Fire-Spreading

Operations Will Be Carried Far Into Enemy Territory.

Washington.-A prediction that civilian populations far behind the battle lines will be bombarded with a rain of fire-spreading bombs in the "next war" is made by Lieut.-Col. A. M. Prentiss of the chemical warfare service.

Describing research and development of military incendiary materials in the semi-official publication of the Society of American Military Engineers, "The Military Engineer," he concludes that "in future wars" they assume "increased importance" in crippling and destroying industries.

"Modern warfare has left little on the field of battle that is combustible, and suitable targets and opportunities for the use of incendiaries in the combat zone are very limited and will continue to be even more so as armies are mechanized," he wrote.

"On the other hand, the military aeroplane has opened up a vastly larger field of application for incendiaries in the areas behind the battle front and in the hinterlands of the belligerents.

"To an ever-increasing degree the successful waging of modern war depends upon the industrial organization of a nation to meet the enormous demands for military material. It is, therefore, not at all unlikely that in the wars of the future military operations will be carried on far into interior territory of each belligerent in an effort to cripple and destroy industries upon which
