# Who is Responsible?

W/E, IN the Maritime Provinces, boast of our great natural resources, our vast coastal waters, our lakes and rivers, our forests and our mines. Our fisheries are the envy of the world. Our forest wealth is large and our farming lands are highly fertile. We have coal, limestone, gypsum and other minerals. We have safe harbors, open in all seasons, which are the gateways to the Atlantic for all the Dominion. We have wonderful attractions for tourists. Still in spite of all these blessings we are crying hard times. Why?

The responsibility for our condition rests with man. Hundreds of new homes are needed in the Maritimes. We have lumber, bricks and all things needed to build houses. There are hundreds of men seeking employment yet scarcely any building is going on. Hundreds of people are hungry. Yet we see fishermen in poverty, unable to get a decent price for their fish and there are hundreds of vacant farms going to ruin because they are not worked. People are cold while coal in unlimited quantities is near at hand. When we are asked why have we these conditions, the answer comes that man is at fault.

Who are the men responsible for these conditions? Are you one of them? Probably you will disclaim all responsibility and say our conditions are caused by governments, capitalists and world conditions and that you are the down-trodden taxpayers. That is your alibi, but you know it is wrong.

Providence has provided us with this land, saying, go and possess it, but instead we have gone and made a mess of it. We have elected members to the Legislatures and allowed them to do about as they liked. We have allowed capitalists to monopolize our industries and to stifle production. We have allowed ourselves to become the slaves of a minority aggression. We have done as they wanted us to, sacrificing our birthright for a mess of pottage, and our condition is the result of our own indifferences and folly.

We have stood idly by while tariffs have been manipulated and cheerfully pay \$500 more for a motor car than our neighbors in the next field. We have seen the price of the products of our fisheries and farms regulated to suit the capitalistic interests of Central Canada, and our very life and livelihood controlled by unscrupulous groups more powerful than the government itself, providing a greater menace to liberty than Russian dictatorship. But you say where lies the remedy for this condition of affairs, and the answer is again in the men, the men of the Maritimes.

Today nations of the world are applying sanctions against Italy to stop war. Italy, like Germany in 1914 when she found her supplies cut off, has started to use substitutes, necessity being the mother of invention. Years ago the Maritime Provinces were prosperous, we were self-supporting but for more than fifty years sinister influences have been applying sanctions against Maritime trade and commerce so that we could not compete in the markets of Central Canada. Gradually but surely we are being brought to a state of privation and all the time we have provided the shot and shell with which we are being riddled, with the money we export for the goods we import, allowing ourselves to be gradually bled white. But to combat this situation and the enemy destroying our economic life we need no invention, only commonsense and a full realization of our needs and that is to see that these Provinces get a square deal as provided for by the Confederation agreement and to support our own primary and secondary producers by buying MARITIME goods.
