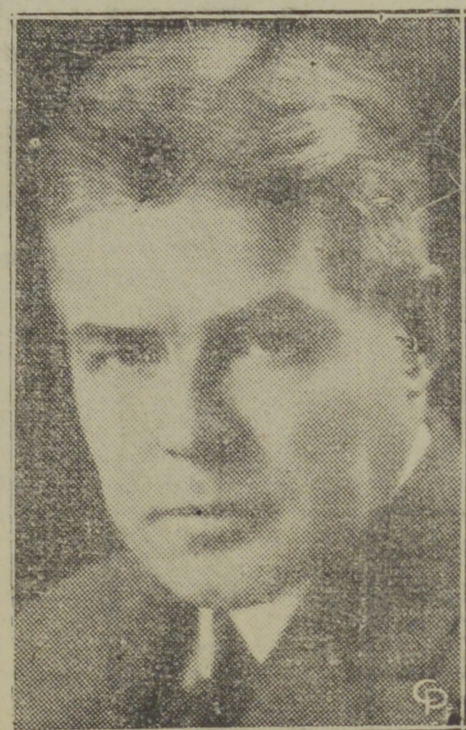
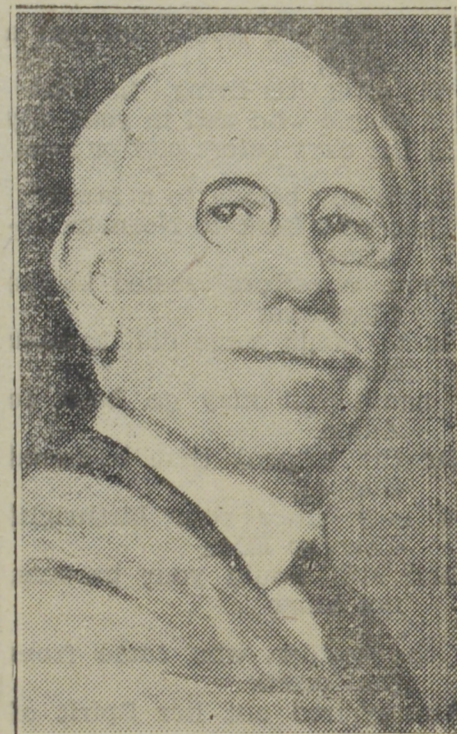


KNIGHTHOOD IN FLOWER AGAIN AS NOTED CANADIANS HONORED

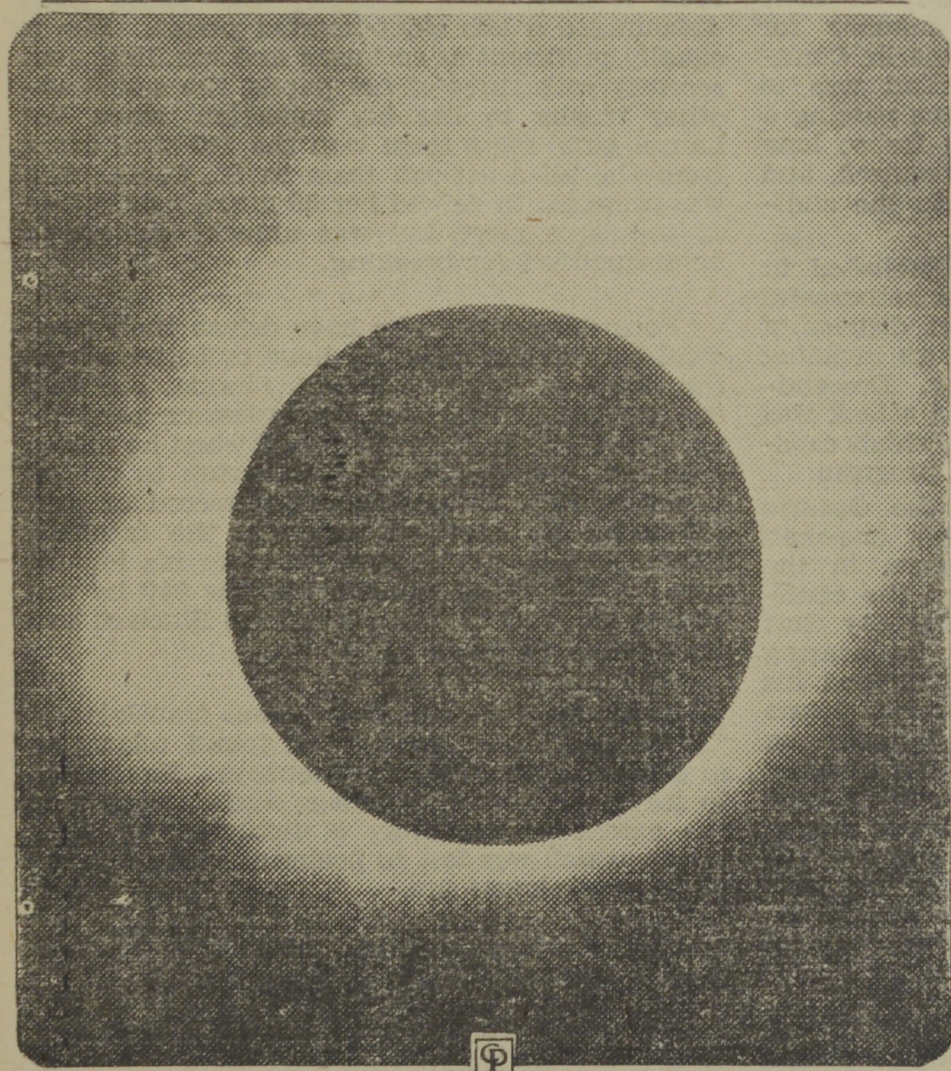

SOLAR ECLIPSES

GIVE ASTRONOMERS ONLY OPPORTUNITY TO STUDY SUN'S APPENDAGES



THE ECLIPSE OF OCTOBER 21, 1930

Another phenomenon of the heavens which around the fear and awe of the ancients was the occasion of a solar eclipse. Eclipses, because of their frequency, were not as generally regarded as harbingers of evil, however, as were the comets.

Early in the history of astronomy it was noted that the moon's path across the skies did not coincide with that of the sun, but

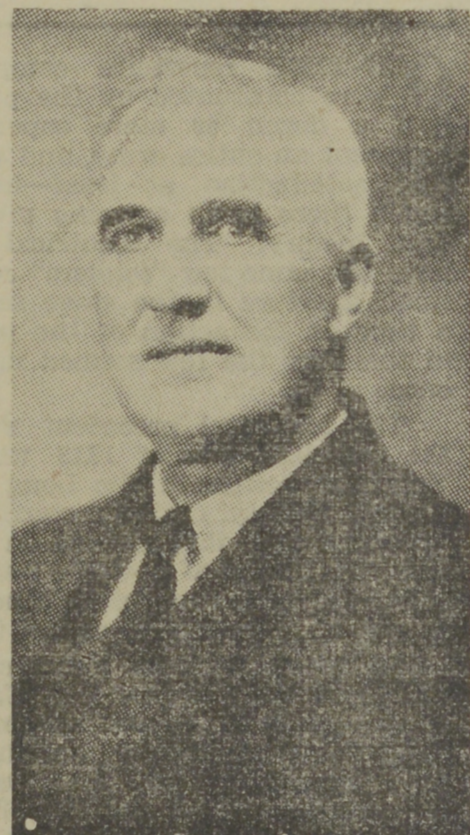
that it was inclined to an angle of about five degrees to it, half of the moon's path lying to the north and half to the south of the sun's path. At those points where the moon's path crosses that of the sun, these points are known as the nodes, it was found the eclipses were most likely to occur. The moon's crossings of the nodes are about six months apart.

An eclipse, as every schoolboy now knows, occurs when the moon passes between the earth

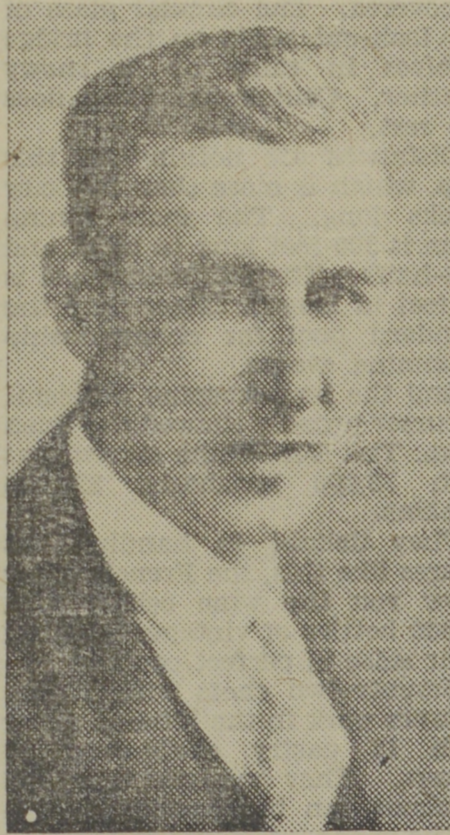

ment administered by the Premier, with no additional expense to the province;

5. Out of the monies when received from Ottawa as a result of the White Commission, the Government will restore the grants to hospitals and sanatoria, and will give free school books up to and including Grade 8, on an improved system of distribution;

6. Further assistance will be given to aid our people in getting back to the land;

7. We are in hopes that, with the improved conditions, and with further assistance by the Government for work, there will be no need of direct relief; but if such is not the case, then those so unfortunate will be provided with relief and medical aid.
