Montreal, Que.—In preparation for the Easter holiday period, when many people wish to take advantage of the spring weather for travelling to visit relatives and friends in other centres, the railways of Canada will place in effect special low round trip excursion fares for the general public and also for teachers and pupils, good between all stations from coast to coast and Newfoundland, according to C. P. Riddell, chairman, Canadian Passenger Association.

Two classes of fares for the general public will be in effect in Canada, those good in coaches only at single fare and one-tenth for the round trip; also good in standard sleeping cars, tourist sleeping cars or parlor cars at single fare and one-third for the round trip on payment of regular charge for such accommodation. Railway tickets will be good going between Thursday, April 9, and up to 2.00 p.m. of Monday, April 13. Return movement will rmitted leaving destination midnight of Tues-

will be issued on the following round trip; also good in standard sleeping cars, tourist sleeping cars or parlor cars at single fare For Season in N. Y. and one-fourth for the round trip on payment of regular charge for such services. These railway tickets will be good going between Friday, March 27, and Tuesday, April 14. Return movement will be permitted up to midnight of Tuesday, April 21. Teachers and pupils will be required to provide certificate of identification when purchasing their tickets.


