

Around the Maritimes

New regulations governing the operations of trucks having a width of over six feet have been announced by the Government of New Brunswick.

Dennison P. Guptill, formerly of the R.C.M.P., has been appointed chief of the Saint John police force. He succeeds E. M. Slader.

Vital Levesque, Edmundston, who escaped from Dorchester recently, has been located and returned to the penitentiary. He enjoyed eight days of freedom.

The new Saint John City Council has been sworn into office. Two new members have made their appearance—Mayor D. L. MacLaren and Commissioner George D. Ellis.

Eleven firms in Prince Edward Island were engaged in the flour and feed milling business in 1934, according to a federal report. The combined gross value of production was \$176,663.

Many of the younger school teachers throughout New Brunswick will remember that last Tuesday, May 5, was the seventh anniversary of the fire which destroyed the Normal School building.

Charlotte County members of the N.B. Legislature and fisheries officials met recently to consider a plan of action which would improve conditions in the fishing industry of Charlotte County, and the surrounding district.

A meeting of the joint committee representing the Harvey Jersey Club and the Harvey Improvement Association was held in Taylor Memorial Hall recently to further plans for the Harvey Jersey parish show to be held on May 25 at Harvey Lake Shore.

By a vote of 71-9, ratepayers of the town of Middleton, N.S., at a meeting in the assembly hall of Macdonald School recently, empowered the Council to borrow an additional \$5,000 necessary for the construction of a combined town hall and theatre. At a previous meeting, held early this year a sum of \$20,000 was voted.

Indirectly, the cod fishermen of the Bay of Fundy are adversely affected by the trade sanctions against Italy, in that Newfoundland is flooding the United States markets with fish they formerly shipped to Italy. Fundy fishermen formerly enjoyed a good market in the U.S. for their product.

The town of Truro has no authority to license buses, according to information given at the regular meeting of the Town Council, when a proposed by-law for the licensing of buses, hacks and motor taxis was returned from the deputy provincial secretary with the information that it was considered the town has no authority in this matter.

A meeting of residents of Welsford was held recently to decide on purchasing fire-fighting apparatus for the community of Welsford and surrounding country. Several committees from churches and various organizations brought favorable reports and promises of financial help when needed. A finance committee of five was selected to look into the matter of raising funds.

The Provincial Government of Nova Scotia was counselled by Cdl. G. S. Harrington, leader of the Opposition, to take steps that in partizan politics play no part in the distribution of an appropriation of \$100,000 for the re-establishment of needy fishermen. The appropriation was made by the Government in line with the announcement from the Federal authorities that a similar amount would be contributed from Ottawa for the same purpose.

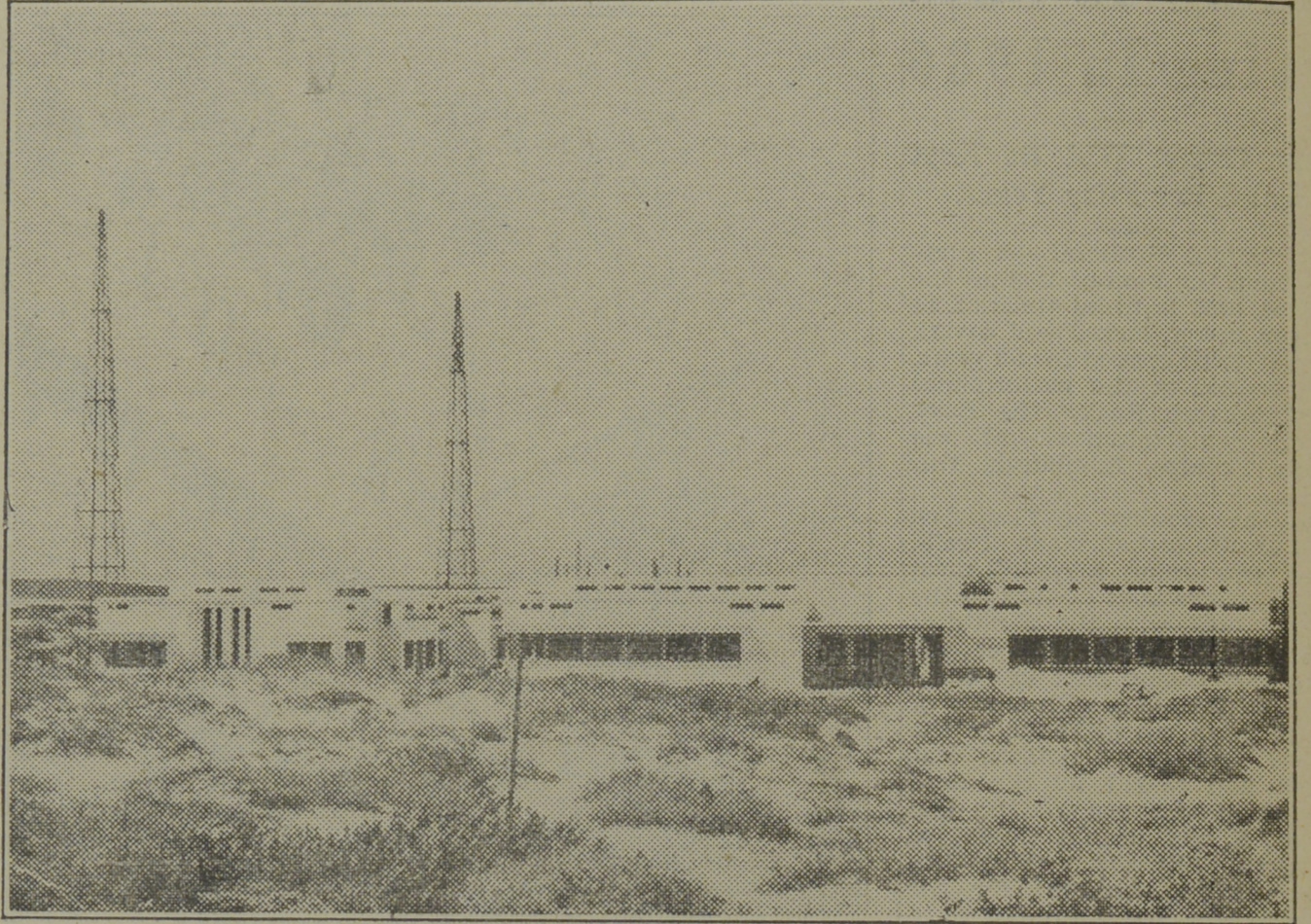
An increase of \$79,337.93 over the month of April, 1935, was made in the receipts for April, 1936, by the customs and excise department of the Dominion Department of National Revenue for the port of Saint John, was announced by A. L. Hoyt, collector of customs and excise. Total collections for last month amounted to \$252,497.30 as compared to \$173,159.37 for April of last year.

The conversion of the air station at Upper North Sydney into a sanatorium for Cape Breton patients, was the subject of much discussion at a meeting of the North Sydney town council and it was decided to urge residents of the Island to unite in requesting the conversion. Mayor Fenwick Kelly intimated a movement would be started at once to ask the Government to assist in the establishing of a suitable T. B. sanatorium.

Drastic cuts in the Yarmouth relief roll are expected, town officials said. A searching examination of each name on the roll is being made, it was said, as well as an effort to secure more employment. Earlier in April the mayor had announced that all names would be stricken from the roll on May 1, and that applications would be received and considered. The two systems are equivalent, in effect, it was pointed out.

Better mail service on the Valley Railway south of Woodstock was recommended at the last meeting of the Woodstock Board of Trade. The president, G. C. Campbell, explained that at present mails from Woodstock for points south of Meductic on both sides of the Saint John River were taken from Woodstock to Fredericton, made up there and rerouted back over the same ground to their destinations. This meant that there was no longer a fast service between Woodstock and down-river points.

work and for that it would be necessary to have bond issues, but he said it could be possible to balance the budget on services. He believed that the budget could be balanced and he would work with that end in view. He knew that public officials were open to criticism and he would always welcome con-

Commissioner Ellis said he would work in the best interests of the city and would do all in his power to make Saint John a better place in which to live.

Commissioner Walsh said that he had stated his platform during the election campaign and he would do his best to accomplish what he had promised.

Commissioner Massie pledged support to the new mayor and said he would continue to give his talents toward the building up of the city.

Commissioner Wigmore regretted the retirement of Mayor Britain and Commissioner Wilson. He was sure that both had done good work in trying times and

their accomplishments would stand for years. He pledged his co-operation to the new mayor and said that he felt sure that all members of the council would do what they thought was best to assist Saint John and its citizens.

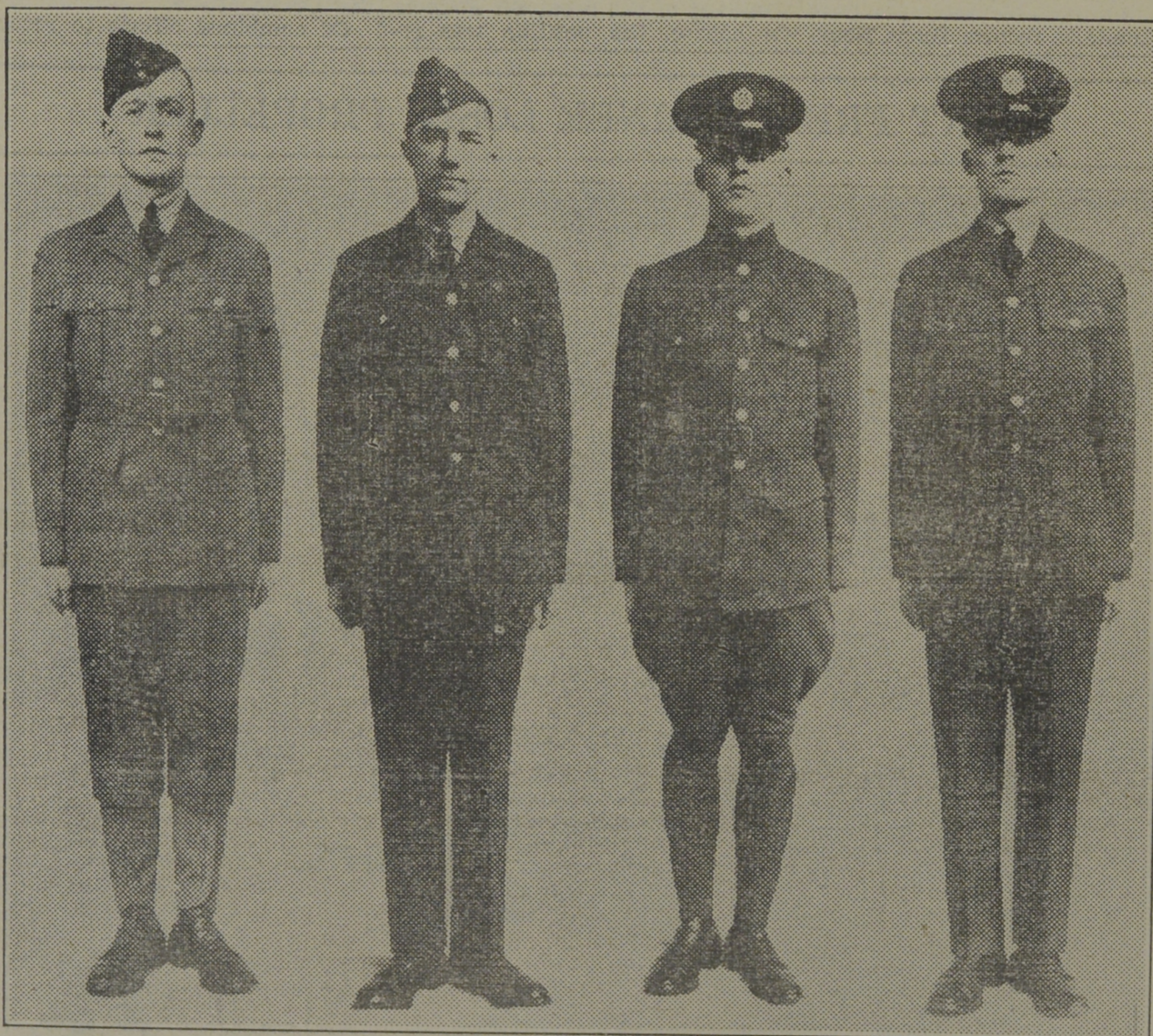

CHANGES IN ROYAL AIR FORCE UNIFORMS



As a result of observations and trials, important modifications in the service uniforms of officers and airmen of the Royal Air Force are to be made. The most important changes are the abolition of breeches and puttees, and the adoption of a blue field service cap for all personnel, similar to that worn by the Royal Flying Corps. The cap can be adapted for use as a flying helmet, and will be regularly worn on normal duties. Trousers will in future be worn by all the

ranks instead of breeches and puttees. A blueweb gaiter has, however, been approved for use in inclement weather. It is thought that the alterations and simplicity of the new uniform will help the comfort and efficiency of the personnel.
