Prodigy Is Guest

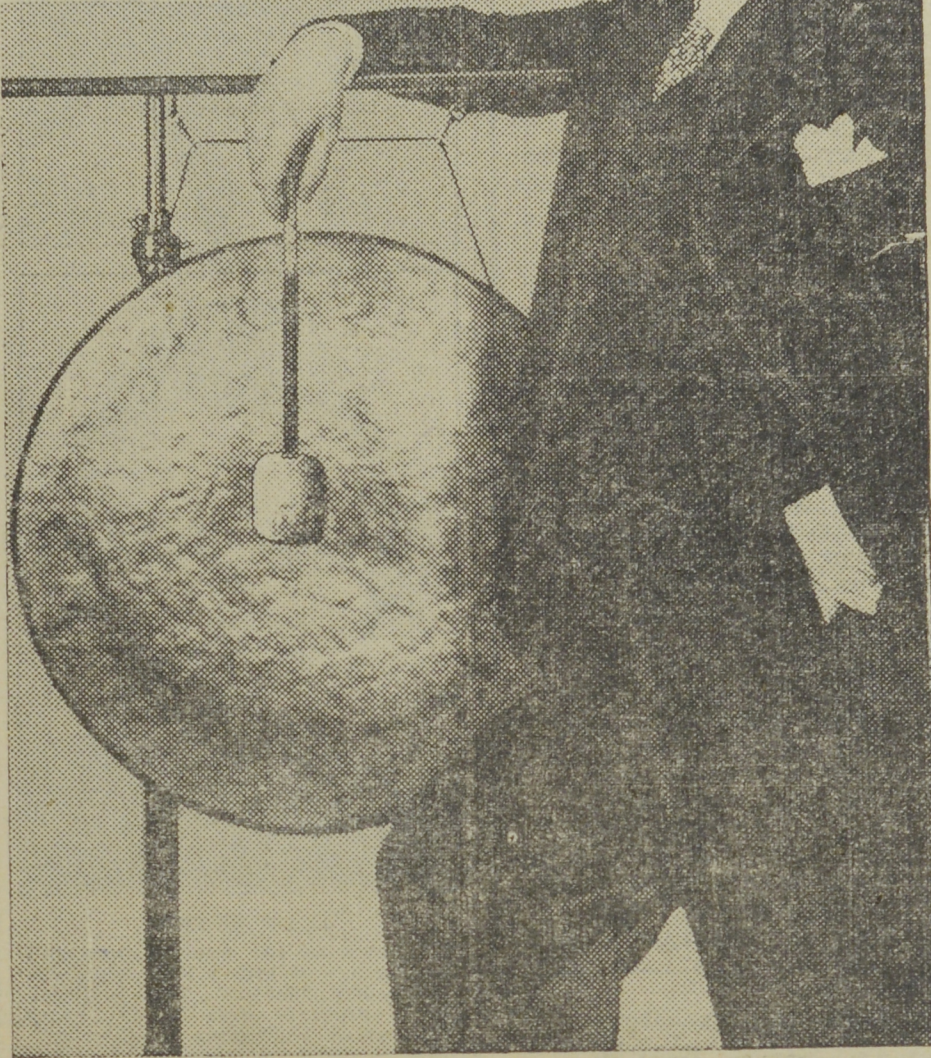

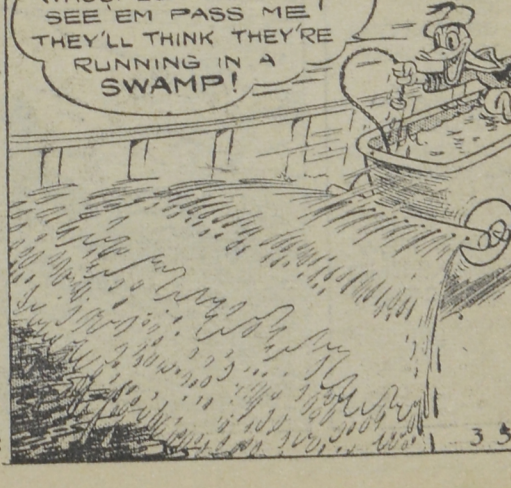
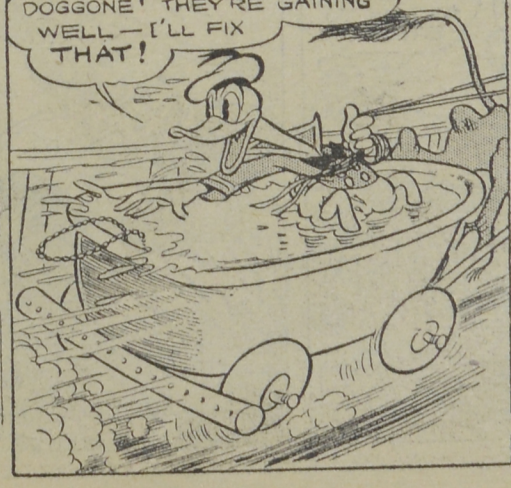
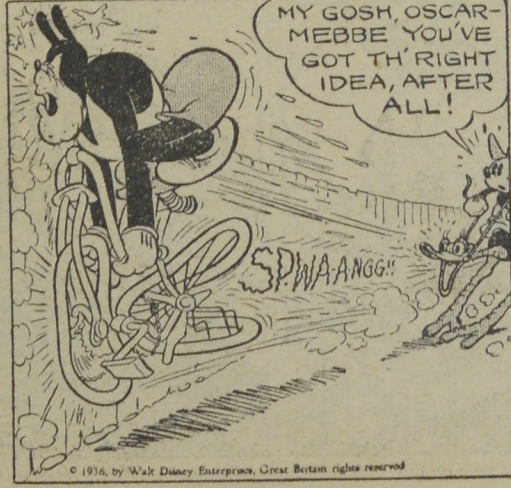
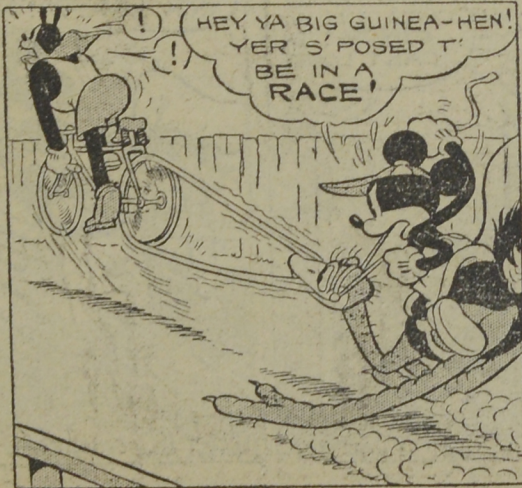
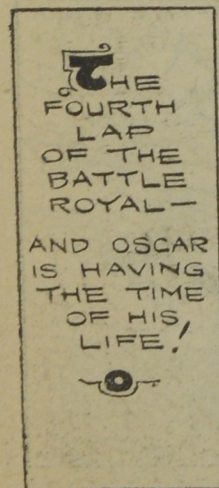
WALTER CONNOLLY AND Bill Robinson join the screen and stage guest star parade when they appear on the Saturday night CBS "Chateau" program on March 7.
