

Extra Day Means A Lot More Than Just Another Day

Leap Year Has Its Advantages and Disadvantages.

The extra day so early in the year means that the summer vacation will be one day further away. The reader can think up a lot more advantages and disadvantages of having the extra day in the year. MAKING A HIGH QUALITY FERTILIZER IN DOMINION

Fertilizers are manufactured in Canada on a much larger scale than is generally known. Sulphate of ammonia, ammonium phosphate, superphosphate, cyanamid, organics and mixed fertilizers are all made in different parts of the Dominion in large quantities. The capacity of Canadian plants for the manufacture of these products is much greater than prospective domestic requirements for some time. As the industry is comparatively new in Canada the latest equipment and processes of manufacture are in use, resulting in high quality products.

As Canadian crop production becomes more intensified and diversified more fertilizers will likely be used, but the extent to which these products are used in the Dominion is rather small in comparison with other countries. For example: the annual requirements in Canada absorb only about 200,000 tons. In the United States 3,750,000 tons are used; 1,500,000 in Great Britain; 3,500,000 in France and 6,000,000 tons in Germany.

History-Making Photoplay Comes To The Capitol

Ronald Colman Waited Seven Years To Portray His Role in "Tale of Two Cities."

Ronald Colman waited seven years to play Sydney Carton in "A Tale of Two Cities," the history-making photoplay which is coming to the Capitol Theatre for next week.

For seven years he waited for a producer to discover the romantic and dramatic merits of the great Dickens' novel. Finally his waiting was rewarded when David O. Selznick and the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio selected him to play the role.

Recognized as the screen's shyest star, a modest, retiring English gentleman, Colman seldom speaks of himself or his work, yet his secret dreams had been realized when he made "A Tale of Two Cities."

"Seven years ago, in 1928, I told a magazine interviewer I thought the talking pictures would not have a great permanency," Colman said with a sly twinkle. "There seems to have been some slight error about that prediction."

"However, in the same interview I mentioned that I believed, should the talkies by any chance become popular, there was one character fairly crying to be created, and that character was Sydney Carton in 'A Tale of Two Cities.'

"I have repeated the statement publicly on several occasions. At the risk of being considered unduly immodest, I firmly believe that this is not only the finest picture in which I have appeared, but by far the most human and interesting character I have ever created."

Until he began filming "A Tale of Two Cities," Colman never had been known to visit a motion picture set when he was not actually working. But during the entire period of production of the new Dickens feature there was never a day in which he did not visit the set, whether or not he was

actually working in the scenes being filmed.

Hailed as one of the great dramatic and artistic triumphs of the screen, "A Tale of Two Cities" boasts a cast of 112 distinguished players, among whom are Elizabeth Allan, Edna May Oliver, Reginald Owen, Blanche Yurka, Basil Rathbone, Henry B. Walthall, Donald Woods, Walter Catlett, Fritz Leiber, H. B. Warner, Mitchell Lewis, Claude Gillingwater, Billy Bevan, Isabel Jewell, Lucille Laverne and Tully Marshall.
