"I don't know, I don't know," and went ahead and fished.

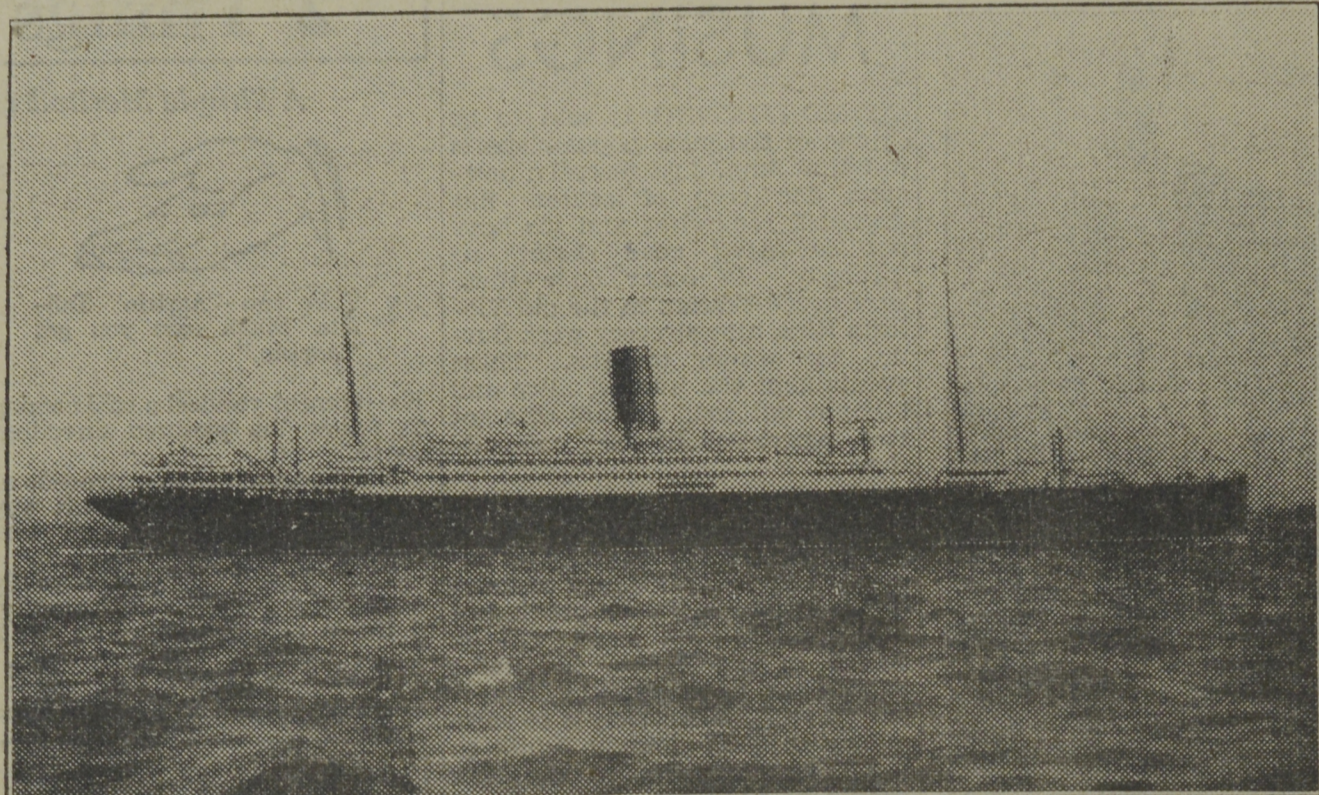
Now, what you are to figure out is why the man gave the answer he did after reading the sign.
