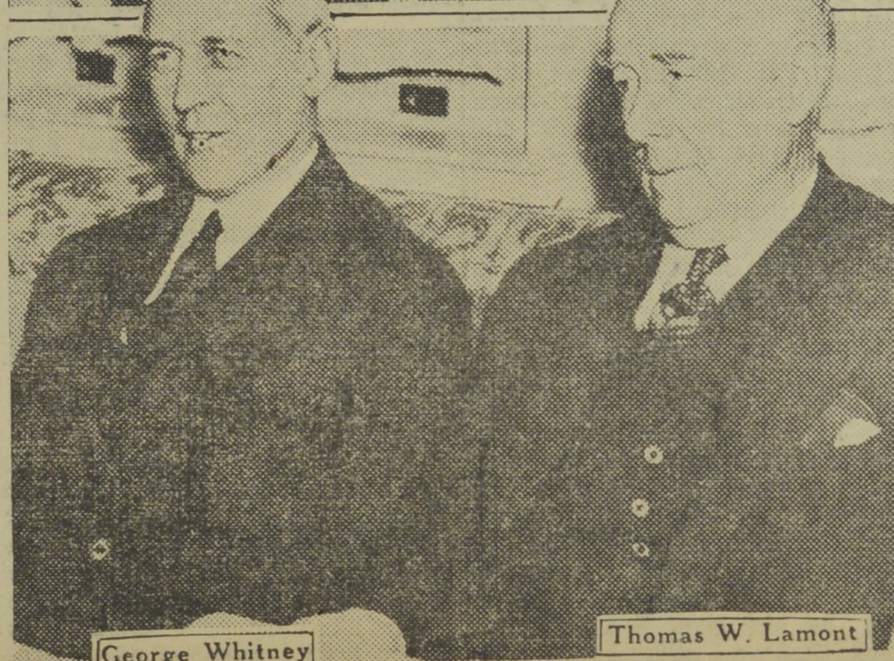

Municipalities To Pay 25 Per Cent. Of Relief Costs

Announcement Made by Premier Dysart on Extra Federal Grant.

Fredericton, N.B.—Seventy-five per cent. of unemployment relief expense will be borne by Federal and Provincial grants during the period from December 1, last until the end of March, 1936, it has been announced by Premier Dysart. This leaves a balance of 25 per cent. to be paid by municipalities as compared with one-third heretofore.

Farmers Must Produce Quality Goods To Capture Home Market

Delegates to Agricultural Convention Are Guests of City Council and Board of Trade at Dinner in Saint John.

Recapture the home markets. Produce goods of only the highest quality. Cultivate the spirit of co-operation. Make agriculture flourish in the Province of New Brunswick by doing everything a little better than the other fellow. Hold the markets gained by always placing on those markets goods that the consumer demands.

These were some of the ideas placed before the members of the New Brunswick Farmers' and Dairymen's Association at their annual banquet in the Admiral Beatty Hotel in Saint John on Tuesday evening. The delegates to the convention were the guests of the Common Council and the Board of Trade at dinner. Addresses of welcome were delivered by Mayor Brittain and J. D. McKenna, president of the Saint John Board of Trade. These were responded to by J. Q. Hall, first vice-president, and Frank Dolan, second vice-president of the association.

W. C. Allison, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the Saint John Board of Trade, addressed those present on some aspects of the agriculture situation and urged the farmers to consider that under present conditions more than \$8,000,000 worth of farm produce is brought into New Brunswick each year. With the proper attention from the farmers this importation could be eliminated and the materials supplied by the New Brunswick farmers. He said that conditions here were such that this province could produce the best farm product possible to grow.

He urged on the people of New Brunswick the necessity of buying home products. He felt that the housewives should be particularly concerned in this regard and that

when buying they should always specify New Brunswick products.

T. A. Best, of Stanley, president of the association, delivered his annual address and stressed the need of greater co-operation among the farmers as well as closer co-operation with the buying public. He said that last year had seen some progress in farming in New Brunswick and he was hopeful for the future but the farmers themselves had to work faithfully and sincerely to have
