Hard-Top Roads' Program Details Are Announced

More Than 400 Miles of Highway To Be Treated in Next Two Years.

Fredericton, N.B.—The call for tenders will go out immediately for the hard-surfacing of four hundred and twenty miles of Provincial highways during 1936-37, it was announced by Premier Dysart from his office in this city.

"Our program is a large one," the Fremier said, "embracing more than three hundred and thirty miles of permanent paving and nearly ninety miles of carpet. coating, and is so diversified that it will reach every county of the Province. The major undertaking, however," he added, "will naturally follow the Trans-Canada highway route because of Federal participation."

"In order to reduce the cost it has been decided to embark upon a two-year program. Tenders will be invited for stretches of from twenty-five to thirty miles instead of the eight to twelve miles laid out in the contracts let
