

Congratulations Bob. Harry Swythe, of Moncton, and Gordon Fullerton of Sackville were tied for second place. Miss Margaret Whipple, of Saint John captured the ladies' crown with Miss Loretta Rowan, of Fredericton, second. It was one of the best meets staged in Saint John to date with the competition very keen and was run off fast and was handled with the greatest skill, with a packed house it was a credit to the Association.

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW Brunswick defeated Mount Allison in the first game of the New Brunswick Intercollegiate Hockey League by a score of 3-1 at Sackville.






