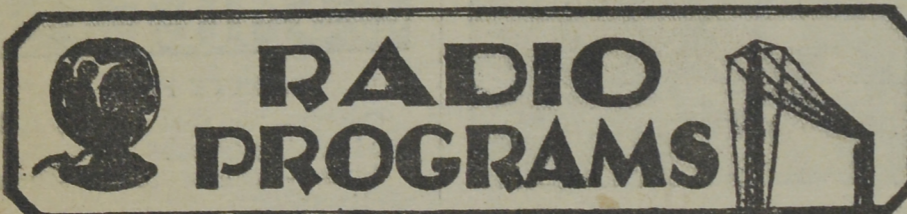

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## The Speech From The Throne Indicates Important Legislation

unyielding loyalty, devotion and affection, confident that his life will reflect the many noble virtues of his illustrious father.

The outstanding event in the brief period since my Government has taken office was the Dominion-Provincial Conference held at Ottawa last December. The rights, aims and aspirations of the Province of New Brunswick were forcefully presented and in consequence this Province, I feel satisfied, will speed its progress to its natural destiny within the Empire. A full report of the Conference has been published recently by the Federal Government in the form of a blue book, which will be made available for your study.

The first important undertaking of my Government after assuming office on July 16th was to proclaim the Old Age Pensions Act. This essential public service is being rapidly organized and before the present session concludes it will be definitely announced when the first pension cheques will be issued.

During the past summer we were faced with an appalling situation in the north part of our Province where forest fires had ravaged extensive timber lands and wiped out entire communities. Thanks to the co-operation of public-spirited citizens and the prompt response of my Government, the families deprived of the savings of years have been rehabilitated and are being assisted to a position of self-dependence.

In order to make available to industry a large portion of our timber resources which, under present conditions, are practically inaccessible, my Government has undertaken to open a road from the Tobique to the Miramichi. This development, constituting a valuable trans-provincial highway, will afford much needed work for our people during construction and at the same time, yield a return commensurate with the investment by reason of materially increased Government revenues from newly-opened timber lands.

During recent months my Ministers have extended their efforts to effect economies and promote efficiency in the public service. To this end a central purchasing department is being established through which the requirements of the various Government services will be supplied.

You will be called upon to give consideration to important legislation designed to promote the best interests of our people in their various lines of endeavor.

It is proposed to set up a Department of Federal and Municipal Relations concerned not only with the fields suggested, but organized to give direction and leadership along educational lines to an orderly development of our human and physical resources.

Various problems affecting the education of our youth have been engaging the attention of my Government. A committee of practical educationists will make an exhaustive study of our school text books and will collaborate with experts in reviewing curricula, the matter of home study and other features with the view of simplifying and modernizing our educational system and adapting it to present-day needs.

Legislation will be introduced for the restoration of free school books which will be made available to the pupils of this Province, as and when approved, under an improved plan whereby text books will remain the property of the State—a plan which will meet the demand for public economy and at the same time promote habits of thrift in our young people.

During recent months a thorough study has been made of the Workmen's Compensation Act and its administration, and improvements are contemplated in respect of medical practices and

hospitalization which will secure full benefits to employees without unduly burdening industry.

My Government will appoint a Fair Wage Officer with power to investigate labor conditions and ensure reasonable wages. Legislation will be submitted to you to provide the necessary authority.

In the Department of Agriculture the several services are being consolidated to secure great efficiency. In order to assist the agricultural industry to overcome handicaps and promote improvement, serious study will be given to credit unions, mutual farm insurance and co-operative production and marketing.

Conditions necessitate a movement back to the land. You will be asked to consider a sound colonization plan to be carried out with the assistance of the Federal Government. Basic considerations in this undertaking will be proper selection of location, soil and settlers, effective supervision and continuous co-operation.

In areas where colonization is not possible, steps will be taken in conjunction with the Federal Government to explore means of restoring to productivity neglected and abandoned farm lands.

My Government is resolved that the natural assets of this Province shall be utilized for the fullest possible benefit of our people and, if need be, will adopt rigid measures to advance the commercial development of our Crown Lands, mineral and other resources.

During recent months the New Brunswick Hydro Electric Power Commission has extended its services in many directions. An early survey of the electric power situation in Carleton and Victoria Counties will be undertaken by the Commission and where expenditure is feasible other areas will be served.

It is the intention of my Government with the co-operation of Federal authority to continue its program of hard surfacing under competent engineering advice thereby ultimately eliminating the dust nuisance and adding to the safety and pleasure of travel.

To further general efficiency, the Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel will be placed under the control of the Minister of Lands and Mines.

As one result of the recent Dominion-Provincial Conference, my Government is confident that a National Park will be established in New Brunswick at an early date.

My Government has in contemplation the consolidation of various revenue collecting services to achieve greater economy and efficiency.

It is intended that hereafter a complete annual report of the operation of the Liquor Control Board will be made available. Necessary legislation will be introduced to authorize this change.

During the coming year a survey will be undertaken of the administration of justice, in an effort to effect simplification and reduced costs, particularly as affecting municipalities.

My Government, recognizing that the health of the people is of primary concern, proposes, in addition to its usual program, to launch an educational campaign covering cancer and mental hygiene.

In the general plan of reorganization, the Provincial Hospital and the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium, both of which are at present administered by Boards, will be placed under the Minister of Health.

The public accounts for the last fiscal year and the estimates for the current year will be submitted for your consideration.

I commend the work of this Session to your careful attention, trusting that under the guidance of Divine Providence your deliberations and labors will advance the welfare of our people.
