

Three Provinces Are Paying to Help Richer and Stronger Provinces.

The people of the Maritime Provinces are being taxed to pay for unemployment relief not only in the Maritimes but in other provinces as well. Even under the new proposal these provinces will be providing more in taxation than they will receive. As a matter of fact the Maritime Provinces would be better off if they were providing for their own relief. The monthly grants to all the provinces for unemployment rel.ef will be \$3,064,687.50 under the proposed new arrangement. This sum must be collected from the people and on a per capita rate the Maritime Provinces will be paying one-tenth of this, or \$306,468.75.

But under the new arrangement the three Maritime Provinces will get back only \$115,937.50 for relief purposes and the other \$180,-531.25 will be used to help other and wealthier provinces to provide for their unemployment relief. In other words the unemployment relief scheme is just another racket by which the people of the Maaritimes are called upon to pay extra taxes.

Under the new proposal Prince Edward Island will receive a monthly allowance for relief of \$2,187.50; Nova Scotia, \$70,000 and New Brunswick, \$43,750.

The Province of British Columbia, whose population is slightly larger than Nova Scotia is to get \$262,500, or more than three times what Nova Scotia will be paid. But conditions in Nova Scotia, particularly in the fishing industry, are just as bad as in British Columbia. The story for the other provinces is similar to that. Still we are told that we are getting a fair deal and some of our own people seem imbued with this dea, in spite of the fact that we are helping other provinces to carry their load as well as supporting our own unemployed.
