**FIRE IN PORTLAND.**—On Thursday night, between 11 and 12 o'clock, a fire broke out in a block of buildings on the Straight Shore, originating, it is supposed, in a chimney which was observed on fire a short time previous. The engines were some time getting to the ground, and all their efforts could not prevent the destruction of three of the houses. Some persons lying sick at the time in the neighbouring houses were removed to some distance.—*Freeman.*

**PRINCE EDWARD'S ISLAND.**

A body supposed to be that of an American Fisherman, was discovered to be lying on the Beach at New London, on Friday, the 14th inst., it was immediately taken charge of by James Campbell, Esq., and conveyed to a house, and as soon as a coffin could be prepared, he was interred in the nearest church-yard. But what his name was, or to what vessel he belonged, remains unknown. The flesh was entirely off his head and face, so that nothing remained but the bare skull, his hands were also off by the wrists. His dress consisted of a blue shirt, jacket, waistcoat and trousers, of blue pilot cloth, a suit of oil clothes and a pair of American made boots. There were no papers found, but on his right arm were two marks resembling a heart and a half moon; he was about 6 feet high, and stout in proportion. He has indeed found a grave among strangers, but it may be a consolation to those who mourn lost friends, that every act of kindness and sympathy which humanity could suggest, or the most affectionate friend desire, were performed for his mortal remains.—*Hazard's Charlottetown Gazette.*

**BERMUDA.**

By the arrival of the R. M. S. *Ospray*, on Sunday last, from the above port, we are put in possession of our usual files of exchanges, which embrace dates to the 25th ult. The news does not seem to be of much interest, but we extract some of the most important items, which we think may be interesting to some of our readers.

Her Majesty's Ship *Cumberland*, the flagship of Sir George F. Seymour, sailed for the West Indies, on the 20th ult., in company with H. M. Brig *Sappho*.

**PUBLIC LECTURES.**—On Friday last, the Rev. Mr. Adam finished the course of Public Lectures on Moral and Mental Science which a number of the inhabitants of Hamilton Parish invited him to deliver there. Every lecture was numerously attended by Ladies and Gentlemen of Smith and Hamilton Parishes, whose gratification at this rare intellectual treat has been freely and warmly expressed.

**WEST INDIES.**

Another large crop of Sugar is anticipated at Barbadoes, should the weather prove propitious. An extensive portion of land is devoted to the cultivation of Cotton.

Grenada papers mention that the Legislature had considerably reduced the Island Tariff.

Dominica papers state that that fatal disease, resembling Cholera, called "La Gripp," had broken out in Guadaloupe.

Antigua papers of the 14th of November furnish no local news of any interest. The export of Sugar up to the beginning of November amounted to upwards of 13,000 hogsheads.

From Jamaica the news is both of the most interesting and the most painful nature—Serious differences have taken place with His Excellency Sir Charles Grey. His speech at the opening of the Legislature had given great offence to both Branches.

We lament to notice that the Cholera, instead of being on the decline, was extending its ravages in many parts of the Island. It is an awful fact that near twelve months have

elapsed since that fearful scourge first made its appearance in Jamaica, and that it still rages with great severity.—A severe gale, accompanied by most destructive rains, has visited the Island.

The Cholera was on the increase at Montego Bay, the peasantry are being swept off, and the town is evidently infected from all quarters. Mr. Edward Kerr, Overseer of Kirkpatrick Hall Estate, has fallen a victim, and at the Lethe estate death was carrying off thirty or forty per diem. Business was very dull; the country people scarcely visiting the town except to purchase physic.

It stands within thirty fathoms of the shore which is bold to.
