tion of such conditions. It is at at this stage that proper treatment will accomplish what it may not be possible to do later on.

It should not be forgotten that the health of one part of the body is related to the general health of he whole body. Among the causes of pyorrhoea may be listed the irritation from a crown or filling which presses down on and cutting into the gums.

If it does seem to pattern after male attire in the cut of the jacket, it also provides the very good alibi of affording that simplicity of lines and that sleek efficiency which so aptly bespeaks the breezy girl of today.

The jacket is tailored in men's flannel, grey with a black pin stripe being the favored material. Six self-buttons of generous size, paired off, adorn the doublebreasted front, and slit pockets into which idle hands can be casually slipped are supplied.

Perhaps affording a simile, in its slightly masculine leaning, this outfit is designed to permit of a switch in skirts-reminding, offhand, of the two-trouser suits of the sterner sex.
