ABOUT SUMMER RESORTS.

A Bostonian or more southern resident would look upon Moncton as a promising summer resort, judging from its latitude, yet Monctonian themselves follow the fashion in thinking and talking about summer resorts for themselves and the weaker or more lovable friends. A New Yorker or even a Bostonian would regard Moncton as near enough to the north pole to be comfortable in July, yet, as a matter of fact, Moncton is a pretty warm place, even for those of cool temperament, during a part of the summer season. On this account quite a number have been in the habit of spending a few weeks at Shediac during the season and some at other resorts. This happens from year to year despite the fact that the Monctonian is in the happy position of the man who said, "Lo, on a narrow neck of land, twixt two unbounded seas I stand," the Gulf and the Bay being on two sides, with only twelve miles of land between. Yet it is hot here at times, many times in fact, and there is a natural demand for cooler air, dampened by a passage over the salt sea. This is why some of us go to Point du Chene, some to Cape Tormentine and some to Prince Edward Island. They do well who do this, even though the temperature is not so distressing here as to make the outing the necessity that the like would be to a Bostonian or a New Yorker. But they might do better, and to point out this fact is the object of this article. The best available summer resort, available by Monctonians, would be a location on the bank of the Bay of Fundy, where waters line our shores and would even wash our feet, if the mixture of mud was not objectionable. Now suppose we had a suitable steamer, what better sea resort could be found than Grindstone Island or the southern shore of Albert County? There we would have invigorating air, if anywhere, and invigorating bathing also if arrangements were made, as in other places, to provide bathing houses and similar accommodations. A hotel, of course, would be necessary and with this supplied, all other necessary accommodations would readily follow.

THE LEADER has not a dollars worth of land on Grindstone Island or the nearly contiguous shore of the main land, wherefore our recommendation of alteration to this subject is wholly disinterested. We believe that it would pay well to provide the necessary accommodations and hope that some enterprising individual will join us in seeing this, and proceed to supplement our remark by putting up the necessary cash.

The peculiarity of the tide makes the place unavailable for picnic parties, but no objection could be raised on this score by those who proposed remaining days or weeks and who had regular communication by steamers with Moncton and other points from which patrons come.

Think of this ye sweltering ones during this hot weather and it may be we can arrange to offer, hereafter, to increase travel to Moncton by the attraction of a first-class summer resort within easy reach of it. Anyhow we will do our own people a good service.

STRANGE MONSTER OF THE SEA.

Capt. McNeil, of the packet Susan, when coming from North Sydney on Thursday last, reports meeting with a most peculiar sea monster about 12 miles off Bird Island. The fish, or whatever it might be called, was perfectly white in color, and Capt. McNeil calculates was eighty feet in length. Its head was about 8 feet long, and was shaped somewhat like an alligator's. It was swimming on the top of the water, and when observed was about two hundred yards from the vessel. Capt. McNeil watched it for about 20 minutes or more until it disappeared from view. Some fishermen of the district of Ingonish state that this peculiar monster has been seen on several previous occasions.—North Sydney Herald.
