GRATITUDE

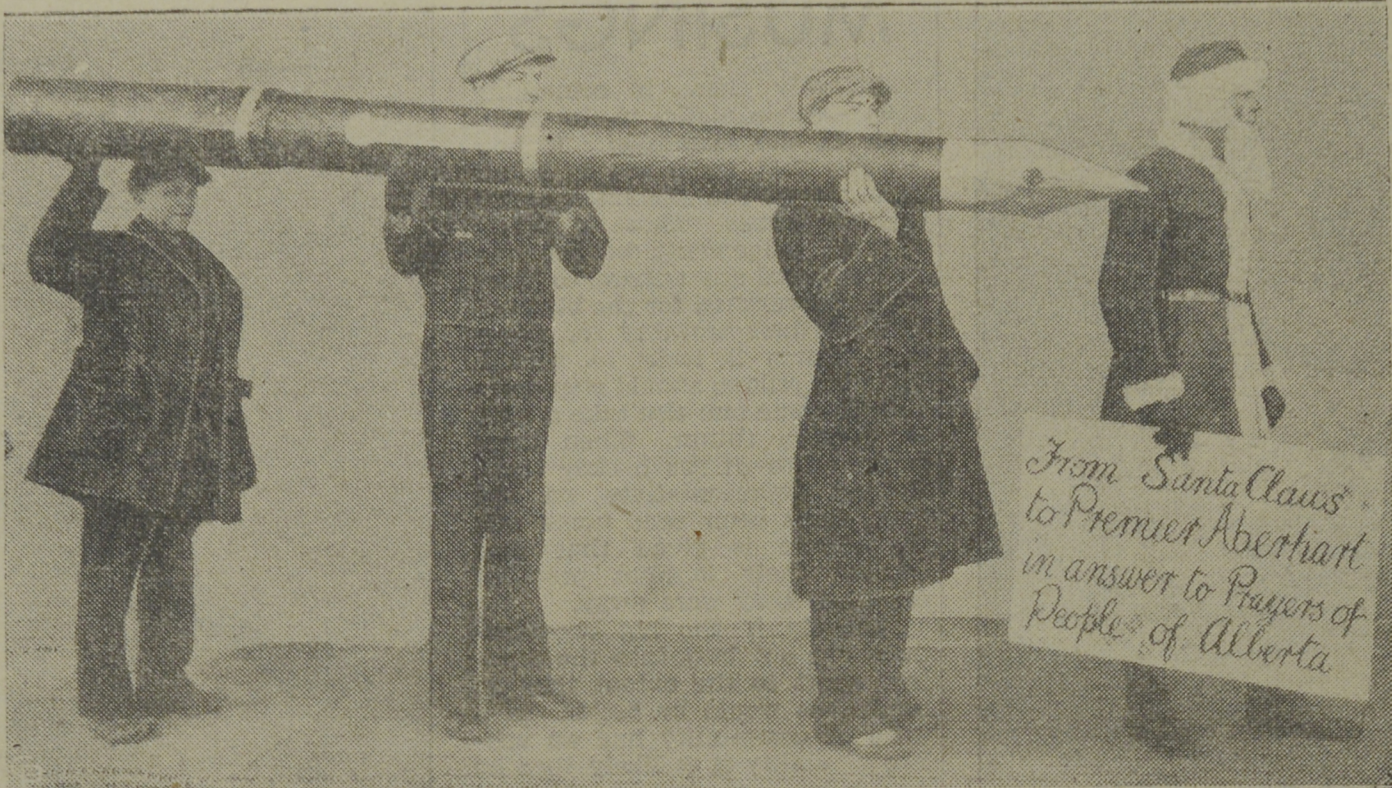
TWO COLORED men were discussing the meaning of the word gratitude.

fifty Years Ago in New Brunswick

NEW BRUNSWICK SCHOOLS

From Chief Superintendent's Report for 1882, the following particulars have been collected: Number of schools in province, 1,508; cost to province \$131,764.53; number of pupils, 64,267; average attendance, 33,547; number in attendance in proportion to population, one in 6.38.

Claimed John L. Sullivan Was Invincible When In His Prime

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rival he issued a challenge for the world's championship and in the meanwhile posted \$50 to be presented to any fighter who could stay four rounds with him. Steve Taylor, a heavyweight who had assisted Paddy Ryan train, decided to earn that fifty. The bout took place, but Taylor was in such a pitiful condition in the second round that his seconds tossed a sponge into the ring.

Many of the boxing experts in New York were at variance over the new sensational heavyweight. It was admitted that he possessed great strength and had a powerful blow, but many thought he was lacking in the finer points of the game.

In New York at that time was a heavyweight named John Flood, and he and Sullivan were matched to fight to a finish under the London prize ring rules for a purse of \$1,000. They met on a barge in the Hudson River on

May 16, with Al Smith acting as referee.

Both men were determined to win that purse and went at each other like a couple of wildcats. They fought savagely, but kept so close to each other that little damage was done. In the second round Sullivan threw Flood to the floor and repeated this in the third. In the fourth round Flood rushed madly at Sullivan and was met with a terrific left which knocked him flying. This round occupied but 30 seconds. In the next Flood started out aggressively but he met a shower of rights and lefts that sent him down after one minute of fighting. In the seventh Flood led, but was short and he absorbed a fierce crack on the ear. John L. then grabbed him and flung him heavily to the floor and fell on top of him.

The end came with dramatic suddenness in the eighth round. Flood was showing signs of wear as he came up, but he gamely tried to stave off his opponent. A crashing righthander on the neck knocked him cold. The entire fight took only 16 minutes. After that bout the critics had to acknowledge that Sullivan was quick in his actions and a real fighter.

Details of Sullivan's championship bout with Ryan will be published in next week's edition.

it is considered that this is being paid over a 20 year period it accounts for less than \$2,000,000 yearly. Say it takes another \$2,000,000 to pay for the post office services and \$3,000,000 for marine services and \$3,000,000 for customs officials, \$10,000,000 as our share of payments on the public debt, \$2,000,000 for public works, \$1,000,000 for railway employees, \$2,500,000 grants to the three provinces. These items account for something like \$25,000,000 or only half of what we pay for the

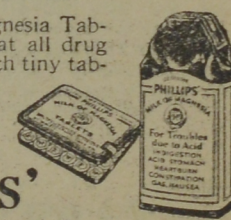

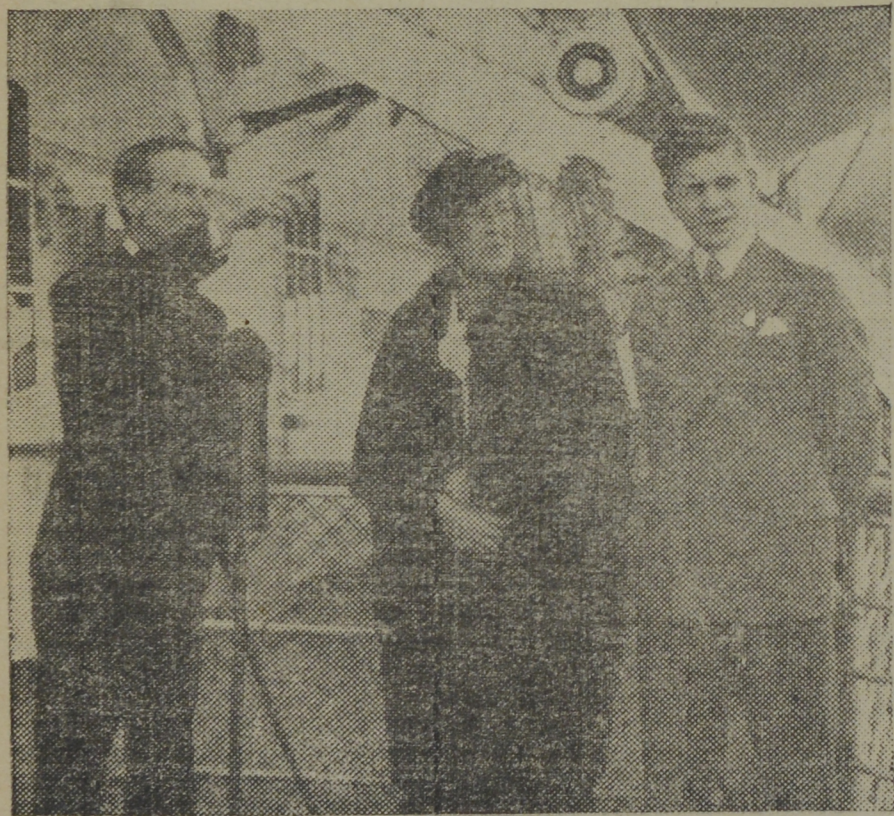

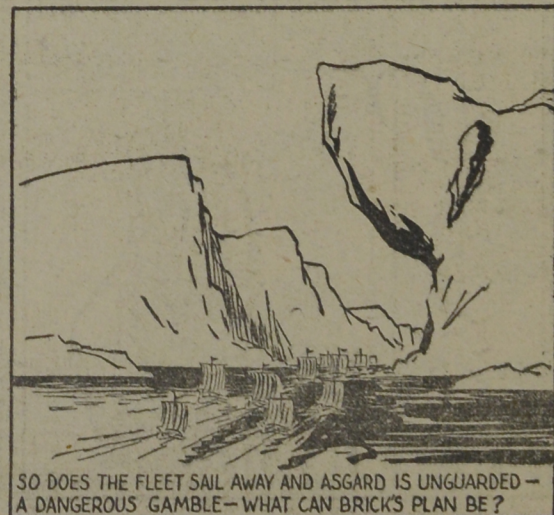
