Harrow District And Its History Is **Now Under Survey**

Hamlet Dates Back Some 3,000 Years Under Various Names.

London.-The history of Harrow-hamlet, town and schoolfrom its first discovery 3,000 years ago until the present day, is traced for the first time in "Harrow Through the Ages," by Walter W. Druett.

Mr. Druett, while less concerned with the school than the social, ecclesiastical and municipal growth of Harrow town and the surrounding neighborhood, nevertheless includes a great deal of the school's early history, for which he has collated much fresh material.

In the earlier history the author comments on the astonishing progress of Harrow's place

name through the centuries. In the earliest document, dated 767 A.D., the district is referred to as Hergae.

"Then one comes to Hearge, 825; Hergas, 832; Herges, 1086; Herga, 1094; Hereghes, 1232; Hergh, 1243; Harewes, 1259; Har-rewe, 1307; Harwe, 1316, and Harogh, 1368. Harrow atte hill is reached in 1479, and Harrowe-onthe Hills, 1535.'

The five articles laid down by John Lyon, founder of Harrow School, in 1592, include:



Sackcloth Was **Regimental Dress** Of British Unit

Patches of Brown Canvas Are Now Worn as Emblem.

London.-The South Staffordshire Regiment (38th Foot) has received official sanction to incorporate in its uniform a piece of brown canvas.

It is not a particularly decorative embellishment. Nor is it intended to be, since it is to commemorate one of the most exceptional periods in the Regi-ment's history when it had to use sackcloth for uniform.

Early in the 18th century the Regiment went to the West Indies and there it remained for nearly 60 years. Poor quarters, indifferent food and scarcity of clothing were the accompaniments of its long sojourn in a strange land.

Tradition asserts that there was an absence of material to make new uniforms and nothing apart from sackcloth or other coarse material with which to repair worn-out clothing.

At that period of the Regiment's history the facings were bright yellow. Since 1881 they have been white. A return to yellow facings is now approved, and brown Holland trimmings are to be worn on the skirt of the full dress tunic, while the mess jacket for officers will be scarlet with brown linen lapels and the mess vest of brown Holland.

Similar patches of brown Holland will be worn on the service dress. There will be one under both the cap and collar badges.

(Continued from Page 12) firm. Unmold. The loaf mold can be cut in slices and garnished with whipped cream and drained cherries. Serves 8.

Dixie White Cake-3 cups sifted cake flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 11/2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoor. lemon extract, 4 eggs, stiffly beaten, 1 teaspoon salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or other shortening, 1 cup water, 1 cup coconut, premium shred. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add flour, alternately with water, a small amount at a time. Beat after each addition until smooth. Add lemon extract and coconut. Beat until well mixed. Fold in egg whites gently but thoroughly. Bake in greased pan 8 by 8 by 2 inches, in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until done. Cover top and sides of cake with Coconut Seven Minute Frosting, if desired. Coconut Seven Minute Frosting—2 egg whites, unbeaten, 5 tablespoons water, 1 teaspoon vanilla; 11/2 cups sugar, 11/2 teaspoons light corn syrup. Put egg whites, sugar, water, and corn syrup in upper part of double boiler. Beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water, beat constantly with rotary egg beater, and cook seven minutes or until frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from fire, add vanilla, and beat until thick enough to spread. Add 1/2 can coconut, southern style shred, and frost cake. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 can over cake before frosting becomes firm.
