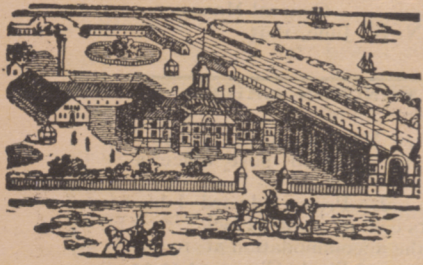

LOCAL NEWS:

Mr. Thomas O'Brien of the Westmill Press is in town today.

Steamer Delta arrived in port last night from Hopewell Cape.

A block pavement is being laid on Main street from near W. G. Bells store and will extend to Main St. crossing.

Two American's M. Hand J. M. Beers, of New York city were in town yesterday to see the famous Petitcodiac bore.

The many friends of Mr. William Duncan who has been under treatment by an eminent specialist in Boston for some time were pleased to note his arrival home yesterday much improved in health.

The enterprising managers of the Metropolitan Rink Mr. Peter McDougall and Mr. W. McDougall extends erecting a large rink at Newcastle. The building will be ready for use in September and will be used two nights each week for curling. The size is 200x80 and will be known as the Mirimichi Rink. Those gentlemen intend running the rink here also.

PROBATE COURT.

Final accounts in the estate of the late Albert J. Dobson, of Point de Bute, was before probate court yesterday. This was an adjournment hearing. A. W. Bennett for executors; O. N. Skinner, Q. C., for C. S. Hickman, next of kin; M. G. Teed for Joseph A. Trueman and two infant daughters; A. B. Copp for some of the heirs, and B. B. Teed for creditors.

Letters testamentary were granted in the estate of the late Cornelius Sullivan of Moncton parish, to W. A. Sullivan, his son, as sole executor; E. A. Reilly, proctor. These are the first letters granted under the new act.

POLICE NEWS.

Fred Armstrong was yesterday given one month in Dorchester for robbing Con. Hienes garden.

Ned Armstrong was given two months for assault.

Tom McGeary two months for kicking a small boy.

They will be conveyed to Dorchester today. Tom Nickerson promised to leave town. Officer Scott will escort him to the train.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT SALEM, A. CO.

A man named Wilson met with a very serious accident, Saturday, while at work in Duffy's mill, Salem, A. Co. He was edging some lumber when the saw caught his forearm and completely severed one bone. The limb was bandaged up as well as possible at the time, and the unfortunate man driven to Salisbury, where Dr. Moore dressed the wound. Wilson was afterwards brought to Moncton and placed under the treatment of Dr. Ross who has hopes of saving the limb.

CITY COUNCIL.

The city council met last night. Present Ald. Ayer, Winter, Dunlap, Chapman and Robinson.

In the absence of Mayor Whitney, Ald. Winters took the chair. The minutes of last meeting was read and approved.

A communication was read from C. T. Wood, Point Du Chene, asking to be appointed Scott Act Inspector.

From C. W. Edgett complaining of the gross irregularities of Field driver Dryden in the discharge of his duties, also saying that pound keeper Wilbur had charged him \$1.25 instead of the usual fee of \$1.00 for the liberation of his cattle from Pound.

Referred to board of works.

A letter was read from the office specialty Manufg Co., of Toronto in reference to the placing of a steel ball on top of flag staff. Referred to committee.

A communication was read in reference to payment of expenses and etc., incurred by the recent bond issue. Referred to Finance committee.

A letter from county tax collector Trites asking that the city pay the bill he held against the Gas Light and Water Co., amount being \$359.20 was referred to law committee.

Communication from C. W. Edgett claiming over assessment on his property was referred to assessment and appeals committee.

A letter from R. A. Borden in reference to the assessment of the Gas and Water Company, and claiming they were not liable to assessment this year by reason of the recent expropriation, and asking that the matter be adjusted. Referred to assessments and appeals committee.

A letter was read from George L. Beatty claiming over assessment and inclosing a sworn statement giving the value of his property. Referred to Assessments and Appeals.

From C. P. Harris's saying that if no city repudiated the action of the former council regarding taxation of the Acadia Sugar Refinery they would necessarily have to close up. Referred to committee.

Tender from J. J. McDonald offering 400 princess pine sleepers at 10c. each.

Letter from Jas. Flanagan offering to supply a 30 ft. regulation width flag for \$25 and saying that a good flag, such a the city should have, could not be obtained less than \$30 or \$35. Referred to Finance Committee.

Tender from Docity P. LeBlanc offering to construct Highfield and Cameron streets sewers at the rate of \$3.52 per foot. Wooden sewer at \$1.22 and pipe sewer at 77c. per foot.

Tender from Amos L. LeBlanc offering to build John street sewer, including catch basins, etc. for the bulk sum of \$1,979.00 and the pipe sewer at 87c. per foot.

A tender from T. M. LeBlanc offering to build the John street sewer including catch basins, etc. for the bulk sum of \$1,837 and the Park street sewer @ 82c. per lineal foot, shafts and everything included; also offering to give good security. Tenders were referred to Board of Works.

A letter was read from Alfred Trites and others interested asking the owners of the land at the end of West lane be compelled to allow the extension of the street through their property.

Parties owing land further on are willing to assign enough land to make a 4 rod road and it would be a great convenience to the Lower Mountain people making a short cut of four miles. Referred to committee of full board.

Water Committee recommended that 4000 feet, 1500 feet four inch, 1000 feet eight inch pipe be purchased from Curran & Co., Glasgow, at \$38.32 per ton, also six valves. Carried.

That a vault door No. 67, be purchased from Goldie & McCulloch, of Galt, Ont., at their price, \$169.50. Carried.

It was moved and carried that a number of water and light bills recommended by the Finance and Accounts committee be paid. The matter of appointments of city engineer was laid over for a full hour.

Assessment and Appeals committee recommended that the following reductions in the following parties' taxation be made, viz: C. W. Edgett, \$200; C. P. Steeves, \$100; Raphael Miller, \$240; J. H. Rogers, \$200 and Alfred Leaman, \$100. Carried.

Howard Scott was appointed in his same position at the usual salary for the balance of the year.

Ald. Martin made enquiries about the placing of an electric light on Waterloo street. Ald. Ayer said the matter was before the Water committee and they will be able to report in regard to a number of lights at the next meeting Ald. Martin produced a plan for the extension of John street sewer, and said Lady Smith would give necessary land to widen street providing the city would not exact the sewerage fee for some time. The matter was laid over for consideration. A motion that a number of special policemen be appointed for circus day was adopted.

J. Humphrey offered the lumber for street work at \$6.75 per million board measure. Accepted.

The tenders for sewer construction was laid over for engineer McCready to look over

Sumner & Co. offered to supply princess pine No. 1 posts @ 22 1/4 cedar, his @ 15 9 foot posts same as first material used for paving blocks @ 10c.

A motion by Ald. Robinson seconded by Ald. Dunlap that Field Driver David Dryden be dismissed. Was carried.

Adjourned until Tuesday 23rd.

CRIME IN THE SOUTH.

TWO LYNCHING BEES—AN UNPROVOKED MURDER.

WINCHESTER, Ky., July 16.—Robert Haggard, a mulatto, charged with having attempted to assault a white girl, was overtaken on Sunday night by a posse of citizens among the hills of Madison county and taken to a tree. The mob was in the act of stringing him up when Marshal Vice arrived with a strong posse and rescued him. The negro was taken to Ford, where he was put under guard until 6 o'clock yesterday, when he was brought here by early train over the Kentucky Central. The Winchester division of the Kentucky state guard, numbering 100 men, was ordered to watch the jail last night, but at midnight a mob of 200 men surrounding the jail. Electric lights were turned out and the city left in darkness. The mob then overpowered the guard and at 12.30 this morning Haggard was taken from his cell and hanged to a tree.

HAMPTON, Ark., July 16.—Two negroes, arrested for shooting Ally Martin near this place, two weeks ago, were taken from jail here Sunday night by seventy-five citizens and hanged near the scene of the crime.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 16.—Last evening Jacob Rothschild was shot and instantly killed by Dr. John D. White, a leading local physician. The tragedy was the result of insane jealousy on the doctor's part over a young woman, though he is a man of family, as was also his victim. Tuesday night last while Rothschild was calling on the young woman White sent her a note by a messenger reading as follows: "Tell your friend to meet me on the corner of Mulberry and Beale streets and will settle with him. The note was shown to Rothschild, who did not even know the doctor by sight, but next morning he called at his office and formed his acquaintance.

BOTH ARE DEAD.

SAN FRANCISCO July 16.—Thos. C. Woods, a cook on the steamer Walla Walla, shot and killed Miss Mabel Kent last night. Death ensued in both cases almost instantly.
