

Tariff And Tax Changes Are Made For The Dominion

Deficit of \$100,000,000; Sales Tax Increase; Other Changes.

Some outstanding features of the tax and tariff changes announced last Friday in the budget address before the Dominion House of Commons by Hon. Charles a Dunning, Minister of Finance, were as follows:

Deficit for the current fiscal year to be less than \$100,000,000 compared with \$162,000,000 in the last year.

Sales tax increased to eight per cent. from six per cent. and corporation income tax rate increased to 15 per cent. to bring added revenue of \$29,000,000.

Three year exemption from corporation income tax of any metalliferous mine coming into production between now and January 1, 1940.

Rearrangement of excise and customs taxes on automobiles designed to lower prices of small cars to consumer.

Drop of 1 1/4 cents a gallon in gasoline duty from 2 1/4 cents a gallon to one cent.

Excise tax on Canadian brandies reduced to \$3 per gallon. Now \$4.

Downward revision of 104 items in the tariff schedule and upward revision of 12, including 50 items reduced under preferential tariff and no increases.

Heavy reductions in tariff rates on British cotton and silk fabrics and manufactured cotton and artificial silk goods from intermediate tariff countries including United States.

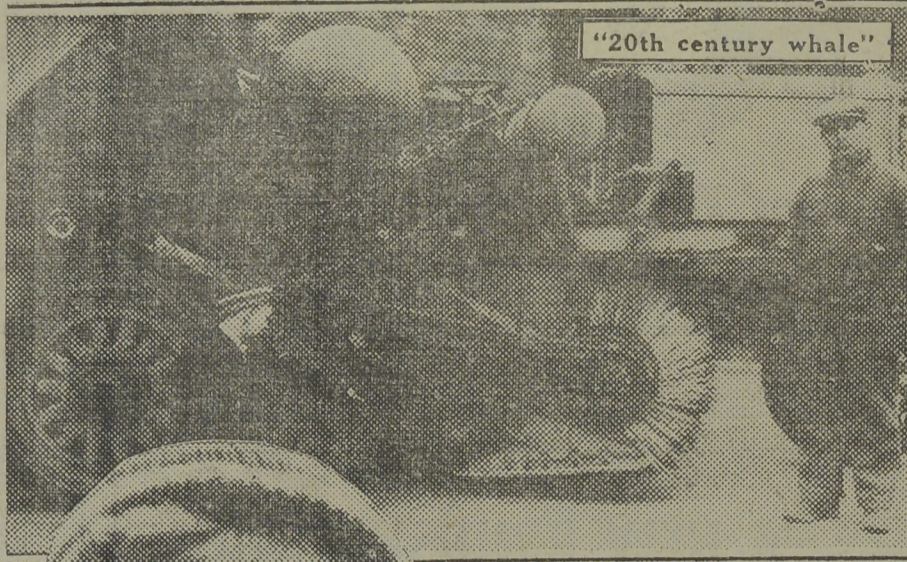
Free entry from all countries of goods or articles imported for personal use of the blind and free entry of all educational sound and silent films.

Tariff on agricultural implements from intermediate tariff countries to 7 1/2 per cent.

Duty exemption up to \$100 on goods for personal use brought in by tourists travelling abroad providing they are absent 48 hours and that exemption is granted only once every four months.

Federal Financial Review Contains Interesting Items

Trade of Dominion Increased 11.3 Per Cent.—Imports Higher Than Previous Year—Provincial Finances Referred to in Budget Address.

The financial review for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1936, presented to the Dominion Parliament on May 1, showed a total "over-all" deficit of \$162,191,000, compared with \$116,34,000 a year ago. Other points of interest were:

Revenues for the last fiscal year \$372,000,000, an increase of \$10,229,000 over the previous year; expenditures for all purposes, \$534,291,000.

Total revenues were \$10,229,000 better than the previous year but total ordinary expenditures were \$373,987,000, an increase of \$14,287,000 over last year, but \$16,000,000 less than was authorized by vote and statute. Extraordinary expenditures such as relief and Canadian National Railways

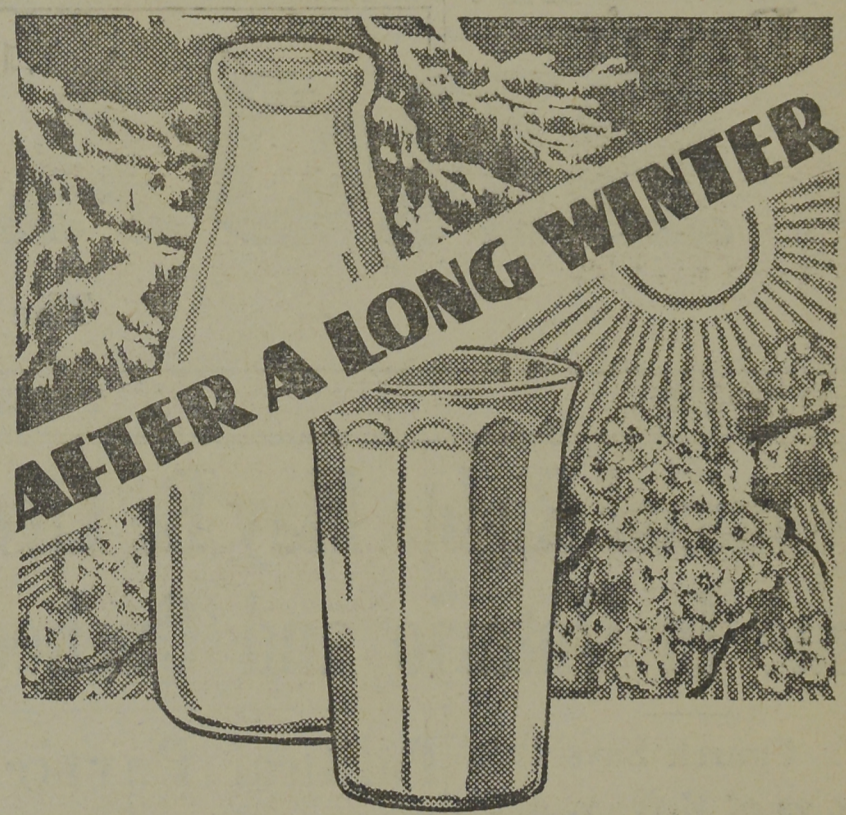
deficits brought the total up to \$534,291,000.

A year ago a surplus was shown of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditures of \$2,700,000, but a deficit when all expenditures were considered, of \$116,134,000, according to Mr. Dunning's figures.

The Minister explained the present Government was in power slightly over five months of the last fiscal year.

The Minister quoted figures to show a "real and steady" improvement in the economic situation, but removal of unemployed from relief rolls was not keeping step with expansion of industry. Wage rates were higher and there was less part time employment.

INSPECTION OF CARS

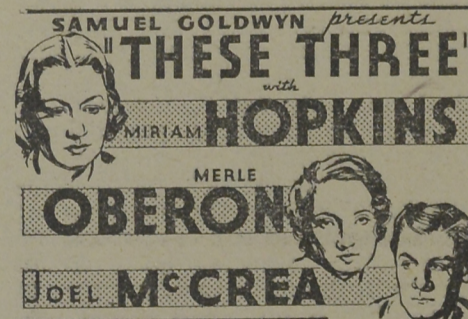
