THE UNITED STATES LAWN Tennis Association selected Mrs. Helen Wills Moody and five other players to form the nucleus of the 1935 Wightman Cup team. The play of the California star in recent British tournaments convinced the U.S.L.T.A. of her ability to fill a Cup berth. Helen Hull Jacobs, three times champion; Mrs. Sarah Palfrey Fabyan, Carolyn Bacock, Dorothy Andrus and Mrs. Ethel Burkhardt Arnold form the remainder of the tentative team.

MICKEY GLASHEN, STAR player of this year's Allan Cup team, will remain in Halifax and play for the Wolverines next season according to the latest reports. It was rumored that he would join the Edmundston Eskimos, but as he has accepted a position with the Nova Scotia Department of Mines and will make the trip overseas with the Wolverines next season, taking part in the Olympic Games.

GILBERT E. MASON, 47-year-old Halifax long distance runner, has filed his entry for the Sydney Post Record 26 miles, 385 yards road race on September 1. He will represent the Halifax Police Club A.A.S.C. and will start training next week.

JACK LOVELOCK, PRIDE OF New Zealand runners, became the toast of the track world when he won Princeton's "Mile of the Century," defeating Bill Bonthron, Glen Cunningham, Gene Venzke and others.

THE NEW CHAMPION OF heavyweight world crowned last week is James J. Braddock, and after fighting through 15 rounds with the now ex-champ it was found that he had won seven of the rounds outright and divided enough of the others to proclaim him the champ. Max Baer did not live up to expectations and the odds of five to one were certainly sent sailing as Mr. Baer fouled six times and not once was there a foul called on Braddock. Baer was booed as soon as he went in the ring although he was favored to win, and the new champ seemed to be very popular. Baer's share of the fight was in the vicinity of

\$88,000, while Braddock pocketed his 15 per cent, which amounted to around \$30,000. The new champ will not fight for a year at least and will reap the golden harvest that goes with the reward of being the champ.

LESLIE PAWSON, OF PAW-tucket, R.I., former winner of the Boston A.A. marathon, won the Bunker Hill Day 26 miles 385 yard Lawrence to Boston race in two hours, 43 minutes, 39 seconds. Pawson jumped into an early lead and held it without difficulty to the City Square finish line in the Charleston district.

AT A MEETING OF SAINT John-Kings Softball Association the officers of last year were re-elected as follows: W. A. Segee, president; W. C. Clark, vice-president; H. M. Cuthbertson, secretary; and W. Edgar Campbell, treasurer. 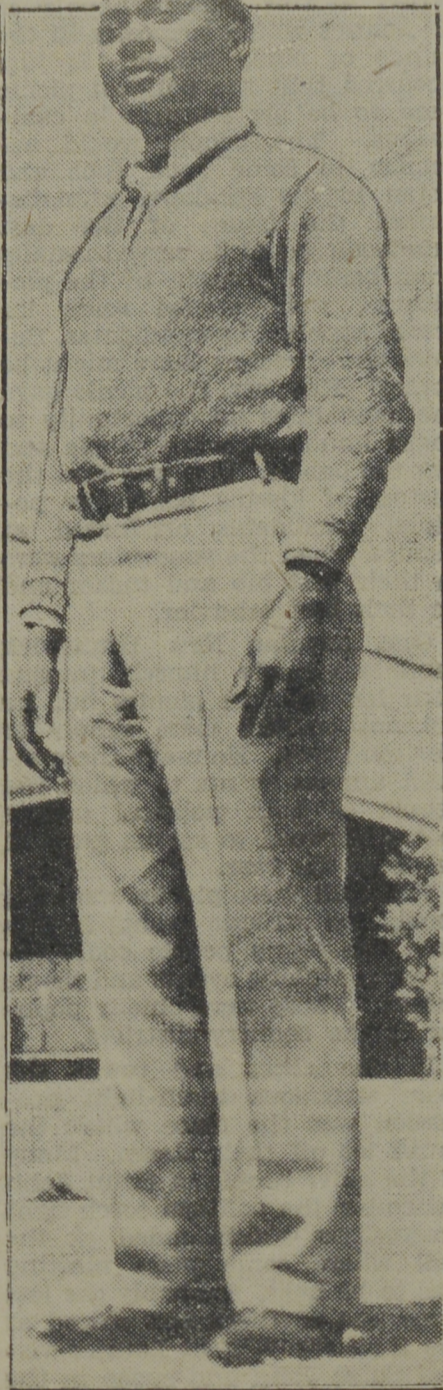
