

N. B. Legislature Is Prorogued After A Very Busy Session

Lieut.-Governor MacLaren Relieves Members of Attendance.

The New Brunswick Legislature finished its deliberations last Friday and the House was prorogued by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor MacLaren, who addressed the members as follows:

Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

In bringing to a close this first session of the fortieth Legislature, I desire to thank you most heartily for the earnest attention you have given to the many important matters submitted to you and to the general business of the House.

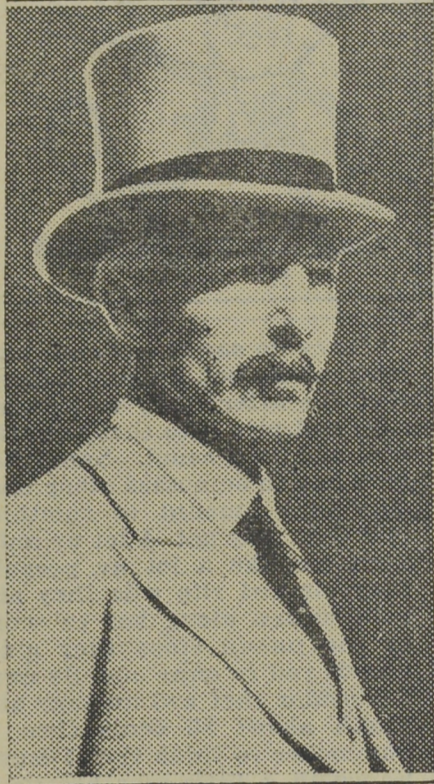
In addition to acts of a private character, you have given attention to important legislation affecting the prosperity and good government of the Province.

Legislation has been effected to promote the establishment of a Department of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations. The new Provincial Hospital Act places that institution under the direct jurisdiction of the Minister of Health and Labor. Legislation respecting the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium has been amended to place that institution likewise under the Minister of Health and Labor.

Prompt and favorable reactions to business and industry should result from various progressive measures which you have added to the Statutes, particularly the following: The Industrial Development Finance Act; an act to amend the Incorporations Tax Act; the Incorporations Tax Act and Special Tax on Banks; the Assistance to Industries Act; amendments to the Public Utilities Act; amendments to the Security Frauds Prevention Act; an

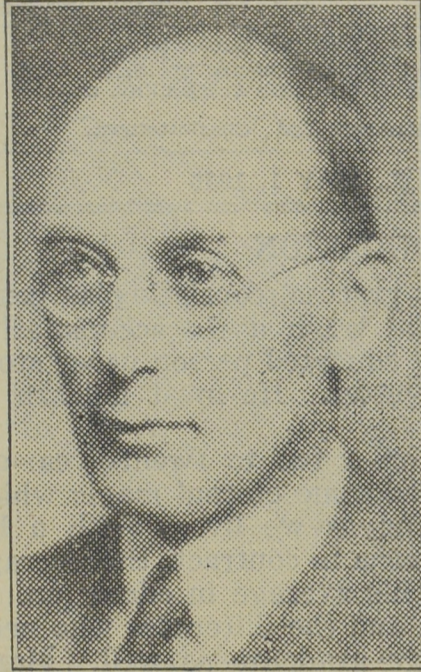

French Lawyers Invited Are To Sit "Within The Bar"

British Judge in London Extends Court Courtesy To Foreigners.

London, England.—French barristers who were to be witnesses in an action in the King's Bench Division recently, were invited by Mr. Justice MacKinnon to sit "within the Bar" of the Court—the seats reserved for King's Counsel.

"When this case began," said His Lordship, "I did not appreciate that we should be having the assistance of members of the French Bar. If there is room for them, I think it would be courteous to invite them to sit in the front row."

The Court adjourned almost immediately afterwards, and when the parties returned—to announce a settlement—the three French barristers took their seats with the four K.C.'s engaged in the case.

"May I say on behalf of the distinguished French lawyers that they are very grateful to Your Lordship for allowing them to sit 'within the Bar,'" said A. T. Miller, K.C., who appeared for one of the parties.

TELEVISION IS COMING IN MAY OR JUNE IT IS STATED

Radio Corp. of America is now approaching the first great adventure in television, according to Business Week. A new high-power television broadcasting station is said to be about ready at the top of Empire State Building, and broadcasting, it is said, will start probably in May or June, to some 100 or more receivers at strategic points in the metropolitan district of New York, at distances probably up to 25 miles. Meanwhile, because of the far-reaching effects successful operation would have on radio, movies, newspapers, and so forth, the chief engineer of the Federal Communications commission has requested that no commercial licenses be granted for television broadcasting in the United States. Public hearings on this phase of the problem will begin June 15.
