Polish officials said 1,000 persons had been arrested in Poland last week as the Government acted to suppress communistic activity.

First application of Alberta's new system of codes for business, a schedule of minimum wages and hours of labor for the baking industry in this area will go into effect at once, it is announced in The Alberta Gazette.

Reports that Communists and extreme Left Socialists planned to attempt violent overthrow of the Spanish Government on April 12 has prompted indefinite postponement of the municipal elections scheduled for that date.

The works program to relieve unemployment which will be brought before Parliament at Ottawa in supplementary estimates, perhaps before the Easter recess, may reach \$40,000,000, it is stated in government circles.

Investigators for the United States Communications Commission said they were making a thorough study of patents owned by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to determine whether this ownership makes possible a "telephone monopoly."

The threatened strike of 20,000 South Wales miners employed by Amalgamated Anthracite Collieries Limited was averted when representatives of the men recommended acceptance of terms negotiated with the owners. Particulars of the settlement were not disclosed.

The London Daily Mail forecasts the retirement of Prime Minister Baldwin in June, and suggested Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, as said the Prime Minister was his successor. The Daily Mail

An extension of the trade pact between Canada and France, concluded in 1933, and the protocol of 1935 was announced in the House by Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Trade and Commerce, who told the House that the new arrangement was effected in Paris on March 20, and became effective March 31.

The fixed valuation of three-fifths of a cent per pound advance on invoice value, as applied to onions will be cancelled April 10, insofar as importations to the three Maritime Provinces are concerned. Announcement to this effect was made by the Department of National Revenue.

Lloyd Lewis, 17-year-old high school student of Plattsburg, Mo., was named winner of a \$5,000 scholarship offered by Eddie Cantor, stage and screen comedian, for a 500-word essay on peace. His essay said peace was "an expensive luxury" for which nations have never been willing to pay.

Premier Hepburn disclosed he had received official notice the Federal Government had refused the application of the Beauharnois and associated companies for disallowance of the Power Commission Act, 1935, by which the Ontario Legislature cancelled power contracts with four Quebec companies.

After a lively debate, the London House of Commons rejected a private members bill designed to prohibit betting on football pools. Tom Williams, Labor member from Yorkshire, said the pool proprietors were making more profit than all the coal owners of Great Britain, who employed 750,000 men compared to the

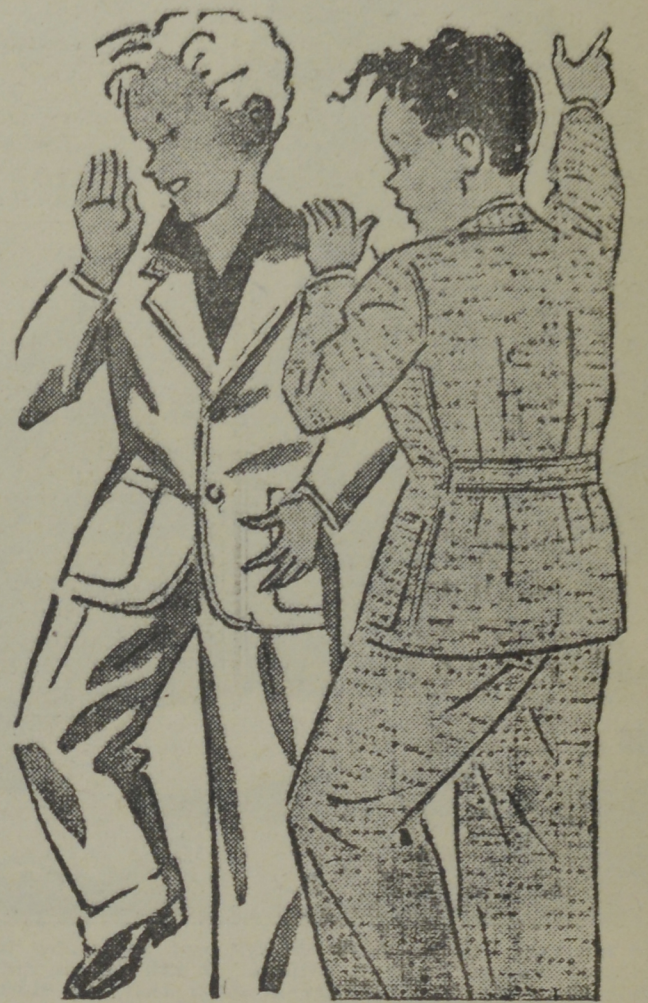

Filing of a formal petition by a group of eastern United States railroads for an 18-month delay in new low passenger fares scheduled to go into effect June 2 was disclosed by Interstate Commerce Commission officials. Including all major lines except the Baltimore & Ohio, the petitioning roads asked the postponement in order to try out "experimental" fares of their own.

As a result of surveys showing that winter costs of relief were greater than in spring and summer, the Dominion Government proposes to revise the present Dominion grants-in-aid to provinces, designed to meet conditions prevailing during the winter months, it was announced in a statement issued by the Department of Labor. Total grants would be reduced by 15 per cent., making the grants-in-aid to the provinces for April \$2,606,286.

G. B. Isnor (Lib., Halifax) suggested at Ottawa that an investigation be made into the proportion of Canadians in crews of Canadian National ships running from eastern Canada to the West Indies. The Nova Scotia member made his suggestion to the Commons committee on industrial and international relations which agreed to ask a representative of the C.N.S. to give evidence after the Easter recess.

With 22 competing from eight provinces of Canada, the fourth Dominion Drama Festival will open at the Ottawa Little Theatre April 20. All will show their wares before the critical eye of Granville Barker, eminent English playwright, manager and actor. The Maritime Provinces are represented by the Theatre Arts Guild, Kentville, N.S., with "Legend," and by the Saint John Theatre Guild, with "The Old Troupers."

those who have power to restore. Under these circumstances the rule, to be effective, can only be made absolute against Acting Chief McLeese, but, as he has not been guilty of any wrong and has merely acted as the bearer of an ineffective message, there will be

no costs against him. The rule must be discharged, as against the city and Commissioner Walsh but without costs, as the mischief which this court has to remedy has been entirely occasioned by the misconduct of the commissioner in usurping an authority which it should have been evident to him and to the city's adviser, he did not possess."

Commissioner Walsh's letter, purporting to dismiss Matron Adams and Detective McBrien, was written following refusal of Chief of Police E. M. Slader to discharge these officers for their part in imprisoning Mary Boyd without a proper commitment, until he had been given an opportunity to study the evidence taken at an investigation into the case.

The chief, at the same time he announced his stand in this regard, tendered his resignation to the Common Council, but it was not accepted. Commissioner Walsh's next step was to place the chief under a 30-day suspension, which expires April 13.

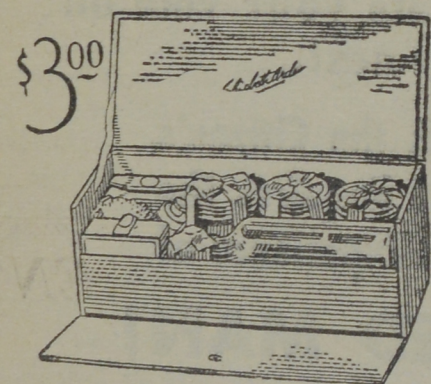
