Baltic Nations Are Aroused Because Of Russian Action

Soviet Likely To Follow Germany in Building Navy.

Riga, Latvia. — Reports that Russia is preparing to build up her naval strength with no loss of time, with the recent Anglo-German rapprochement as a stimulant, are steadily current in well-informed circles here.

With such reports, and with new destroyers and submarines building in German shipyards, the whole question of Baltic sea power has become highly actual once more to the nations of the Baltic area.

Most to be feared, experts are agreed, is the possibility that a modern, powerful fleet could seal the Baltic from the outside world.

In view of this situation Russia, it is reported, is increasingly active in her development of ice-free ports on the Arctic Ocean.

In the Western Baltic, Sweden has the dominant position with a small but efficient fleet of submarines and destroyers, lately augmented by the Gothland, an aeroplane-carrying cruiser.

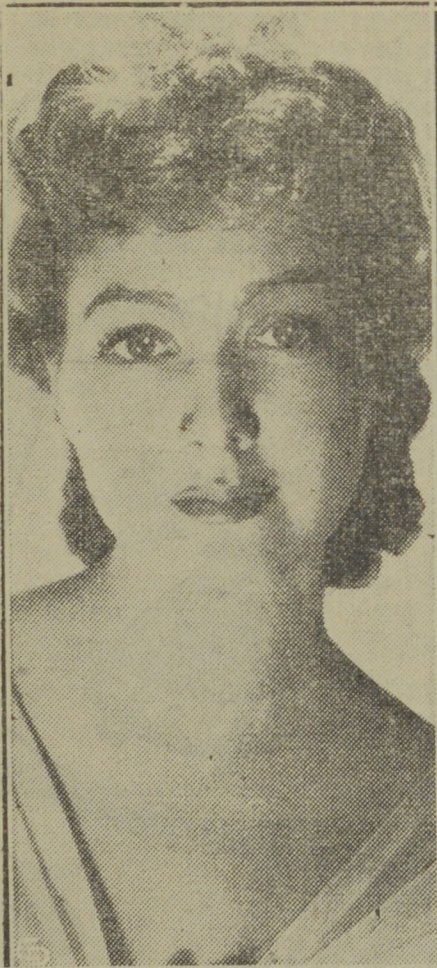
For both Sweden and Denmark, it is pointed out, a problem of the future, in the event of an actual struggle for the control of the Baltic, will be the preservation of neutrality at the entrance to the Baltic.

Finland, which has the Aaland Islands as a strategic defense point, is especially exposed to naval influence, and besides has memories of the food shortage caused by the allied blockade in 1918.

Estonia likewise has been influenced through sea power and recalls how the arrival of British naval forces in 1918 prevented Bolshevik vessels from gaining control.

Latvia also saw the possibilities of sea power control in the Great War, and Lithuania has its highly important port of Memel to consider.
