## **Motor Truck Drivers**

Your attention is directed to an amendment to The Motor Vehicle Act adopted at the 1935 Session of the Legislative Assembly:

"Every commercial vehicle equipped with a cab, body or a rack of over six feet in width, or carrying a load of over six feet in width, shall have affixed thereto in front and as high and as far apart as possible two lights, a red on the left and a green on the right, and, in addition thereto, when the body or rack is of a permanent character, shall have affixed at the rear thereof and as high up and as far apart as practicable, two white lights, ene on either side and all in addition to the lights required under Section 43 (1)."


