THE CELEBRATION AT FREDERIC-

An event of the greatest importance in the history of this city and of the province will be commemorated on St. Barnabas day, June 11th, in the Cathedral at Fredeicton. That day will be the fiftieth anniversary of the inthronization of the Right Reverend Dr. Medley as the first Bishop of Fredericton. The services will be at 7.30 a. m., at 10.30 a. m., and at 8 p. m. At the 11 o'clock service the new organication of the Cathedral Chapter will be naugurated, and the new dean, Very Rev. Dr. Partridge, will be installed. The dean will preach at this service and the Right Rev. Dr. Courtney, Bishop of Nova Scotia (from which diocese this diocese was vided fifty years ago) will be the preac er at the evening service. The music at all the services will be largely composiions by the late Metropolitan. The choir will be surpliced and will be supplemented by choristers from Anglican churches in

A public meeting will be held in the City Hall, Fredericton, on Monday evening, at 8 o'clock sharp, the Bishop of Fredericton n the chair. The Lieut.-Governor, the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, Sir Leonard Tilley and others will address the meeting. Short papers will be read.

#### THE HOLZHEUER TRIAL.

The provincial government has ordered special sitting of the supreme court for the trial of William Holzheuer, who is charged with attempting to murder Capt. McNiel, of the barque J. S. Masters. The date of the trial is fixed for June 27th. The trial will involve a large expense, which it is presumed will be paid by the county. Warden Shatford called upon the county clerk Saturday and ordered him not to pay one cent of the expense He contends that the county is not liable. The accused is a foreigner, and neither the vessel nor the captain hailed from the county of Halifax, and the county, the warden holds, has no right to pay the expenses. When leaving Mr. Wiswell, Warden Shatford said: If the provincial government has ordered that the trial be held in Halifax they must pay the expenses as the county will not. We will fight the matter out in the courts rather than

It seems as if one of the severest penalties for being of royal or of noble birth in Britain consisted in the necessity of enduring long and tedious visits from Orientals of peculiar and uncleanly habits. She was formerly Miss Mabel Ruger, of Fremont, and had been married almost three years. The Ishes are wealthy and of good standing. CHOLERA AND YELLOW FEVER.

> A Washington despatch says that, according to a report from John Kavel, United States Consul General at St. Petersburg, transmitted by the State Department to the Marine Hospital service, cholera still exists in Russia to an uncomfortable extent. Mr. Kavel writes: According to the latest official report in government circles 106 cases and 33 deaths occurred in 13 days. I have been informed that six cases of cholera appeared in St. Petersburg, but officially no report has been made to that effect. The report received at Marine Hospital service states that in the last week of May there were four deaths from yellow fever in Vera Cruz, Mexico.

He also decided that the mode of procedure followed in the courts regarding costs would have to be applied to the Department of Justice as well.
