

## Publish Names Of All Taxpayers And What They Pay

Some Delinquents Are Paying as They Can Get the Money.

The proposal of the Common Council to publish the names of delinquent taxpayers has its advantages and its disadvantages.

There are no doubt many in these times who are unable to meet their tax obligations. There are others who are paying in installments as they are able, doing the best they can. Doubtless there are some who can pay and who are purposely evading payment. The names of the latter class ought to be published but it would be unfair to class all who are behind in their payments in one category.

The losses to the city in unpaid taxes are not so much from those who are not paying what they are assessed as from those who are paying but are not paying on the true values on which they are supposed to pay.

If City Hall would publish the names of taxpayers showing what they are actually paying and how the values are arrived at there would be presented to the public a picture that would be most interesting and would let those who are paying on true values see how some of their friends and competitors in business are getting off with low values and hidden profits.

## This Port Needs Business

A VISITOR who spent a week-end in Saint John after he had been for a few days in Halifax drew attention to the very marked difference in harbor activities of the two ports. He remarked that while Halifax appeared unusually busy loading and unloading freight Saint John harbor appeared almost deserted.

In order to see just how the two ports stood, the daily papers were consulted when it was found that on January 10, Saint John listed 10 steamers in port, in addition to which there would be three or four coast schooners; Halifax listed 27 steamers in port, 15 motor vessels and six schooners.

If Saint John were handling Canadian inward and outward freight now going through United States ports, this harbor would show signs of real activity. Traffic through the port of Saint John is of vital importance to the people of the whole Province of New Brunswick.

The Saint John Civic Government, the Boards of Trade of the Province, Provincial and Federal representatives should be concerned in promoting trade through New Brunswick ports. The future of the Province will be favorably or adversely affected by the increase or decline of our waterfront activities.

The present situation is serious and calls for serious thought and prompt action on the part of those in authority.

## CIVIC ELECTION RUMORS

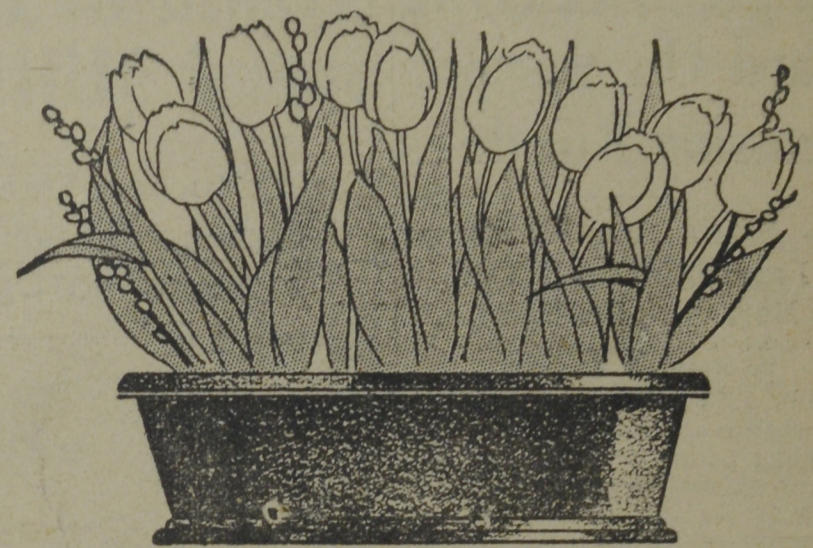

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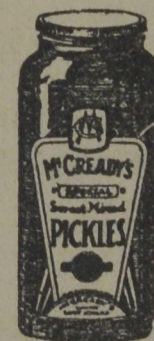
