LOCAL NEWS:

DOMINION DAY SPORTS.

THE BICYCLE MEDALS GO TO ST. JOHN.

Amherst Wins the Lacrosse Match.

The slight rain on Sunday night made the weather all that could be desired for the holiday sports. In the afternoon the Amherst band arrived and marched from the station to the Athletic grounds where about fifteen hundred people assembled to witness the sports which took place as follows: The first called was a 100 yard dash, between McLean, Bell and Harding of Amherst and Humphrey and Smith of Moncton. This was won by Smith time, 11 seconds. The pole vault was next called and was contested by the following J. H. Crocker G. H. Reid and W. Spence of Amherst, T. W. Coombs of St. John and H. P. Archibald of Antigonish. Crocker won the vault by clearing 9 ft. 7 1/2 inches Coombs second vaulting 9 ft. 4 inches. Prize Silver medal.

The third on the programme was a one mile bicycle race, between Stanfield, of Truro, Archibald, of Antigonish, Oulton, of St. John, George and Bob Douglass, of Amherst and L. Harris, of Moncton. This race was taken by Oulton, with Stanfield a good second. Owing to a slight misunderstanding no time was taken for this race.

The 100 yards final heat was won by Smith. Time 10 3/5 seconds. Prize silver medal.

Following came the high jump in which Coombs, Blackburn, Reid, Spencer, Harding and Crocker took part. The prize, a silver medal, was taken by Coombs, who cleared 6 ft 2 1/2 in.

The 1/4 mile race was next called, the following responded: Steele, McLean, Bell, Harding, Geldard, Humphrey, Blackburn, Bell; Bell was ruled out of this race on account of being a professional. McLean, of Amherst, captured this race with Steele second. Time, 57 seconds. Prize, silver medal.

The two mile bicycle race was contested by local wheelmen, Heine, McLellan and Harris, and was won by the latter in 6 min. 4 sec. McLellan second.

The one mile race was then called, entries, Ray, Steele, Tufts and McDonald; Steele dropped out in the 2nd lap, Ray retired in the 3rd and McDonald in the 4th lap leaving the road in Tufts hands who made the mile in 5.22. Prize gold medal.

The last on the list was a 3 mile bicycle race between Stanfield, Oulton, McLellan, Harris, Archibald, G. Douglass and R. Douglass. This race was for a gold medal and was won by Oulton. Time 10.15.

The lacrosse match between Amherst and Moncton was won 3 goals to 0 by the Amherst team. The winning team was composed of the following:

Crocker, McNutt, Wilson, Simpson, Howard, McDonald, Biden, Moffat, McLeod, Steele, Christie and Harding.

During the afternoon the band furnished some fine music which was highly appreciated by the audience.

The ladies of St. George's guild catered to the wants of the people at the refreshment table.

In the evening the band held a Promenade concert on the association grounds. In the vicinity of 300 people purchased tickets.

The band played a lengthy programme consisting of very choice and difficult selections in a manner that elicited very favorable comment.

The Association certainly deserve a great deal of credit for the way in which they preserved order during the day.

DROWNING ACCIDENT.

ALBERT DOBSON, THE VICTIM.

Humphrey's Second Pond the Scene of a Fatal Tragedy.

The pleasure of the national holiday was marred yesterday morning by the news that a fatal drowning accident had occurred here, by which one of Moncton's young men lost his life. Very early in the morning Mr. Albert Dobson and a companion started for Humphrey's mill pond for the purpose of catching Pickerel, which were reported to be very plentiful there of late. For some time they fished from the bank, but not meeting with as much success as was anticipated, Dobson determined to swim across to the opposite side of the pond where he could see the fish leaping to catch their food. Following out his determination, he divested himself of all clothing excepting his boots and a pair of overalls, the straps of which fastened around his shoulders. He succeeded in swimming across to within 20 feet of the opposite bank, when he was seen to gasp and was heard to exclaim he was gone. He immediately sank to the bottom, and never again rose to the surface. An alarm was given by a young man named Budd. Searchers went out and toiled for hours before the body was found. A raft was secured and after dragging the pond with grappling hooks till about 3.30, the body was raised by J. McKinnon, D. Lockhart and H. McKinnon. When the body was found, the overalls were down, the straps had slipped off the shoulders and were tangled about the legs. The body of the unfortunate young man was taken to the police station. Coroner Ross summoned a jury, an inquest was held and a verdict was returned in accordance with the above facts. The deceased was 30 years of age and married. He had been for a long time an employe of the Sugar Refinery and was quite highly spoken of by his associates.
